My name is Tess Bratkovich, and I am an 18-year-old college student at Point Loma Nazarene University. I became a part of ATOU ten years ago when I attended a Youth F.O.R.C.E. (Friends Offering Respect Creating Empowerment) event with a few friends. My brother had a stroke at birth and also got involved. I loved the acceptance and inclusion that both he and I felt at every ATOU event. I remember feeling so happy and content leaving Youth F.O.R.C.E. meetings, no matter how tough my day had been. From a young age, I connected ATOU with something I was able to actively participate in, and knew it was a safe space for me to be. I learned that despite my age, I was still able to make a positive difference somewhere.

Some of my earliest childhood memories are at ATOU. I remember when Youth F.O.R.C.E. events used to be held in the office where meetings are now held. Now, they are held in the gym next door. We have really grown! I remember everyone played together, regardless of their abilities. As I grew up, I knew that I wanted to be involved in ATOU as much as I could.

When I started high school, I began attending Youth F.O.R.C.E. meetings. I chose ATOU for myself, and decided to continue to work in places of which I am passionate. Because of ATOU, I know what it means to be included and how to interact with people of any type or any disability.

By the end of my senior year, I decided I wanted to do something meaningful that would reflect everything this organization has given me throughout the years. I decided to start a coin drive to give back

in a new way. Anyone who wanted a coin box could take one and fill it up with spare change. The idea was that a full box would put one child through an ATOU workshop. The response was truly heartwarming - so many people wanted a box! I had one volunteer take one, and came back minutes later with it filled to the brim. He had gone to his car and filled it with all the loose change inside!

Thanks to generous donors, we collected over \$2,000 through the coin drive. That's enough to put over 60 kids through an ATOU workshop! The support and generosity I experienced through this fundraiser was so uplifting. My hope is that ATOU will continue to grow through the workshops. If kids are educated in the areas of kindness and inclusion, they will keep it with them for the rest of their lives. They can also get involved with the Youth F.O.R.C.E. and begin to make a difference at a young age.

The coin drive opened doors for me that I had not expected. I met so many amazing people just by dropping off boxes, and was able to speak on behalf of ATOU on multiple occasions. I took these experiences and applied them to various ATOU events, as well as my personal life.

Wow! What an exciting year it has been! Our dedicated workshop team of staff and volunteers reached 10,929 students in 9 counties at 125 schools. As I write this, we just reached the milestone of over 120,000 students who have experienced the ATOU workshop in 23 years. Those 120,000 students who heard the message of acceptance and inclusion are then able to impact the lives of others, and the ripple effect begins. We never really know how far our impact goes, but we have been told of the way students carry this message of acceptance and respect with them as they go on to middle school, high school and beyond. These students grow up to be the teachers, administrators, first responders, business owners, etc. and with the message they received from ATOU, they are the ones who create inclusive, accepting, safe, schools and communities.

This past year, in addition to trying to meet the ever-growing demand for our workshop, ATOU experienced another exciting milestone of growth. Our founder, Leslie DeDora retired in June, and I stepped into the role of Executive Director. I am excited to continue to lead this organization and carry on Leslie's legacy. I want to thank all of you who have been on this journey, and have shown your support in a variety of ways as we move through this transition.

It is thanks to all of you that we are able to reach 120,000 students, and because of you that we will be able to continue reaching 120,000 more and changing exponentially more lives.

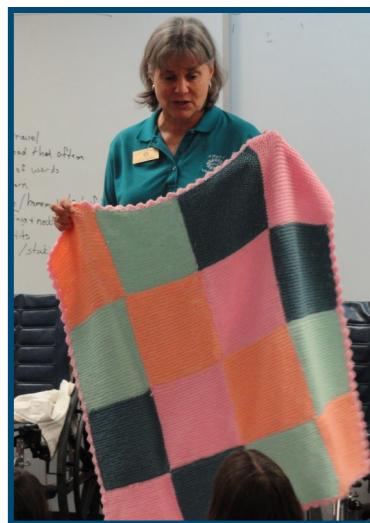

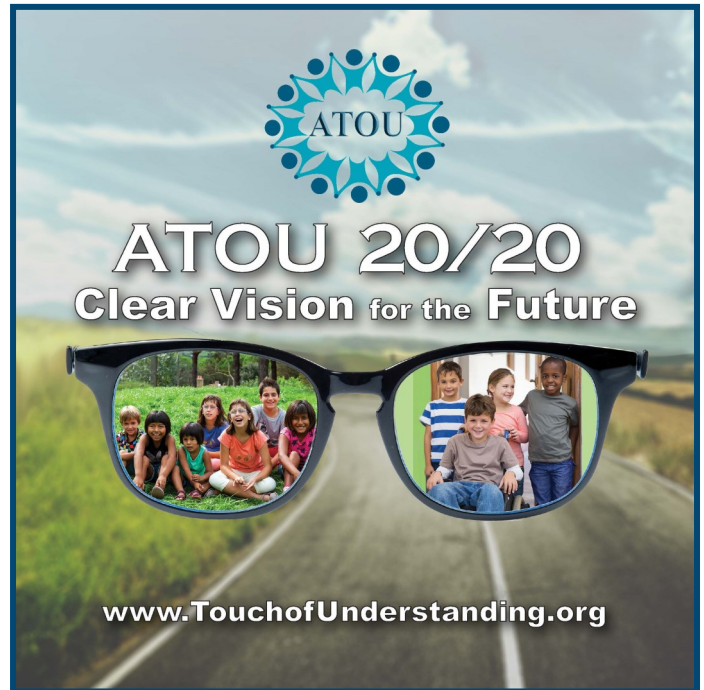

Everyone can be themselves and feel comfortable learning about things that they might have a hard time with, in another setting. They come away with the understanding that there are no barriers that prevent them from interacting with those who are different from them. # The ATOU Youth F.O.R.C.E.



Our Youth F.O.R.C.E. has continued to grow throughout the 2018-2019 school year. Three high schools (Granite Bay, Oakmont, and Whitney) have ATOU Youth F.O.R.C.E. clubs on their campus. Each club spreads awareness at their school by hosting “Lunch Buddies” (eating lunch and building friendships with students in the special education class), and participating in monthly activities and events.

This year, our Core Group had the opportunity to participate in the 2018/2019 Global Impact challenge. Wells Fargo selected 20 youth groups to plan and organize a project that impacts the community as well as spreads disability awareness. Our team met regularly throughout the whole year to organize the “Youth P.I.X. (Picking Inclusive eXperiences) event.” Members of the community with and without disabilities were able to try new adaptive activities. Some activities that were showcased included: soccer, archery, ukulele, golf, and wheelchair basketball. Our participants had a great time and enjoyed trying new things.

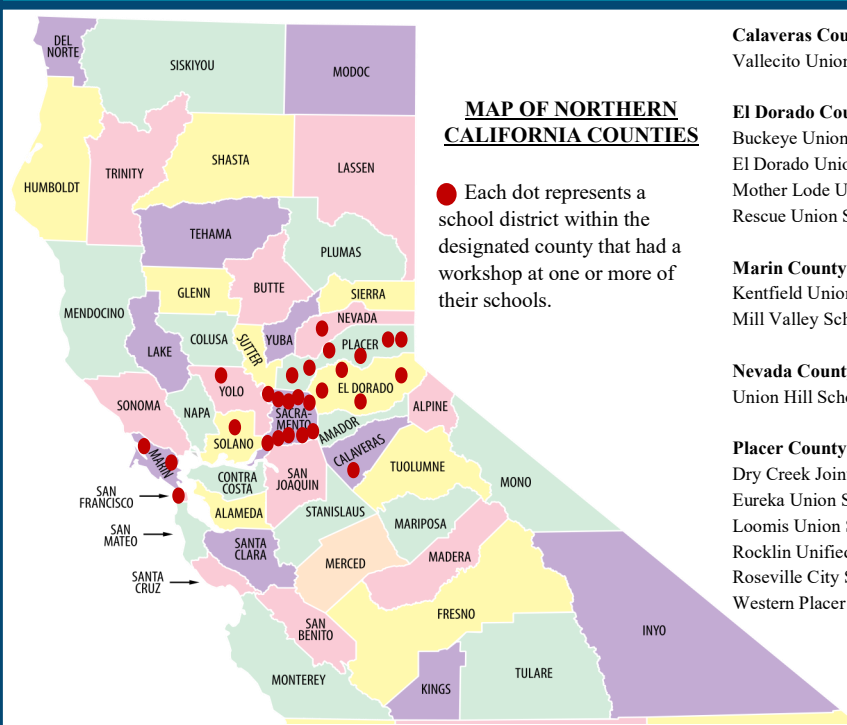
