

Indus Waters Treaty: India seeks review, renegotiation

An official stated the Indus Waters Treaty will not remain operational in its present form due to Pakistan's terrorism sponsorship.

The Indus Waters Treaty (IWT) is a water-sharing agreement between India and Pakistan regarding the Indus River system.

The treaty was signed by India's Prime Minister **Jawaharlal Nehru** and Pakistan's President **Ayub Khan**.

The treaty allocates the waters of the **Eastern Rivers** (**Ravi, Beas, Sutlej**) for **India's** unrestricted use.

The **Western Rivers** (**Indus, Jhelum, Chenab**) are allocated for **Pakistan's** unrestricted use.
