- Principal, Dr BP Patil, welcomed all the members present for the meeting.

Approval of Minutes of the last CDC meeting

- 4. Principal read out the minutes of the last CDC meeting held on 10 Dec 2018. Actions taken/ progress on the points were discussed. Details are at **Appx A**. Col KE Vijayan (Retd) proposed the minutes for approval and Brig. Abhay A Bhat (Retd) seconded those and the minutes were approved/ passed.
- 5. Prof. AK Singh raised an issue about certain points which were beyond agenda of the previous meeting and were raised by him in a separate letter with the Chairman. He requested to have discussion on same. He also mentioned that he did not receive appropriate reply to these points. The Chairman intimated that the points raised were deliberated at his end and suitable reply is given to him in writing as well as during his interaction with the Chairman. There was hence no need to discuss them again in CDC.
- 6. Prof A K Singh took objection on Jt. Dir being member of CDC. Prof AK Singh suggested that an HoD implied a HoD of an Academic Dept. Director pointed out that he is heading administration department and he is treated as one of the Head of dept. He is on the CDC as the HoD nominated by Head of Institution as per Maharashtra State University Act 2016. As AIT is a residential college his role in college activities is even more important than any of the Academic Dept HoD. Jt Director also

officiates in the absence of Director and hence he is an important part of decision making. Chairman directed that the Jt Dir will continue to be part of CDC. Based on a suggestion by Prof Sonawane, it was however decided that matter will be verified from SPPU.

College Update

7. The Principal updated all members about College activities, events and achievements during the period Jan 2019 to Mar 2019, Details of the update are at **Appx-B**.

Analysis of NIRF Ranking

8 Discussion took place on NIRF Rankings in which AIT dropped by three positions (from 88 to 91), despite the fact that AIT has improved in Pune and West Zone. Analysis of the same was present and is at **Appx-C**

Direction of Chairman for improving the rankings are as follows:-

- (a) Focus of AIT should be on TLR (Teaching Learning & Resources) and RP (Research Professional Practices) as these parameters have more weightage.
- (b) For improving RP, faculty should be given specific individual targets of paper publication, Patents, consultancy etc. Proper monitoring and feedback mechanism should be incorporated and strictly adhere to.
- (c) Mechanism to ensure involvement of students in Research and Innovation, right from FE should be instituted.
- (d) HOD will prepare plan for Dept level R&D and submit to this report within 60 days for perusal of Chairman.
- (e) AIT must work on all doable parameters and ensure better score next year.
- (f) Vision / Mission of AIT must be modified accordingly.
- (g) Only a professional, confident and expert faculty can get consultancy from which both faculty and AIT will benefit. He directed that faculty should try for such consultancy to prove their expertise. He also directed that list of research projects should be available right in the beginning for the FE students, so that they can be involved in research and innovation activities from FE itself.
- (h) He also informed all concerned that various problem statements were available on Army Design Bureau (ADB) website. These documents can be studied and AIT can also bid for these Research Projects. Chairman of ADB can be contacted to include AIT for annual ADB conference invitee list as was being done earlier.
- (j) There was a suggestion from one of the member that PG program can be started in other branches, such as Computer and E&TC. The Director felt that time is ripe for initiating the process. The Chairman directed that the proposal be initiated which can be taken up with AWES through proper channels.

Placements

- 9. Placements of 2018 19 was displayed and it was brought out that average salary has substantially increased this year. This was because many MNCs including Microsoft, Amazon and Barclays etc. absorbed students at very high salary. Even TCS hired some students for their advanced salary package for the first time.
- 10. Chairman queried as to whether the starting salaries of standard packages offered by bulk recruiters have increased in line with the inflation/consumer index. The TPO clarified that there has

been no increase for many years in the standard packages. However these companies are offering very high packages for selected students in High Tech areas. Many AIT students have met the criterion for such high tech placements.

Collaboration With Artificial Limb Center

11. When briefed about possibility of collaboration with ALC, Pune for 3D printing of artificial limbs, it was brought out by Dr. SM Sansgiri, that AIT needs additional software and hardware to start printing these parts. There is also a need for a 3D scanner to augment the 3D printing capabilities. Chairman directed that proposal may be taken up for procurement of required items. He was hopeful that HQ Southern Command will assist in allocation of funds for this purpose as this will be a unique and noble initiative for soldiers.

ACTION TAKEN / PROGRESS ON THE POINTS FROM MINUTES OF THE LAST CDC MEETING HELD ON 10 NOV 2018

Agenda Point I: - AQAR Report for 2017 – 18
 Annual Quality Assurance Report (AQAR) was submitted to NAAC 06 Dec 2018. The plan of action chalked out by the IQAC in the beginning of the year towards quality enhancement and the outcome achieved by the end of the year

Plans for Next Year :-

- 2. Agenda Point II: Scholarship Proposal
 From current year (2018 19) AGIF scholarships (Rs. 40000/-) have been stopped by which over 300 students are affected (24%). In view of this proposal to provide scholarships, based on means cum merit for 110 students is submitted. Initial corpus will be arranged from AIT FD, approx. Rs 44 Lakhs required per year. Also agencies like HQ Southern Comd / HQ AWES may be approached to contribute to the corpus for the scholarship

3. Agenda Point III: - Purchase of HPC System
It is proposed to purchase HPC System, which is required as per revised University Syllabus of various practical subjects such as Artificial Intelligence, Microprocessor Lab and Digital Lab etc. for students of Computer and IT. Student of all branches undertaking project requiring higher computing power will also benefited.

Approximate cost of System is Rs. 20 lakh. Part of procurement is already budgeted for Rs. 11 lakhs in 2018 – 19, under head of "Param Shawak" system. Balance will be budgeted for next year.

4. Agenda Point IV: Vacation Leave for Employees
Vocational employees (mainly teaching staff), were
earlier given 70 days vacation. However as per UGC
Gazette Notification 70 days is authorized to colleges
working six days a week, while for colleges having 5

days a week it is supposed to 42 days. As AIT provides two Saturday off, the pro-rate vocational period works out to 60 days. Essentially the calculation is based on a need to ensure atleast 180 teaching days in an Academic Year, which is not being full filled as of now. Hence directors were passed to have only 60 days leave for vacational staff. Prof. AK Singh raised objection to the new policy and mentioned that such guidelines are not endorsed by AICTE and Savitribai Phule Pune University. The Joint Director also brought out the issue that large no. of non-teaching staff also taking vacation leave, while the Adm Staff is authorised on 30 days EL. The entire issue of authorized leave needs to be reviewed as per various guidelines. The Director suggested that a committee should be formed to study all the aspects and prepare report. Prof. AK Singh requested that the order of vacation leave being curtailed to 60 days be withheld till the committee report is approved.

Additional Agenda Points from Teaching and Non-Teaching Staff

- 6. Prof. PR Sonawane pointed out that the agenda points for CDC meeting should be in the sequence of functions given In article 97 of Maharashtra Public University Act 2016. The Chairman however commented that the conduct of the meeting should carry on as planned and any additional points may be brought out later.
- Prof. AK Singh raised many issued related to college functioning some of them were already carried in earlier CDCs / LMCs. These points included the following:-

(a) Possibility of participation of AIT students in Khelo india Youth Game being held in Pune from 07 Jan 2019.

- (b) Prof. AK Singh had queries about the new football field being re-laid. The same were addressed by the Jt Director in detail.
- (c) Pay and allowance including provision of TA and CLA to employees.
- (d) Pay and allowances of adhoc employees.(e) QIP policy for teacher registered for PhD.
- (f) Restructuring of departmental organisation.
- (g) Requirement of Faculty Lounge.

The Principal objected to the points being raised in the meeting without prior discussion during Pre-CDC meeting. Prof. AK Singh mentioned that he is raising these issues only as the Chairman had permitted the members to do so. Care will be taken

- (a) for School children
- (b) Satisfactory answered
- (c) Already AWES has rejected this proposal
- (d) Revised pay suggested to AWES, awaiting for approval
- (e) Not possible in AIT, as self sustainable model
- (f)
- (g) Prof. AK Singh to suggest it.

Discussion with Director took place separately on issue raised by Prof. AK Singh. 8. The Chairman complimented the family, staff and student of AIT for their excellent performance till date. He also mentioned that AIT gets academically sound students as they are from top 8 to 10% of JEE ranking, while these students have requisite IQ, they need to develop their EQ and SQ. The faculty and staff need to focus on assisting the students to develop this. He also mentioned the need for the students to follow a disciplined routine and focus on developing their personalities. He mentioned that new fields of technology, such as AI, ML, IoT, Big Data, Robotics etc., presents new challenges and opportunities. AIT needs to work beyond curriculum and provide exposure to its students in these fields.
