1. General Session

1.A. Call to Order

Chair Rifilato called the meeting to order at 5:34 pm.

1.B. Pledge of Allegiance

Chair Rifilato led the Pledge of Allegiance.

1.C. Invocation

Chair Rifilato shared some quotes from John Muir for reflection.

3. Discussion

3.A. Brea Parks and Trails Update

Community Services Update:

Community Services Manager Jenn Colacion shared updated photos of the Arovista Park renovation, showcasing progress on the playground areas and retaining walls. She noted that the project timeline has been extended into early next year due to slower-than-anticipated construction progress.

Deputy Director Sean Matlock reported on the recent park visits that he completed with Chair Rifilato and Commissioner Son and offered to schedule visits with any Commissioners that would like to do the same ahead of the annual Goal Setting Exercise scheduled for the August meeting. He also announced plans to coordinate site visits for City Council and Commissioners in August. He emphasized the value of these visits to better understand the unique conditions and needs of each park. He also reminded the Commission that if any members are unable to attend scheduled site visits, they are welcome to visit the parks independently and use the provided forms to document any concerns or observations.

Public Works Update:

Public Works Manager Eric Aulls provided an update on playground inspections at Country Hills and Greenbriar Parks, which included drop tests and sand tilling. In response to a question from Commissioner Higgins about the testing process, Aulls described the use of a rubberized paint product to improve playground surfaces.

Additional discussion followed regarding community feedback on playground equipment and the importance of routine maintenance. Aulls addressed the ongoing challenges of delineating maintenance boundaries between the City and local homeowners associations and noted that a local painting contractor is being used for repairs to playground platforms.

Deputy Director Sean Matlock provided an update for the upcoming visits for the golf course ambassadors. He also mentioned the tee alignment project at Birch Hills Golf Course is in progress.

No updates on the Committee but Community Services Manager Jenn Colacion shared information about the 50th Anniversary exhibit of the Art in Public Places Program opening at the Gallery this coming weekend and invited the Commission to attend.

5. Informational

5.A. Correspondence

Staff addressed a recent concern raised by a family regarding chlorine levels at the Plunge. It was noted as an isolated incident, with no similar reports from other patrons. Staff acknowledged that such reactions may sometimes be due to individual sensitivities or allergies. Appreciation was expressed for Eric's team, who responded promptly by conducting thorough testing to ensure the facility was operating safely and within appropriate standards.

5.B. Public Works Update

Public Works Manager Eric Aulls shared several park maintenance updates: a truckload of new sand will be blended into existing playground areas; mulch made from tree clippings will be spread at various park sites starting with the Olinda Oil Museum and Trail to help retain moisture and reduce weed growth; and City-owned sprinklers may need to be temporarily activated to determine maintenance responsibility when it's unclear whether an issue falls under City or HOA jurisdiction.

5.C. Information Memorandum/Staff Updates

Staff shared the updated Information Memorandum prepared for the Cultural Arts Commission and proposed revising the Commission's own version to reflect similar improvements. They asked the Commission for input on what information and data would be most useful to include going forward.

Commissioner Realon recommended replacing the term "unknown" with "to be determined" in the Golf Course table to improve clarity. Chair Rifilato expressed appreciation for the new layout and storytelling format, noting that she particularly enjoys seeing the data visualized. He also inquired about revenue reporting for the Plunge and supported the idea of including revenue figures in future updates.

A suggestion was made to create a visually engaging display—potentially in a high-traffic community space like the entrance to the library—highlighting upcoming events such as those at the Curtis Theatre. The display could include a QR code, allowing community members to easily access additional information or subscribe to future events using their smartphones. This approach would reduce barriers to participation by eliminating the need to manually enter web addresses. It was noted that including key data, such as attendance or ticket sales, can help the public better understand the impact and popularity of these programs.

Community Services Supervisor Kristin Steyerman gave a recap of the Country Fair. She thanked Chair Rifilato for emceeing the Country Fair and mentioned what a fantastic job she did. She also highlighted the upcoming Brea Fest event and encouraged the Commission to help identify and recruit additional restaurant participants.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Commission approve a not to exceed amount of \$170,000 to procure a contractor to plaster the large pool at the Brea Plunge utilizing monies from the Park Development Fund (Fund 250).

BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION

Over the years, Public Works has worked with various contractors to maintain the Brea Plunge pools during non-peak months. Contractors used an oil-based product to paint the pool which is no longer a viable option due to changes in California regulations, so a new water-based product was used. In 2010, a few days into the summer season, delaminating occurred which was causing safety hazards. At that time, the City Manager and Public Works staff deemed this an emergency and both pools were plastered at the Brea Plunge.

Over the years, there have been pops in the plaster and the large pool has begun to show signs of problems, particularly over the past year. A diver was contracted several times to patch various spots of the walls and floor of the pool basin. Unfortunately, it is beyond useful life and has become a safety hazard. Several children had cuts/wounds during the 2025 summer season as a result of contacting damaged sections of the pool surface.

The pool will need to remain closed for an undetermined amount of time until the work can be performed. Commercial pool plastering is only performed by a few companies. It is imperative that we get on a contractor's schedule now so that the pool can be repaired and be ready for the 2026 summer season.

Based on the number of injuries, safety issues, possible claims, and the need to have the work performed as soon as possible, the Public Works Director has deemed this procurement an emergency. Staff has begun working with the Finance team on being able to utilize Park Development Funds (Fund 250) to pay for this item once it has been approved.

FISCAL IMPACT/SUMMARY

The Park Development Fund (250) is a logical funding source for this project as it falls within the scope and intent of this fund. This project would include plastering the entire large pool as part of renovations which takes it out of the realm of "maintenance" allowing the use of Park Development Fund monies. Approval of appropriation of up to \$170,000 from the Park Development Fund (250) would have no impact on the City's General Fund.

Special events like the Country Fair and Concerts in the Park brought the community together, creating memorable moments. Overall, the department continues to provide safe, engaging spaces and programs that inspire participation and connection.



Park Updates

Routine maintenance was performed at all parks in addition to the following specific improvements:

Country Hills Park	Add playground sand to both structures, repair playground platform, clean restrooms, clean monument sign and perform routine maintenance throughout park.
City Hall Park	Hosted Country Fair event, Hosted Concerts in the Parks, clean monument signs and perform routine maintenance throughout park.
Greenbriar Park	Sifted sand, repaired drinking fountain, clean monument sign and perform routine maintenance throughout park.
Woodcrest Park	Sifted sand and perform routine maintenance throughout park.
Olinda Ranch Park	Trim shrubs, repair restroom sink, clean monument sign and perform routine maintenance throughout park.
Olinda Ranch Oil Museum and Trail	Clean restrooms, perform routine maintenance throughout park and trail.
Founders Park	Sift and add sand to playground and perform routine maintenance throughout park.
Wildcatters Park	Replace 2 playground equipment components, clean monument signs and perform routine maintenance throughout park.
Lagos De Moreno Park	Clean monument sign, repair restroom light and perform routine maintenance throughout park.
Dog Parks	Power broom artificial turf, repair Decomposed Granite, pressure wash hardscape, clean drinking fountain, clean monument sign and performed routine maintenance throughout parks.

Olinda Oil Museum and Trail

During open hours for the museum, visitors totaled 55, which was a slower month with visitors from Orange County and the Inland Empire. There were no special groups tours during July. The docents supported the July Fourth Country Fair sharing information with attendees about the museum and trail.

The trail's popularity remains constant with it being a favorite for walkers and hikers in and around Brea. The weather remains a key factor in volume using the trail. The warmer weather has definitely brought many hiking and walking enthusiasts to the site.

The site's historic landmark Olinda Well # 1, which was drilled in 1897, was shut down due to an oil company, Bridgeland Energy having a dispute with the CA Environmental Agency. The docents and City staff have explored various explored our various contacts without resolution.

We continue to review the docent recruitment process, and we are always looking for those interested in volunteering at the site. Thank you for all of our docents/volunteers who spend hours sharing their knowledge with our visitors!



Park Development Fund (Fund 250) Update

The Park Development Fund has a current balance of \$404,023. There are two projects that have been approved by the Planning Commission on March 11, 2025, and the City Council on April 1, 2025. Brea Plaza would add a 120-unit apartment building and the project at Greenbriar would add 179 single-family units yielding \$673,320 and \$1,757,422 in park development fees respectively. In addition, we have two projects under construction: the Brea Mall Housing project of 380 apartments (\$2,132,180) and the South Brea Townhome project consists of 32 single-family units (\$221,552). The future anticipated park development fees total \$5,188,497.






Dispatch Incidents by City






HOPE CENTER SERVICES PROVIDED


