He laughed at me and I laughed at him, a dreadful false laugh. He slapped his knee. I rolled about in my chair as if on the verge of acute gastritis we laughed until we were exhausted. Then we grew serious again. Sabri was still as fresh as a daisy, I could see that. He had put himself into the patient contemplative state of mind of a chess player.

Take the key and go, 'he snapped suddenly, and handing it to her, swirled round in his swivel chair to present her with his back; them as suddenly he completed the circuit and swivelled round again. 'What!' he said with surprise. 'You haven't gone.' In truth there had hardly been time for the woman to go. But she was somewhat slow-witted, though obstinate as a mule: that was clear.
