The tracker utilises artificial intelligence (AI) to pull together a rich heritage information repository for ease of reference by researchers, youth, media and all stakeholders. The University of Lowa Stanley Museum of Art has returned two Benin bronzes to the Oba of Benin.

Lowa museum becomes first in US to return looted Benin bronzes to royal ruler. The University of lowa Stanley Museum of Art has defended its decision to hand back two objects to the Oba rather than the government.

The University of Iowa Stanley Museum of Art has returned two Benin bronzes to the Oba of Benin, the first time a US museum has handed back works to the head of the former royal family of the Benin empire. In a ceremony on 15th July at the Benin Palace in Nigeria, the museum restituted two objects, a brass plaque and wooden altarpiece, to Oba Ewuare II.
