This item is for action on the 2023 Annual Service Plan Update and 2023 Assessment Roll for public improvements for the Beltmill Public Improvement District. Ordinance No 2023-24 approves the annual service plan update and 2023 assessment roll for public improvements.

2D. Action regarding Resolution No. 2023-17, Approving a Negotiated Settlement Between The Atmos Cities Steering Committee ("ACSC") And Atmos Energy Corp., Mid-Tex Division Regarding the Company's 2021 Rate Review Mechanism Filing--LeeHowell, Asst. City Manager - 6:06 PM
The City, along with 181 other Mid-Texas cities served by Atmos Energy Corporation, Mid-Tex Division ("Atmos Mid-Tex" or "Company"), is a member of the Atmos Cities Steering Committee ("ACSC"). In 2007, ACSC and Atmos Mid-Tex settled a rate application filed by the Company pursuant to Section 104.301 of the Texas Utilities Code for an interim rate adjustment commonly referred to as a GRIP filing (arising out of the Gas Reliability Infrastructure Program legislation). That settlement created a substitute rate review process, referred to as Rate Review Mechanism ("RRM"), as a substitute for future filings under the GRIP statute.
Since 2007, there have been several modifications to the original RRM Tariff. The most recent iteration of an RRM Tariff was reflected in an ordinance adopted by ACSC members in 2018. On or about March 31, 2023, the Company filed a rate request pursuant to the RRM Tariff adopted by ACSC members. The Company claimed that its cost-of-service in a test year ending December 31, 2022, entitled it to additional system-wide revenues of \$165.9 million.

Application of the standards set forth in ACSC's RRM Tariff reduces the Company's request to \$156.1 million, \$113.8 million of which would be applicable to ACSC members. After reviewing the filing and conducting discovery, ACSC's consultants concluded that the system-wide deficiency under the RRM regime should be \$130.9 million instead of the claimed \$156.1 million.

After several settlement meetings, the parties have agreed to settle the case for \$142 million. This is a reduction of \$23.9 million to the Company's initial request. This includes payment of ACSC's expenses. The settlement also includes an additional \$19.5 million for the securitization regulatory asset expenses related to Winter Storm Uri. This was previously approved by the Texas Legislature and Railroad Commission. The Effective Date for new rates is October 1, 2023. ACSC members should take action approving the Resolution/Ordinance before September 30, 2023.

2E. Action regarding First Amendment to Fort Worth City Secretary Contract No. 49683, An Interlocal Agreement between City of Fort Worth and Saginaw for Participation in the Environmental Collection Center Household Hazardous Waste Program--Matt Regan, Environmental/Drainage Manager - 6:09 PM

This item is for approval of the First Amendment to Fort Worth City Secretary Contract No. 49683, an Interlocal Agreement between the City of Fort Worth and Saginaw for participation in the Environmental Collection Center Household Hazardous Waste Program. Saginaw has participated in this program for many years. The program allows Saginaw residents to visit the collection center on Bridge Street in Fort Worth or the mobile collection unit that will be in Saginaw (on a date to be announced later) at no cost to the resident. The amendment addresses an increase in the fee from \$50 to \$95 per household per visit effective October 1, 2023. The financial impact will be the increase in the fee from \$50 to \$95 per household per visit. As in past years, funds will be included in the 2023-2024 budget for this expense. Staff recommends approval.

This item was removed from the Consent Agenda for discussion.

2F. Action regarding Acceptance of the Right-of-Way Encroachment Agreement for the FM156 at Industrial Intersection Project (CSJ# 0718-02-076) from Fuel City Saginaw, LLC--Randy Newsom, Director of Public Works - 6:04 PM

The FM156 at Industrial Project is a Texas Department of Transportation Project and funded through the North Central Texas Council of Governments COVID-19 Infrastructure Project. The City of Saginaw has taken the lead as the Local Sponsor having primary responsibility for utility clearance and right-of-way for the project. The project will require a future Advance Funding Agreement to finalize costs of the construction phase. Fuel City Saginaw, LLC has requested a Right-of-Way Encroachment for their existing sign. The proposed right-of-way encroachment agreement will be for an initial term of thirty (30) years commencing on the date this Agreement is executed. In addition to the initial term, Licensee has the option to renew the initial term for a successive period of thirty (30) years. There will be an application fee of \$325.00 due to the City to defray all costs of inspection and supervision during construction. Additionally, there will be a fee of \$.56 per square/linear foot of the encroachment area and this fee will be paid annually thereafter. Staff recommends approval.

2G. Action regarding Acceptance of the Permanent Right -of-Way Easement for the FM156 at Industrial Intersection Project (CSJ# 0718-02-076) from Fuel City, LLC--Randy Newsom, Director of Public Works - 6:04 PM

The FM156 at Industrial Intersection Project is a Texas Department of Transportation Project and funded through the North Central Texas Council of Governments COVID-19 Infrastructure Project. The City of Saginaw has taken the lead as the Local Sponsor having primary responsibility for utility clearance and right-of-way for the project. The project will require a future Advanced Funding Agreement to finalize costs of the construction phase. On October 18, 2022, City Council authorized Task 2 amendment to a professional services contract with Cobb, Fendley & Associates, Inc. to manage and negotiate right-of-way required for the FM156 at Industrial Intersection Project (CSJ# 0718-02-076). Fuel City Saginaw, LLC has provided a Permanent Right-of-Way Easement to construct a turn lane along their frontage. The proposed right-of-way easement is approximately 0.0839 acres of land. A fee of ten

dollars (\$10.00) is to be paid to Fuel City Saginaw, LLC (Grantor) by the City of Saginaw (Grantee) for the Permanent Right-of-Way Easement which allows access to Fuel City property for the construction of a turn lane. Funds for this expenditure will come from the Blue Mound/Industrial Improvements Account #06-1516-20-00. Staff recommends approval.

2H. Action Regarding Acceptance of Two (2) Fire Lane, Access, Utility and Drainage Easements from Bright Living Saginaw III, LLC--Randy Newsom, Director of Public Works - 6:04 PM

Bright Living Saginaw III, LLC (Grantor) is granting to the City of Saginaw (Grantee) two (2) Fire Lane, Access, Utility and Drainage Easements. One proposed easement is approximately 0.0049 acres of land and the second easement is approximately 0.0099 acres. A fee of \$10.00 each is to be paid to Bright Living Saginaw III, LLC (Grantor) by the City of Saginaw (Grantee) for these two easements. Funds for this expenditure will come from the Public Services Capital Outlay Account 01-7000-06-00. Staff recommends approval.

3. Proclamations-Presentations

3A. Discussion and presentation of potential consolidated dispatch services with Lake Worth- Russell Ragsdale, Police Chief - 8:04 PM

The Police Department is presenting the idea of a consolidated dispatch center with the Lake Worth Police Department. Lake Worth Police Department is proposed to be the host of the consolidated dispatch center. Lake Worth Police Chief J.T. Manoushagian gave a presentation regarding the proposed consolidation. Also present was Whitney Moore, Communications Manager. Chief Manoushagian explained the purpose of tonight's presentation was to determine if there was interest in the proposed consolidation, and if so, more details including plans and costs will be determined and presented to the Council at a future meeting. The consensus of the Council was to move forward with gathering more information regarding the proposal.

4. Public Hearings

4A. PUBLIC HEARING - Continuation of Public Hearing on the Fiscal Year 2023/2024 Proposed Budget--Gabe Reaume, City Manager & Kim Quin, Finance Director - 6:33 PM

Public Hearing was opened at 6:33 PM and closed at 7:54 PM

A public hearing on the Fiscal Year 2023/2024 Proposed Budget was advertised and held at the City Council Meeting on August 8, 2023. The public hearing was tabled to be continued at the August 15, 2023 City Council Meeting. The public hearing is required to allow for public input on the Proposed Budget. The proposed budget is the financial plan for fiscal year 2023/2024.

Mayor Flippo declared the continuation of the public hearing opened at 6:33 p.m. There was a lengthy discussion regarding the proposed salary increase of 10% for all employees and an additional increase of 3% for public safety employees. The Council discussed giving employees a one-time retention payment in October. Various scenarios and amounts were discussed. The Council concurred to continue the discussion of a one-time retention payment for employees at the September 5th City Council Meeting.

Mayor Flippo called for public input. Mr. Austin Pittman representing the Saginaw Professional Firefighters Association expressed his support of the proposed salary increase for public safety employees. Mr. John Peet expressed his support of the increases for employees. Mr. Brack St. Clair also expressed his support of the salary increases and one-time retention payments for employees. Ms. Breanna Farley, Animal Services Officer, suggested that positions in the Animal Services Department also be included with public safety positions for the extra 3% increase if public works employees were going to be included. Mayor Flippo called for any additional public input. There was none. Mayor Flippo declared the public hearing closed at 7:54 p.m.

4B. PUBLIC HEARING - Public Hearing on the Proposed 2023 Property Tax Rate for Fiscal Year 2023/2024--Gabe Reaume, City Manager & Kim Quin, Finance Director - 7:54 PM

Public Hearing was opened at 7:54 PM and closed at 7:56 PM

Mayor Flippo declared the public hearing for the proposed 2023 property tax rate for Fiscal Year 2023/2024 opened at 7:54 p.m. Mayor Flippo called for any public input. There was none. Mayor Flippo declared the public hearing closed at 7:56 p.m.

4C. Consideration and Action regarding Resolution No. 2023-16, Adoption of the Fiscal Year 2023/2024 Budget--Gabe Reaume, City Manager & Kim Quin, Finance Director - 7:57 PM

Throughout the spring and summer, workshops have been held to discuss the proposed budget. Resolution No. 2023-16 will formally adopt the budget for Fiscal Year 2023/2024. The budget is the financial plan for the City.

Valerie Junkersfeld made a motion to Approve that was seconded by Nick Lawson with a result of 7 - 0

Motion was made by Mayor Pro-Tem Junkersfeld with a second by Councilmember Lawson to approve Resolution No. 2023-16, adoption of the Fiscal Year 2023/2024 Budget. Motion carried unanimously. 7-0-0-0

4D. Consideration and Action to ratify the property tax rate increase reflected in the Fiscal Year 2023/2024 Budget--Gabe Reaume, City Manager & Kim Quin, Finance Director - 7:59 PM

This item is required by law since the fiscal year 2023/2024 budget includes a property tax increase.

Valerie Junkersfeld made a motion to Approve that was seconded by Paul Felegy with a result of 7 - 0

Motion was made by Mayor Pro-Tem Junkersfeld with a second by Councilmember Felegy to ratify the property tax rate increase reflected in the Fiscal Year 2023/2024 Budget. Motion carried unanimously. 7-0-0-0

4E. Consideration and Action regarding Ordinance No. 2023-22, Adopting and Setting the Property Tax Rate for the 2023 Tax Year--Gabe Reaume, City Manager & Kim Quin, Finance Director - 8:01 PM

Ordinance No. 2023-22 sets the tax rate at 49.8769 cents (I&S at 23.4810 and M&O at 26.3959). This rate is reflected in the Fiscal Year 2023/2024 Proposed Budget. The required public hearing and notices have been published and held. Collection of property taxes at the adopted rate is a primary funding source for the General Fund and Debt Service Fund budgets. Staff Recommends adopting a property tax rate of 49.8769 cents to fund the Fiscal Year 2023/2024 Budget.

Cindy Bighorse made a motion to Approve that was seconded by Valerie Junkersfeld with a result of 7 - 0

Motion was made by Councilmember Bighorse with a second by Mayor Pro-Tem Junkersfeld that the property tax rate be increased by the adoption of a tax rate of 0.498769, which is effectively an 8.60 percent increase in the tax rate. Motion carried unanimously. 7-0-0-0

4F. Consideration and Action regarding Ordinance No. 2023-23, Water and Wastewater (Sewer) Service Rates--Gabe Reaume, City Manager & Kim Quin, Finance Director - 8:02 PM

The City of Saginaw contracts with the City of Fort Worth for the purchase of water and the treatment of wastewater. The City of Fort Worth bills the City of Saginaw for water based on volume, and wastewater treatment based on strength and volume that pass through the system. The City of Fort Worth has proposed a 4.99% decrease to water rates and a 14.82% increase to wastewater rates. The Fiscal Year 2023/2024 budget includes a water rate decrease of 5% and a wastewater rate increase of 15%. Ordinance No. 2023-23 addresses the water and wastewater (sewer) rate changes reflected in the budget.

Valerie Junkersfeld made a motion to Approve that was seconded by Randy Edwards with a result of 7 - 0

Motion was made by Mayor Pro-Tem Junkersfeld with a second by Councilmember Edwards to approve Ordinance No. 2023-23 as presented. Motion carried unanimously. 7-0-0-0

5. Business

5A. Consideration and Action regarding City Employee Survey - Melanie McManus, Director of Human Resources -

The employee survey is part of the 2023 Work Plan Project list adopted by the City Council at the February 21, 2023 council meeting. During the council meeting on June 6, 2023, City Council approved the contract with OnPointe Insights to conduct the 2023 City Employee Survey.

This item was postponed until the September 5th City Council Meeting.

5B. Consideration and Action regarding a City-Wide Classification and Compensation Study - Melanie McManus, Director of Human Resources - 6:23 PM

The city last completed a comprehensive formal classification and compensation study in the fiscal year 2016/2017. Since that time, recruitment difficulties have been attributed to the tight labor market and increased competition to attract talent. As a general rule, most organizations conduct comprehensive classification and compensation studies every five years. A compensation study will help us understand what the market is demanding, ensuring the ability to hire and retain qualified employees and assist with keeping salaries competitive with the DFW region. A compensation study will give us an accurate and unemotional third-party perspective on our employee's pay. The financial impact will be \$33,800. Staff recommends approval for Baker Tilly to perform a city-wide classification and compensation study.

Nick Lawson made a motion to Approve that was seconded by Mary Copeland with a result of 6 - 1 Opposed by Randy Edwards

Motion was made by Councilmember Lawson with a second by Councilmember Copeland to approve a City-Wide Classification and Compensation Study as presented. Motion carried 6-1-0-0

5C. Consideration and Action regarding Resolution 2023-18 Compensation Philosophy - Melanie McManus, Director of Human Resources - 6:30 PM

Resolution No. 2023-18 adopts a compensation philosophy to identify tools to aid present and future city councils with compensation increase decisions; and provide an effective date. A compensation philosophy is simply a formal statement documenting the company's position about employee compensation. It explains the "why" behind employee pay and creates a framework for consistency. Employers use their compensation philosophy to attract, retain and motivate employees.

Nick Lawson made a motion to Approve that was seconded by Paul Felegy with a result of 7 - 0

Motion was made by Councilmember Lawson with a second by Councilmember Felegy to approve Resolution No. 2023-18 as presented. Motion carried unanimously. 7-0-0-0

5D. Consideration and Action regarding Ground Lease with Triton Saginaw, LLC for Property at 400 S. Saginaw Blvd. and 405 S. Belmont St.--Bryn Meredith, City Attorney - 9:41 PM

The proposed Ground Lease Agreement with Triton Saginaw, LLC addresses the lease of the approximate 0.25 acre parcel adjacent to the former fire station building located at 400 S. Saginaw Blvd. The required public hearings were held earlier this year and at the City Council Meeting held on February 21, 2023, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 2023-05, approving the non-park use of the property.

Cindy Bighorse made a motion to Table that was seconded by Nick Lawson with a result of 6 - 0

Motion was made by Councilmember Bighorse with a second by Councilmember Lawson to table Items 5D and 5E until the September 5th City Council Meeting. Motion carried 6-0-1-0. (Mayor Pro-Tem Junkersfeld abstained.)

5E. Consideration and Action regarding Chapter 380 Agreement with Triton Saginaw, LLC--Bryn Meredith, City Attorney - 9:42 PM

The proposed Chapter 380 Agreement with Triton Saginaw, LLC addresses the sale and development of the property at 400 S. Saginaw Blvd. and 405 S. Belmont St. This was approved at the October 18, 2022 City Council pending the property being vacated by the Fire Department. The Fire Department is now completely moved to their new location. The proposed agreement was drawn up by the City Attorney.

2B. Action regarding Interlocal Agreement with Fort Worth Transportation Authority ("Trinity Metro") for Tarrant County Transportation Services for the Elderly and Persons with Disabilities for the Period of October 1, 2023 through September 30, 2024--Keith Rinehart, Director of Community & Economic Development - 6:05 PM

The proposed Interlocal Agreement with the Fort Worth Transportation Authority ("Trinity Metro") for Tarrant County Transportation Services is for the period of October 1, 2023 through September 30, 2024. The agreement provides transportation one day per week which is Monday. Qualifying residents are entitled to a one-way trip fare of \$2.50. The annual cost for the City's participation is \$1,795. There is no additional cost because funding has been granted to Trinity Metro by the Federal Transit Administration under Section 5310 of Title 49 of the United States Code. The goal of the Section 5310 program is to provide transportation for elderly and disabled persons residing in cities that do not have public transportation available to them. Funds for this expenditure are budgeted in the Community Services Budget, Senior Center Programs, Account 01-5235-0800.

Additional options for transportation were briefly discussed. The Council directed staff to obtain more information regarding potential options for additional services and costs for consideration at a future Council Meeting.

Motion was made by Mayor Pro-Tem Junkersfeld with a second by Councilmember Bighorse to approve the Interlocal Agreement with the Fort Worth Transportation Authority as presented. Motion carried unanimously. 7-0-0-0

2C. Action Regarding Renewal of an Interlocal Agreement to Provide Animal Control Services to the City of Blue Mound--Lee Howell, Asst. City Manager - 6:14 PM

Councilmember Copeland left the Council Chambers at this point in the meeting due to a conflict of interest. Beginning with FY2019-20, Saginaw has maintained an Interlocal Agreement with the City of Blue Mound to provide animal control services. The City of Blue Mound seeks to renew this contract and agrees to a 100% increase in the annual contract fee. Blue Mound has paid \$1,500 annually since the initial agreement was approved. Blue Mound has agreed to increase the annual contract fee to \$3,000 for FY2023-2024. In addition, Saginaw collects all adoption and associated fees from animals impounded or owner surrendered from Blue Mound. Adoption fee recovery ranges from \$100 to \$135, depending on the species and size of the animal, and typically cover the cost for: sterilization, adoption fees, microchip, heartworm testing, rabies vaccinations, dewormer, and booster shots. These fees total on average \$3,000 in additional revenue annually.

Motion was made by Councilmember Edwards with a second by Councilmember Felegy to approve the Interlocal Agreement to provide Animal Control Services to the City of Blue Mound. Motion carried. 6-0-1-0 (Councilmember Copeland abstained due to a conflict of interest.)

2D. Action regarding Service Vehicle Replacement for Building and Code Compliance Department--Doug Spears, Fire Chief - 6:03 PM

The 2023/24 adopted budget includes the purchase of a replacement vehicle for the Building and Code Enforcement Department. The current vehicle, a 2017 Ford Escape, has been removed from service due to air bag equipment failure rendering it unsafe for use. The cost for airbag system repair coupled with the considerable amount of repair costs and downtime this vehicle has historically required makes the case for not pursuing air bag system repair and replacing the vehicle now as opposed to waiting until after October 1st. This vehicle is primarily used by our Code Compliance Manager and undergoes a lot of daily use. Having the current vehicle removed from service has a significant impact on code compliance activities necessitating sooner rather than later replacement. Staff has located and acquired three quotes for like vehicles (Moritz Chevrolet - \$33,888; Bruce Lowrie Chevrolet - \$35,439; Five Star Chevrolet - \$34,591). Staff recommends approval of the purchase of a Chevy Colorado, a mid-size vehicle, from Moritz Chevrolet. This will continue the intent of standardizing the fleet in the department with the same manufacturer and model vehicles. The Colorado is an economical vehicle that meets the needs of the department duties and activities. The total included in the 2023/24 budget for a replacement vehicle is \$44,000. There will be some necessary upfitting of the vehicle including graphics, tool box, floor mats, etc. The overall price will remain well below the budgeted amount. The vehicle and upfitting will be purchased in the current fiscal year using Fund Balance. The 2023/24 budgeted funds will not be expended but will adjusted to reflect the vehicle purchase.

3A. Proclamation for the Small Business Administration Recognizing their 70th Anniversary--Keith Rinehart, Director of Community & Economic Development - 6:22 PM

Mayor Flippo read a proclamation declaring September 5, 2023 to be Small Business Administration Day in the City of Saginaw. Ms. Linda Williams, Small Business Administration Economic Development Specialist, addressed the Council. She thanked the Council for their support and briefly explained the programs and services available through the Small Business Administration. Mayor Flippo presented the proclamation to Ms. Williams.

3B. Discussion of Safety Concerns regarding School Related Traffic--Russell Ragsdale, Police Chief - 6:28 PM

Police Chief Ragsdale updated the Council on school related traffic including the International Leadership of Texas, Wayside Middle School, Willow Creek Elementary, and Saginaw High School. Possible solutions to alleviate the traffic issues were discussed. City Attorney Meredith explained that the Texas Legislature took action in the spring that gives charter and private schools the same authority as the public school districts. Therefore the City has no authority over the schools. The City only has authority over traffic which presents an issue itself due to the current shortage of officers. Mr. Brian Miller and Mr. Kevin Martin, both residents of Saginaw, expressed their concern regarding the traffic and safety issues created by the school traffic. Police Chief Ragsdale stated that the Police Department will continue to work on these issues.

City Attorney Meredith gave an overview of the proposed Ground Lease and the proposed Chapter 380 Agreement with Triton Saginaw, LLC (Company) for the property at 400 S. Saginaw Blvd. and 405 S. Belmont St. They were as follows.

Ground Lease:

1/4 acre required to be leased due to this particular portion having been a park

39 year lease

\$100 per year with an increase of \$100 every five years

Leased premises can only be used for parking and landscaping

Triton Saginaw, LLC will be responsible for paying the ad valorem taxes annually on a timely basis

Chapter 380 Agreement:

The remainder of the property can be sold in order to develop the property. No record was found that indicated the land was ever a dedicated park.

Conveyance of the property will be no sooner than ninety (90) days from the execution of the Chapter 380 Agreement.

If Triton Saginaw, LLC wants title insurance, they will be responsible for securing it.

Conveyance of an older model fire truck no later than June 1, 2024. (Conservative estimate based on when Fire Department expects to accept delivery of a new truck.)

Company must build two of three restaurants in their group of restaurants. One restaurant is required to be Twisted Root.

Company must develop two restaurants, a beer garden and stage the sooner of 12 months following conveyance or December 31, 2024. Anticipated completion is December 31, 2024.

Company is required to make a capital investment on the property of no less than \$2.5 million. They must secure their own lending.

Once substantial completion occurs, the company is entitled to receive a grant payment from the City for the costs of utility improvements in the amount of \$150,000 if three restaurants are built or \$100,000 if two restaurants are built.

City agrees to waive all building permit fees upfront for initial construction (not an ongoing indefinite waiver).

If substantial completion is not met by the deadline, there is no reverter for the title to the property if company fails to meet the guidelines. Reason for this is a reverter will prevent them from obtaining bank funding.

Protections for the City include (1) the approved Planned Development Zoning on the property and development plan which designates what is permissible to be placed on the property; and (2) a liquidated damages clause in the agreement that requires the company to pay the City \$2,000,000 and all unpaid building permit fees plus interest if they don't meet the deadline of December 31, 2024.

City Attorney Meredith pointed out that Triton Saginaw, LLC is a limited liability company and their ability to pay liquidated damages will be affected by any liquidity issues and bankruptcy.

Mayor Flippo declared the meeting recessed into Executive Session at 8:15 p.m. pursuant to 551.087 Texas Government Code. Consultation with Attorney.

The proposed plan calculates one-time payments based on salary ranges with the lowest salary ranges receiving the highest retention incentives. Full time employees will receive a one-time payment equal to 12.38% to 0.35% (\$4,955 to \$758) of their budgeted salary and part time employees will receive \$2,000. All payments will be subject to payroll taxes, TMRS, and federal withholding deductions. The retention incentive payments will be paid to employees with one or more years of service in October. Employees with less than one year of service will be paid 50% at six months and 50% at one year of employment. The estimated cost of the retention incentive payments is \$502,153.

BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION:

The purpose of this item is to ensure that the emergency reserves of the General and Enterprise Funds comply with the Financial Management Policies adopted by the City Council on March 17, 2020. Both funds are required to reserve 25% of the operating budget for unexpected emergencies.

The current emergency reserve in the General Fund is \$4,990,000; based on the FY2023-2024 adopted budget less capital and one-time items the emergency reserve should be \$5,475,000. An additional \$485,000 should be added to the emergency reserve balance in the General Fund.

The current emergency reserve in the Enterprise Fund is \$2,450,000; based on the FY2023-2024 adopted budget less capital and one-time items the emergency reserve should be \$2,760,000. An additional \$310,000 should be added to the emergency reserve balance in the Enterprise Fund.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

There is no impact as this is not an expenditure but a reclassification from unrestricted to restricted fund balance.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends increasing the General Fund Emergency Reserve by \$485,000 and the Enterprise Fund Emergency Reserve by \$310,000.

WHEREAS, the City Staff has prepared revisions to the City of Saginaw, Texas Investment Policy as adopted on January 26, 1988, and as heretofore revised on September 6, 1988, February 6, 1990, March 5, 1996, September 18, 2001, December 7, 2010, October 3, 2017, September 3, 2019, September 7, 2021, and September 20, 2022 ;

WHEREAS, the Investment Committee has found that no revisions to the Investment Policy are necessary at this time; NOW, THEREFORE;

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SAGINAW, TEXAS:

1. That the City Council of the City of Saginaw, Texas, does hereby formally approve and adopt the CITY OF SAGINAW, TEXAS INVESTMENT POLICY, as a copy is attached to this Resolution on the 19th day of September, 2023.

2. That henceforth the Investment Policy, last revised and amended on the 20th day of September, 2022, and hereby adopted shall be in full force and effect and shall supersede and amend any prior such policy and provisions thereof.

INTRODUCTION

The purpose of this document is to set forth specific investment policy and strategy guidelines for the City of Saginaw in order to achieve the goals of safety, liquidity, yield, and public trust for all investment activity. The policy and strategy shall be reviewed annually by the Investment Committee and any modifications must be approved by the Investment Committee and forwarded to the City Council for final approval. This Investment Policy, as approved, is in compliance with Chapter 2256 of the Government Code, also known as “The Public Funds Investment Act”.

INVESTMENT STRATEGY

The City of Saginaw maintains portfolios which utilize four specific investment strategy considerations designed to address the unique characteristics of the fund groups represented in the portfolios:

- A. Investment strategies for operating funds and commingled pools containing operating funds have as their primary objective to assure that anticipated cash flows are matched with adequate investment liquidity. The secondary objective is to create a portfolio structure, which will experience minimal volatility during economic cycles. This may be accomplished by purchasing high quality, short- to medium-term securities, which will complement each other in ladder or barbell maturity structure. The dollar weighted average maturity of these funds will remain within the six to nine month range.
- B. Investment strategies for debt service funds shall have as the primary objective the assurance of investment liquidity adequate to cover the debt service obligation on the required payment date. Securities purchased shall not have a stated final maturity date that exceeds the debt service payment date.
- C. Investment strategies for debt service reserve funds shall have as the primary objective the ability to generate a dependable revenue stream to the appropriate debt service fund from securities with a low degree of volatility. Securities should be of high quality and, except as may be required by the bond ordinance specific to an individual issue, of short to intermediate-term maturities. Such securities will tend to hold their value during economic cycles. The stated final maturity dates of securities held should not exceed two years.
- D. Investment strategies for capital improvement projects or special purpose funds should allow for flexibility and unanticipated project outlays by having a portion of their investments in highly liquid securities. The stated final maturity dates of securities held should not exceed the estimated project completion date.

INVESTMENT POLICY

I. SCOPE

This investment policy applies to all financial assets of the City of Saginaw. These funds are accounted for in the City's Annual Comprehensive Financial Report (ACFR) and include:

- * General Fund
- * Special Revenue Funds
- * Debt Service Funds
- * Capital Projects Funds
- * Enterprise Fund
- * Trust and Agency Funds

These funds, as well as funds that may be created from time-to-time, shall be administered in accordance with the provisions of these policies. All funds will be pooled for investment purposes. The strategy developed for this pooled fund group will address the varying needs, goals, and objectives of each fund.

II. OBJECTIVES

The City of Saginaw shall manage and invest its cash with four objectives, listed in order of priority: safety, liquidity, yield, and public trust. The safety of the principal invested always remains the primary objective. All investments shall be designed and managed in a manner responsive to the public trust and consistent with State and Local law.

The city shall maintain a comprehensive cash management program, which includes collection of accounts receivable, vendor payment in accordance with invoice terms, and prudent investment of available cash. Cash management is defined as the process of managing monies in order to insure maximum cash availability and maximum yield on short-term investment of pooled idle cash.

Safety

The primary objective of the City's investment activity is the preservation of capital in the overall portfolio. Each investment transaction shall be conducted in a manner to avoid capital losses.

Liquidity

The City's investment portfolio will remain sufficiently liquid to enable the City to meet all obligations in a timely manner. This shall be achieved by matching investment maturities with forecasted cash flow requirements and by investing in securities with active secondary markets.

Yield

The City's cash management portfolio shall be designed with the objective of regularly exceeding the average rate of return on three-month U.S. Treasury Bills. The investment program shall seek to augment returns above this threshold consistent with risk limitations identified herein and prudent investment policies.

Public Trust

All participants in the City's investment process shall seek to act responsibly as custodians of the public trust. Investment officials shall avoid any transaction, which might impair public confidence in the City's ability to govern effectively.

III. RESPONSIBILITY AND CONTROL

Investment Committee

An Investment Committee, consisting of the Mayor, the City Manager, the Finance Director, and the Finance Manager shall meet as needed to determine operational strategies and to monitor results. The Investment Committee shall include in its deliberation such topics as: performance reports, economic outlook, portfolio diversification, maturity structure, potential risk to the City's funds, authorized brokers and dealers, and the target rate of return on the investment portfolio. The Investment Committee shall be authorized to invite advisors to the meetings as needed including, but not limited to, the City Attorney, the City Council, or outside advisors. The Investment Committee shall, at least annually, review, revise, and adopt a list of qualified brokers that are authorized to engage in investment transactions with the City.

Delegation of Authority and Training

Authority to manage the City's investment program is derived from a resolution of the City Council. The Finance Director is designated as investment officer of the City and is responsible for investment decisions and activities. The Finance Director shall establish written procedures for the operation of the investment program, consistent with this investment policy. The investment officer shall attend at least one training session containing at least ten hours of instruction relating to the officer's responsibility under the Act within twelve months after assuming duties and attend an investment training session not less than once in a two year period and receive not less than eight hours of instruction relating to the investment responsibilities. Approved independent training sources include the Government Finance Officers Association of Texas, the Government Treasurers Organization of Texas, and the University of North Texas Center for Public Management.

Internal Controls

The Finance Director is responsible for establishing and maintaining an internal control structure designed to ensure that the assets of the entity are protected from loss, theft or misuse. The internal control structure shall be designed to provide reasonable assurance that these objectives are met. The concept of reasonable assurance recognizes that (1) the cost of a control should not exceed the benefits likely to be derived; and (2) the valuation of costs and benefits requires estimates and judgments by management. Accordingly, the Finance Director shall establish a process for annual independent review by an external auditor to assure compliance with policies and procedures.

Prudence

The standard of prudence to be applied by the investment officer shall be the “prudent investor” rule, which states: “Investments shall be made with judgment and care, under prevailing circumstances, which persons of prudence, discretion and intelligence would exercise in the management of their own affairs, not for speculation, but for investment, considering the probable safety of their capital as well as the probable income to be derived.” In determining whether an investment officer has exercised prudence with respect to an investment decision, the determination shall be made taking into consideration:

- A. The investment of all funds, or funds under the City’s control, over which the officer has responsibility rather than a consideration as to the prudence of a single investment.
- B. Whether the investment decision was consistent with the written investment policy of the City.

The investment officer, acting in accordance with written procedures and exercising due diligence, shall not be held personally responsible for a specific security’s credit risk or market price changes, provided that these deviations are reported immediately and that appropriate action is taken to control adverse developments.

Ethics and Conflicts of Interest

Officers and employees involved in the investment process shall refrain from personal business activity that could conflict with proper execution of the investment program, or which could impair the ability to make impartial investment decisions. Officers and employees shall disclose to the City Manager any material financial interests in financial institutions that conduct business with the City and they shall further disclose positions that could be related to the performance of the City’s portfolio. Officers and employees shall subordinate their personal financial transactions to those of the City, particularly with regard to timing of purchases and sales.

An investment officer of the City who has a personal business relationship with an organization seeking to sell an investment to the City shall file a statement disclosing that personal business interest. An investment officer who is related within the second degree by affinity or consanguinity, as determined under Chapter 573 of the Texas Government Code, to an individual

seeking to sell an investment to the City shall file a statement disclosing that relationship. A statement required under this subsection must be filed with the Texas Ethics Commission and the governing body of the City.

An officer or employee involved in the investment process has a personal business relationship with a business organization if:

- A. The officer or employee owns ten percent or more of the voting stock or shares of the business organization or owns \$5,000 or more of the fair market value of the business organization.
- B. Funds received by the officer or employee from the business organization exceed ten percent of his/her gross income for the previous year; or
- C. The officer or employee has acquired from the business organization during the previous year investments with a book value of \$2,500 or more for his/her personal account.

IV. REPORTING

Quarterly Reporting

The Finance Director shall submit not less than quarterly a signed investment report that summarizes current market conditions economic developments and anticipated investment conditions. The report shall summarize investment strategies employed in the most recent quarter, and describe the portfolio in terms of investment securities, maturities, risk characteristics, and shall explain the total investment return for the quarter. The report shall be in compliance with the Public Fund Investment Act.

V. AUTHORIZED AND SUITABLE INVESTMENT SECURITIES

Active Portfolio Management

The City intends to pursue an active versus a passive portfolio management philosophy. That is, securities may be sold before they mature if market conditions present an opportunity for the City to benefit from the trade.

Authorized Investments

Assets of the City of Saginaw may be invested in the following instruments; provided, however, that at no time shall assets of the City be invested in any instrument or security not authorized for investment under the Act, as the Act may from time to time be amended.

- A. Obligations issued, guaranteed, or insured by the United States or its agencies and instrumentalities.
- B. Deposits in financial institutions with a main office or branch in Texas, guaranteed or insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance or its successor or collateralized as defined in the Safekeeping and Custody section of this Policy. In addition, Certificates of Deposit obtained through a depository institution that has its main office or a branch office in Texas and that contractually agrees to place the funds in federally insured depository institutions in accordance with the conditions prescribed in Section 256.010(b) of the Act are authorized investments.
- C. Fully collateralized direct repurchase agreements with a defined termination date secured by obligations of the United States or its Agencies and Instrumentalities, pledged to the City, held in the City's name, and deposited with a third party, selected by the Finance Director, other than an agency for the pledgor. Repurchase agreements must be purchased through a primary government securities dealer, as defined by the Federal Reserve, or a bank domiciled in Texas.
- D. Local government investment pools organized in conformity with Chapter 2256 (Public Funds Investment Act) of the Government Code that:
 - 1. Have a dollar-weighted average stated maturity of 90 days or fewer
 - 2. Seek to maintain a stable net asset value of \$1 per share
 - 3. Are rated not less than AAA or AAA-m or at an equivalent rating by at least one nationally recognized rating service.
 - 4. Have provided the City with an offering circular and other information required by the Public Funds Investment Act.

To become eligible, investment pools must meet all the requirements of state law as determined under Chapter 2256 of the Government Code, as amended; and be approved by a City Council action. Investments will be made in a local government pool only after a thorough investigation of the pool and approval by the Investment Committee which shall, at least annually, review, revise, and adopt a list of approved pools.

Holding Period

The City of Saginaw intends to match the holding periods of investment funds with liquidity needs of the City. In no case will the average maturity of investments of the City's operating funds exceed one year. The maximum final stated maturity of any investment shall not exceed two years.

Risk and Diversification

The City of Saginaw recognizes that investment risks can result from issuer defaults, market price changes or various technical complications leading to temporary illiquidity. Risk is controlled through portfolio diversification which shall be achieved by the following general guidelines:

- A. Risk of issuer default is controlled by limited investments to those instruments allowed by the Act, which are described herein.
- B. Risk of market price changes shall be controlled by avoiding over-concentration of assets in a specific maturity sector, limitation of average maturity of operating funds instruments to one year, and avoidance of over-concentration of assets in specific instruments other than U.S. Treasury Securities and Insured or Collateralized Certificates of Deposits.
- C. Risk of illiquidity due to technical complications shall be controlled by the selection of securities as described herein.

VI. SELECTION OF BANKS AND DEALERS

Depository

Periodically, a Depository shall be selected through the City's banking services procurement process, which shall include a formal request for proposal (RFP). In selecting a depository, the credit worthiness of institutions shall be considered, and the Finance Director shall conduct a comprehensive review of prospective depositories credit characteristics and financial history.

Certificates of Deposit

Banks seeking to establish eligibility for the City's competitive certificate of deposit purchase program shall submit for review annual financial statements, evidence of federal insurance and other information as required by the Finance Director.

Securities Dealers

For brokers and dealers of government securities, the City shall select only those dealers reporting to the Market Reports Division of the Federal Reserve Board of New York, also known as the "Primary Government Security Dealer", unless a comprehensive credit and capitalization analysis reveals that other firms are adequately financed to conduct public business. Investment officials shall not knowingly conduct business with any firm with whom public entities have

sustained losses on investments. All securities dealers shall provide the City with references from public entities that they are currently serving.

All financial institutions and broker/dealers who desire to become qualified bidders for investment transactions must supply the following as appropriate:

- audited financial statements
- proof of National Association of Securities Dealers (NASD) certification
- proof of state registration
- completed broker/dealer questionnaire
- certification of having read the City's investment policy signed by a registered principal of the organization
- acknowledgment that the organization has implemented reasonable procedures and controls in an effort to preclude imprudent investment activities arising out of investment transactions conducted between the City and the organization.

An annual review of the financial condition and registration of qualified bidders will be conducted by the Finance Director.

VII. SAFEKEEPING AND CUSTODY

Insurance of Collateral

All deposits and investments of City funds other than direct purchases of U.S. Treasuries or Agencies shall be secured by pledged collateral. In order to anticipate market changes and provide a level of security for all funds, the collateralization level will be 102% of market value of principal and accrued interest on the deposits or investments less an amount insured by the FDIC or FSLIC. Evidence of the pledged collateral shall be maintained by the Finance Director or a third party financial institution. Repurchase agreements shall be documented by a specific agreement noting the collateral pledge in each agreement. Collateral shall be reviewed monthly to assure that the market value of the pledged securities is adequate.

Safekeeping Agreement

Collateral pledged to secure deposits of the City shall be held by a safekeeping institution in accordance with a Safekeeping Agreement which clearly defines the procedural steps for gaining access to the collateral should the City of Saginaw determine that the City's funds are in jeopardy. The safekeeping institution, or Trustee, shall be the Federal Reserve Bank or an institution not affiliated with the firm pledging the collateral. The safekeeping agreement shall include the signatures of authorized representatives of the City of Saginaw, the firm pledging the collateral, and the Trustee.

Collateral Defined

The City of Saginaw shall accept the following securities as collateral:

- A. FDIC and FSLIC insurance coverage.
- B. A bond, certificate of indebtedness, or Treasury Note of the United States, or other evidence of indebtedness of the United States that is guaranteed as to principal and interest by the United States.
- C. Obligations, the principal and interest on which, are unconditionally guaranteed or insured by the State of Texas.
- D. A bond of the State of Texas or of a county, city, or other political subdivision of the State of Texas having been rated as investment grade (investment rating no less than “A” or its equivalent) by a nationally recognized rating agency.

Subject to Audit

All collateral shall be subject to inspection and audit by the Finance Director or the City’s independent auditors.

Delivery vs. Payment

Treasury Bills, Notes, Bonds and Government Agencies’ securities shall be purchased using the delivery vs. payment method. That is, funds shall not be wired or paid until verification has been made that the correct security was received by the Trustee. The security shall be held in the name of the City or held on behalf of the City. The Trustee’s records shall assure the notation of the City’s ownership of or explicit claim on the securities. The original copy of all safekeeping receipts shall be delivered to the City.

VIII. INVESTMENT POLICY ADOPTION

The City of Saginaw investment policy shall be adopted by resolution of the City Council. The policy shall be reviewed for effectiveness on an annual basis by the Investment Committee and any modifications will be recommended for approval to the City Council.

GLOSSARY

AGENCIES: Federal agency securities.

ASKED: The price at which securities are offered.

BANKERS' ACCEPTANCE (BA): A draft or bill of exchange accepted by a bank or trust company. The accepting institution guarantees payment of the bill, as well as the issuer.

BARBELL MATURITY STRATEGY: A maturity pattern within a portfolio in which maturities of the assets in the portfolio are concentrated in both the short and long ends of the maturity spectrum.

BID: The price offered by a buyer of securities. (When you are selling securities, you ask for a bid.) See Offer.

BROKER: A broker brings buyers and sellers together for a commission.

CERTIFICATE OF DEPOSIT (CD): A time deposit with a specific maturity evidenced by a certificate. Large-denomination (over \$100,000) CD's are typically negotiable.

COLLATERAL: Securities, evidence of deposit or other property which a borrower pledges to secure repayment of a loan. Also refers to securities pledged by a bank to secure deposits of public monies.

ANNUAL COMPREHENSIVE FINANCIAL REPORT (ACFR): The official annual report for the City of Saginaw. It includes five combined statements for each individual fund and account group prepared in conformity with GAAP. It also includes supporting schedules necessary to demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal and contractual provisions, extensive introductory material, and a detailed Statistical Section.

COUPON: (a) The annual rate of interest that a bond's issuer promises to pay the bondholder on the bond's face value. (b) A certificate attached to a bond evidencing interest due on a payment date.

DEALER: A dealer, as opposed to broker, acts as a principal in all transactions, buying and selling for his own account.

DEBENTURE: A bond secured only by the general credit of the issuer.

DELIVERY VERSUS PAYMENT: There are two methods of delivery of securities: delivery versus payment and delivery versus receipt. Delivery versus payment is delivery of securities

with an exchange of money for the securities. Delivery versus receipt is delivery of securities with an exchange of a signed receipt for the securities.

DERIVATIVES: (1) Financial instruments whose return profile is linked to, or derived from, the movement of one or more underlying index or security, and may include a leveraging factor, or (2) financial contracts based upon notional amounts whose value is derived from an underlying index or security (interest rates, foreign exchange rates, equities or commodities).

DISCOUNT: The difference between the cost price of a security and its maturity when quoted at lower than face value. A security selling below original offering price shortly after sale also is considered to be at a discount.

DISCOUNT SECURITIES: Non-interest bearing money market instruments that are issued at a discount and redeemed at maturity for full face value, e.g. U.S. Treasury Bills.

DIVERSIFICATION: Dividing investment funds among a variety of securities offering independent returns, to reduce risk inherent in particular securities.

FACE VALUE: The principal amount due and payable to a bondholder at maturity; par value. Also, the amount on which coupon interest is computed.

FEDERAL CREDIT AGENCIES: Agencies of the Federal government set up to supply credit to various classes of institutions and individuals, e.g. S&L's, small business firms, students, farmers, farm cooperatives, and exporters.

FEDERAL DEPOSIT INSURANCE CORPORATION (FDIC): A federal agency that insures bank deposits, currently up to \$300,000 per depositor (\$100,000 for non-interest bearing demand deposits, \$100,000 for interest bearing demand, savings or time deposits and a separate \$100,000 for interest and sinking funds)

FEDERAL FUNDS RATE: The rate of interest at which Fed funds are traded. This rate is currently pegged by the Federal Reserve through open-market operations.

FEDERAL HOME LOAN BANKS (FHLB): Government sponsored wholesale banks (currently 12 regional banks) which lend funds and provide correspondent banking service to member commercial banks, thrift institutions, credit unions and insurance companies. The mission of the FHLBs is to liquefy the housing related asset of its members who must purchase stock in their district Bank.

FEDERAL NATIONAL MORTGAGE ASSOCIATION (FNMA): FNMA, like GNMA was chartered under the Federal National Mortgage Association Act in 1938. FNMA is a federal corporation working under the auspices of the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). It is the largest single provider of residential mortgage funds in the United States. Fannie Mae, as the corporation is called, is a private stockholder-owner corporation. The corporation's purchases include a variety of adjustable mortgages and second loans, in addition to fixed-rate mortgages. FNMA's securities are also highly liquid and are widely accepted.

FNMA assumes and guarantees that all security holders will receive timely payment of principal and interest.

FEDERAL OPEN MARKET COMMITTEE (FOMC): Consists of seven members of the Federal Reserve Board and five of the twelve Federal Reserve Bank Presidents. The President of the New York Federal Reserve Bank is a permanent member, while the other Presidents serve on a rotating basis. The Committee periodically meets to set Federal Reserve guidelines regarding purchases and sales of Government Securities in the open market and as means of influencing the volume of bank credit and money.

FEDERAL RESERVE SYSTEM: The central bank of the United States created by Congress and consisting of a seven member Board of Governors in Washington, D.C., 12 regional banks and about 5,700 commercial banks that are members of the system.

GOVERNMENT NATIONAL MORTGAGE ASSOCIATION (GNMA or Ginnie Mae): Securities influencing the volume of bank credit guaranteed by GNMA and issued by mortgage bankers, commercial banks, savings and loan associations, and other institutions. Security holder is protected by full faith and credit of the U.S. Government. Ginnie Mae securities are backed by the FHA, VA or FMHM mortgages. The term “pass-throughs” is often used to describe Ginnie Maes.

INVESTMENT POOL: An entity created under the Government Code to invest public funds jointly on behalf of the entities that participate in the pool and whose investment objectives in order of priority are preservation and safety of principal, liquidity, and yield.

LADDERED MATURITY STRATEGY: A maturity pattern within a portfolio in which maturities of the assets in the portfolio are equally spaced.

LIQUIDITY: A liquid asset is one that can be converted easily and rapidly into cash without a substantial loss of value. In the money market, a security is said to be liquid if the spread between bid and asked prices is narrow and reasonable size can be done at those quotes.

MARKET VALUE: The price at which a security is trading and could presumably be purchased or sold.

MASTER REPURCHASE AGREEMENT: A written contract covering all future transactions between the parties to repurchase agreements that establish each party’s rights in the transactions. A master agreement will often specify, among other things, the right of the buyer-lender to liquidate the underlying securities in the event of default by the seller-borrower.

MATURITY: The date upon which the principal or stated value of an investment becomes due and payable.

MONEY MARKET: The market in which short-term debt instruments (bills, commercial paper, bankers’ acceptances, etc.) are issued and traded.

OFFER: The price asked by a seller of securities. (When you are buying securities, you ask for an offer.) See Asked and Bid.

OPEN MARKET OPERATIONS: Purchases and sales of government and certain other securities in the open market by the New York Federal Reserve Bank as directed by the FOMC in order to influence the volume of money and credit in the economy. Purchases inject reserves into the bank system and stimulate growth of money and credit; sales have the opposite effect. Open market operations are the Federal Reserve's most important and most flexible monetary policy tool.

PORTFOLIO: Collection of securities held by an investor.

PREMIUM: The amount by which the price paid for a security exceeds its face value.

PRIMARY DEALER: A group of government securities dealers who submit daily reports of market activity and positions and monthly financial statements to the Federal Reserve Bank of New York and are subject to its informal oversight. Primary dealers include Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC)-registered securities broker-dealers, banks, and a few unregulated firms.

PRINCIPAL: The face or par value of an instrument, exclusive of the accrued interest.

PRUDENT PERSON RULE: An investment standard. In some states the law requires that a fiduciary, such as a trustee, may invest money only in a list of securities selected by the custody state—the so-called legal list. In other states the trustee may invest in a security if it is one which would be bought by a prudent person of discretion and intelligence who is seeking a reasonable income and preservation of capital.

QUALIFIED PUBLIC DEPOSITORIES: A financial institution which does not claim exemption from the payment of any sales or compensating use or ad valorem taxes under the laws of this state, which has segregated for the benefit of the commission eligible collateral having a value of not less than its maximum liability and which has been approved by the Public Deposit Protection Commission to hold public deposits.

QUALIFIED REPRESENTATIVE: A person who holds a position with and is authorized to act on behalf of a business organization (as defined by the Public Funds Investment Act)

RATE OF RETURN: The yield obtainable on a security based on its purchase price or its current market price. This may be amortized yield to maturity on a bond the current income return.

REPURCHASE AGREEMENT (RP OR REPO): A holder of securities sells these securities to an investor with an agreement to repurchase them at a fixed price on a fixed date. The security "buyer" in effect lends the "seller" money for the period of the agreement, and the terms of the agreement are structured to compensate him for this. Dealers use RP extensively to

finance their positions. Exception: When the Fed is said to be doing RP, it is lending money, that is, increasing bank reserves.

SAFEKEEPING: A service to customers rendered by banks for a fee whereby securities and valuables of all types and descriptions are held in the bank's vaults for protection.

SECONDARY MARKET: A market made for the purchase and sale of outstanding issues following the initial distribution.

SECURITIES & EXCHANGE COMMISSION: Agency created by Congress to protect investors in securities transactions by administering securities legislation.

SEC RULE 15C3-1: See Uniform Net Capital Rule.

STRUCTURED NOTES: Notes issued by government sponsored enterprises (FHLB, FNMA, SLMA, etc.) and corporations which have imbedded options (e.g., call features, step-up coupons, floating rate coupons, derivative-based returns) into their debt structure. Their market performance is impacted by the fluctuation of interest rates, the volatility of the imbedded options and shifts in the shape of the yield curve.

TREASURY BILLS: A non-interest bearing discount security issued by the U.S. Treasury to finance the national debt. Most bills are issued to mature in three months, six months, or one year.

TREASURY BONDS: Long-term coupon-bearing U.S. Treasury securities issued as direct obligations of the U.S. Government and having initial maturities of more than 10 years.

TREASURY NOTES: Medium-term coupon-bearing U.S. Treasury securities issued as direct obligations of the U.S. Government and having initial maturities from two to 10 years.

RE: 2022-2023 Year-end Budget Adjustments

The attached schedule shows recommended year-end budget adjustments. The changes are described below.

General Fund – Revenues – General Fund revenue sources are estimated to be \$584,135 higher than budgeted. The largest increase is in Sales Tax collections. Sales tax remains strong but is increasing at a slower rate; with four of the last twelve months collections lower than the previous year. Building permits fees are lower than budgeted but other permits and fees are up. Rental inspections fees are up due to the increase in rental units within the City. Property tax is higher than budgeted due to favorable judgements by the Tarrant Appraisal District's Appraisal Review Board. Delinquent property tax collections and property tax penalties and interest revenue are also up. Utility franchise fees are up from the gas utility provider due to the colder weather this past winter. Overall recreation revenues continue to be down due to seasonal staffing shortages and limited space for programming due to the temporary Senior Center relocation to the Recreation Center. Court fines and fees remain down due to fewer citations being issued. The contribution from the City of Lake Worth is lower than budgeted due to the Emergency Manger positon being vacant for a portion of the year. The Tarrant County 911 radio assistance and public safety answering points (PSAP) grants were not funded. Recognition of American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding is delayed due to delays in the Police Department roof repairs and the Recreation Center emergency generator. The original budget for ARPA is being re-allocated to the correct account code. Sale of vehicles and equipment collections are being recognized. Interest earnings are increased due to higher than budgeted interest rates.

Expenses – Vacancy savings (salary and benefits) for General Fund departments are partially offset by overtime increases in Police, Fire, Public Services, and Animal Services. Staffing changes were made in Administration and Inspections/Code Enforcement. Health insurance savings are being transferred to the General Escrow Fund to mitigate anticipated health insurance increases in future years. Workers' Compensation expense was higher than budgeted with rates increasing for public safety. In Administration some line item overages are offset by savings in election expense and data processing expense. There were increases due to the webcast upgrades, legal advertising, and engineering fees not related to a capital project. Engineering fees not related to a specific capital project include work related to Council Meeting preparation, the CIP update, GIS mapping, subdivision ordinances and standards, and development review. The budget is increased for the employee assistance programs approved by the City Council on July 5, 2023. The meeting expense line item is increased for the expenses related to the All American Cities trip approved by the City Council on May 2, 2023. A portion of the classification and compensation study approved on August 15, 2023 is budgeted. Police Department vacancies have affected multiple line

items in that budget. The Maintenance and Repairs line item is increased for the water heater and HVAC system replacements approved on May 2, 2023 and July 5, 2023. In Public Services there are line item increases for the new planning software, building maintenance and repairs, signal light repairs, and mowing expense. These increases are partially offset by decreases in sprinkler repair and sidewalk replacement. Fewer sidewalks were replaced due to staffing shortages and the difficulty in obtaining small batches of concrete. There is savings in the Square developer's agreement, a final payment will be made when the terms of the agreement (eating establishments) are satisfied. Line item savings in Parks is due to staffing shortages. In the Recreation budget savings are due to the delay of the emergency generator and reduced recreation programming due to space constraints and seasonal staffing. There have been several Saginaw Home Improvement Program (SHIP) applications but there will be no payouts in this first year. The replacement code enforcement vehicle is budgeted based on City Council approval on September 5, 2023. The expense related to the animal shelter consultant was lower than budgeted. Estimated fuel savings will offset the increases for parts and the outside gradall repair. The unspent balances in Building Improvement Grants and Economic Development Incentives will be transferred to the General Escrow Fund to be used for incentives in future years. Line item budgets in Information Technology are being reallocated to better track expenses. There is savings in the server replacement line item due to only one server being replaced. In Communications there is an increase due to the new website conversion and the employee survey approved by the City Council on June 6, 2023. The General Fund balance is estimated to increase \$1,604,565 more than budgeted decrease of \$1,412,540. The net impact will be an estimated increase to fund balance of \$192,025.

Debt Service Fund – Property tax revenue is more than budgeted due to favorable judgements of the Appraisal Review Board. Delinquent tax collections and interest earnings are up due to increased collections and higher interest rates. The 2023 bond sale resulted in \$37,200 in accrued interest, an expense savings. The Debt Service Fund balance is estimated to increase by \$275,720 more than the budgeted decrease of \$59,305. The net impact will be an estimated increase of \$216,415.

Enterprise Fund – Water sales and wastewater service are higher than budgeted due to higher than average use. Sewer surcharge increases are due to both strength and volume. Increased revenues for these services are partially offset by the corresponding increase in expense to the City of Fort Worth for water and wastewater. Tap fees are lower than budgeted due to some delays in planned developments. Penalty income is up due to change in calculation to 10%. Interest earnings are estimated to be higher due to higher interest rates. The original budget for ARPA is being re-allocated to the correct account code and reduced due to delays in the NW Booster Pump Station project. The transfer of impact fees from the Enterprise Escrow Fund is for the NW Booster Pump Station project. Vacancy savings is offset by an increase engineering fees not related to a capital project and the contract (ended in May 2023) for the services of the former Public Works Director. Engineering fees not related to a specific capital project include work related to Council Meeting preparation, the CIP update, GIS mapping, subdivision ordinances and standards, and development review. Health insurance savings are being transferred to the Enterprise Escrow Fund to mitigate anticipated health insurance increases future years. Line item savings are estimated for meter purchases due to the short supply. There are projected savings in utilities and power to the pumps expense. There have been several Saginaw Home Improvement Program (SHIP) applications but there will be no payouts in this first year. The Vac Truck has been ordered but is delayed due to a supply shortage. There is

savings in the Square developer's agreement, a final payment will be made when the terms of the agreement (eating establishments) are satisfied. The Triton developer's agreement will not be paid this year and will be carried forward to next fiscal year. The budget for the Fairmount Sewer Rehabilitation project is re-allocated to the correct account and reduced to reflect the estimated expenses in the current year. The NW Booster Pump will not be completed this fiscal year. Fund balance is expected to be \$2,190,435 more than the budgeted decrease of \$2,283,280 for a net decrease of \$92,845. Adjustments will be made mid-year of Fiscal Year 2023/2024 to carryforward funding for these projects that are not already budgeted.

Capital Projects Fund – Budget adjustments in the Capital Projects Fund include the sale of general obligation bonds for construction of the Park Projects, and Knowles Phases 2 and 3 including the Knowles/McLeroy intersection. Interest earnings are increased due to increased interest rates. Budget adjustments to the capital projects are based on estimated expenses through September 30, 2023. Adjustments will be made mid-year of Fiscal Year 2023/2024 to carryforward funding for these projects that are not already budgeted. Fund balance will be increased to fund projects continuing in the coming fiscal year.

Crime Control and Prevention District Fund – Fund balance will be increased by an estimated \$752,195 more than the budgeted decrease of \$814,050 due to increased sales tax revenue, interest earnings, and the delay in purchasing three patrol vehicles and the Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD/RMS) conversion. The patrol vehicles budgeted to be replaced are on back order and funding will be carried forward to make payment when those vehicles are received next fiscal year. Funding for the CAD/RMS conversion will also be carried forward to next fiscal year.

Police Expendable Trust Fund – Fund balance will be increased by an estimated \$1,075 due to forfeitures collected and no changes to expenditures in this fiscal year.

Drainage Utility Fund – Revenues are estimated to be higher than budgeted due to increased drainage fee collections and higher than budget interest earnings. The next phase of the East Cement Creek Drainage project will continue into next fiscal year.

Street Maintenance Fund – Revenues are increased due to higher than budgeted sales tax and increased interest earnings. Expenses are decreased due to the delay of maintenance projects because of City staffing shortages, limited availability of Tarrant County street repair crews and concrete shortages. Due to work completed by the Tarrant County street repair crews, the City completed the north Knowles and the Burlington Road projects. Fund balance is budgeted to increase by \$1,374,660 over the budgeted decrease of \$1,431,930 for a net decrease of \$57,270.

Donations Fund – Revenue is increased based on the number of utility customers electing the voluntary monthly donations. The City began taking donations for community events in the current year and budgeting for those expenses. Parks donations were used for the Independence Day fireworks show and the Holiday drone show. The City Council approved and engineering contract for a pedestrian bridge at Highland Station Park on April 4, 2023. There was no public art expense in the current year. Donations Fund balance is estimated to increase by \$18,335 over budget.

General Escrow Fund – Interest earnings are higher due to higher interest rates. Court Technology and Court safety fees are lower than budget due to fewer citations issued. Insurance claims revenue and expenses are higher than an average year due to wind storm damage and the Public Works facility flood damage. There is a budget adjustment for the

collection of the Opioid Abatement settlement. Transfers are increased to escrow health insurance savings to mitigate future health insurance increases. Unspent Economic Development Incentive funds and Building Improvement Grant balances are transferred from the General Fund to be used for future development incentives.

Enterprise Escrow Fund – Health insurance savings in the Enterprise Fund are being transferred to the Enterprise Escrow Fund to mitigate future health insurance increases. Interest earnings are increased due to higher than anticipated interest rates. Impact fee funding is budgeted for the Northwest Booster Pump project. Interest earnings are increased due to higher interest rates.

Beltmill PID Fund – Year-end budget adjustments reflect the second year of the Beltmill Public Improvement District collections and interest earnings. There is an anticipated addition to fund balance of \$20,890.

**CHAPTER 380 ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AGREEMENT
BY AND BETWEEN
THE CITY OF SAGINAW, TEXAS AND SP SA DEVELOPMENT, LLC**

This CHAPTER 380 ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AGREEMENT (“Agreement”) is made and entered into by and between the CITY OF SAGINAW, TEXAS, a Texas municipal corporation within Tarrant County, Texas (“City”), and SP SA DEVELOPMENT, LLC a Texas limited liability company (“Developer”), each of which may be singularly referred to as “Party” and jointly referred to as “Parties,” acting by and through their respective authorized officers and representatives, for the purposes and considerations stated below:

WHEREAS, the City desires to provide, pursuant to Chapter 380 of the Texas Local Government Code (“Chapter 380”), an incentive to Developer to develop land wholly located within the City limits for two desirable food establishments; and

WHEREAS, Developer owns property located at 1005 N. Saginaw Blvd., Saginaw, Tarrant County, Texas, (the “Property”) upon which is located a dilapidated structure; and

WHEREAS, to develop the Property, the existing structure must be demolished; and

WHEREAS, the Parties agree that the Development contemplated herein has been proposed by Developer and is being incentivized herein by the City because of the anticipated benefit to the general public by establishing a viable business on the Property; and

WHEREAS, the City has the discretionary authority under Article 52-a of the Texas Constitution and Chapter 380 to make loans or grants of public funds for the purposes of promoting local economic development and through which stimulates business and commercial activity within the City; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds and determines that making economic development Grant Payment to Developer in accordance with this Agreement will further the objectives of the City, benefit the City and the City’s inhabitants, and promote economic development and stimulate business and commercial activity in the City.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual benefits and promises contained herein and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the Parties agree as follows:

**SECTION 1.
FINDINGS INCORPORATED**

The foregoing recitals are hereby incorporated into the body of this Agreement and shall be considered part of the mutual covenants, consideration and promises that bind the Parties.

SECTION 2. PROGRAM AND TERM

- 2.1 Program. Pursuant to Section 380.001 of the Texas Local Government Code, a program is hereby established for the development of the Property to demolish substandard and outdated structures in the City for the reasons set forth in the recitals, and to encourage new, quality development. The terms of this Agreement shall implement the program.
- 2.2 Term. The term of this Agreement shall begin on the Effective Date and will continue until all obligations of each Party are completed.

SECTION 3. DEFINITIONS

For purposes of this Agreement, the following words shall have the meanings ascribed:

BANKRUPTCY OR INSOLVENCY means the dissolution or termination (other than a dissolution or termination by reason of Developer merging with an affiliate) of Developer's existence as a going business, insolvency, appointment of receiver for any part of Developer's property and such appointment is not terminated within 60 days after such appointment is initially made, any general assignment for the benefit of creditors, or the commencement of any proceeding under any bankruptcy or insolvency laws by or against Developer and such proceeding is not dismissed within 60 days after the filing thereof.

CERTIFICATE OF OCCUPANCY means a certificate issued by the City certifying a building's compliance with applicable building codes and other laws, and indicating it to be in a condition suitable for human occupancy.

DEMOLITION means the demolition of the current structure located on the Property.

DEMOLITION GRANT PAYMENT means a payment of up to Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) to reimburse Developer for demolishing the current structure located on the Property.

DEVELOPMENT means the demolition of the structure located on the Property and the construction and occupancy of a new structure or structures to house two food establishments.

EFFECTIVE DATE means the date set forth in Section 9 of this Agreement.

FORCE MAJEURE means any contingency or cause beyond the reasonable control of a Party including, without limitation, acts of God or the public enemy, war, terrorist act, or threat thereof, riot, civil commotion, insurrection, government action or inaction (unless cause by the intentionally wrongful acts of omissions of the Party), pandemic, fires, earthquake, tornado, hurricane, explosions, floods, strikes, slowdowns or work stoppages.

GRANT PAYMENT means the Demolition Grant Payment and the Restaurant Grant Payment.

IMPOSITIONS mean all taxes, assessments, use and occupancy taxes, charges, excises, license and permit fees, and other charges by public or governmental authority, general and special, ordinary and extraordinary, foreseen and unforeseen, which are or may be assessed, charged, levied, or imposed by any public or governmental authority on Developer or any property or any business owned by Developer within the City.

PROPERTY 1005 N. Saginaw Blvd., Saginaw, Texas.

RESTAURANT GRANT PAYMENT means a payment of Seventeen Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$17,500.00) upon the issuance of two certificates of occupancy for two (2) food establishments, that may not be either a chicken based restaurant or donut-only shop.

SECTION 4. OBLIGATIONS OF DEVELOPER

The obligation of City to provide a Grant Payment shall be conditioned upon the compliance and satisfaction by Developer of the terms and conditions of the Agreement and each of the conditions set forth herein:

- 4.1 Conditions of Demolition Grant Payment. In consideration of City agreeing to pay Developer the Demolition Grant Payment in accordance with the terms, provisions and conditions of this Agreement, Developer agrees to the following, which are not obligations of Developer, but are conditions that must be fulfilled in order to receive the Demolition Grant Payment:
 - (A) Demolish the structure located on the Property no later than November 18, 2023.
 - (B) Provide documentation satisfactory to the City showing the cost of the Demolition.
- 4.2 Conditions of Restaurant Grant Payment. In consideration of City agreeing to pay Developer the Restaurant Grant Payment in accordance with the terms, provisions and conditions of this Agreement, Developer agrees to the following, which are not obligations of Developer, but are conditions that must be fulfilled in order to receive the Restaurant Grant Payment. No later than _____, Developer shall construct (or cause to be constructed) a structure or structures to house two food establishments that are neither a chicken restaurant or an establishment that sells only donuts, and receive a certificate of occupancy for each. (By way of example, if donuts are sold, other food must also be available as well.
- 4.3 Good Standing. Developer shall not have an uncured breach or default of this Agreement or any other agreement between the Parties concerning the Development and shall be solely responsible for the payment of all fees and for securing all permits necessary for construction of the Development. For all portions of the Property owned by Developer, all

ad valorem taxes owed to the City or other jurisdiction for the Property are to remain current.

- 4.4 Impositions. Developer shall remain current and paid on all Impositions, subject to appeal rights in accordance with law and subject to a right to cure any delinquency.

SECTION 5. OBLIGATIONS OF CITY

- 5.1 Demolition Grant Payment. Provided Developer is in compliance with each material term of this Agreement and has provided documentation satisfactory to the City showing the cost of the Demolition, the City will make the Demolition Grant Payment in an amount not to exceed Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) to reimburse Developer for the cost of the Demolition, within thirty (30) days of compliance with this Section.
- 5.2 Restaurant Grant Payment. Provided Developer is in compliance with each material term of this Agreement and has provided documentation satisfactory to the City showing the receipt of two Certificate of Occupancies for food establishments in accordance with Section 4.2 of this Agreement, the City will make the Restaurant Grant Payment in the amount of Seventeen Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$17,500.00) within thirty (30) days of compliance with this Section.
- 5.3 Default. Should Developer fail to demolish the structure by the date required in Section 4, this Agreement shall terminate and the City shall have no obligation to make the Grant Payment.

SECTION 6. TERMINATION; OFFSET

- 6.1 Termination. This Agreement terminates at the end of the Term, and may, prior to the Expiration Date, be terminated upon any one or more of the following:
- (A) by mutual written agreement of the Parties;
 - (B) upon written notice by either Party, if the other Party defaults or breaches any of the terms or conditions of this Agreement and such default or breach is not cured within thirty (30) days after written notice thereof;
 - (C) should any written warranty, representation or statement made or furnished to City by Developer under this Agreement or any document(s) related hereto furnished to the City is/are false or misleading in any material respect, either now or at the time made or furnished, and the furnishing Party fails to cure same within thirty (30) days after written notice from the receiving Party describing the violation, or if such violation cannot be cured within such thirty (30) day period in the exercise of all due diligence;

- (D) upon written notice by City, if any Impositions owed to City or the State of Texas by Developer shall have become delinquent (provided, however, Developer retains the right to timely and properly protest and contest any such taxes or Impositions);
 - (E) upon written notice by City, if Developer suffers an event of Bankruptcy or Insolvency; or
 - (F) upon written notice by either Party if any subsequent federal or state legislation or any decision of a court of competent jurisdiction declares or renders this Agreement invalid, illegal or unenforceable.
- 6.2 Offsets. City may, at its option, offset any amounts due and payable to Developer under this Agreement against any debt (including taxes) lawfully due to City, from Developer, regardless of whether the amount due arises pursuant to the terms of this Agreement or otherwise, and regardless of whether or not the debt in question has been reduced to judgment by a court.

SECTION 7. INDEMNIFICATION

- 7.1 **DEVELOPER EXPRESSLY AGREES TO FULLY AND COMPLETELY DEFEND, INDEMNIFY, AND HOLD HARMLESS THE CITY, ITS OFFICERS, AND EMPLOYEES AGAINST ANY AND ALL CLAIMS, LAWSUITS, LIABILITIES, JUDGMENTS, COSTS, AND EXPENSES FOR PERSONAL INJURY (INCLUDING DEATH), PROPERTY DAMAGE OR OTHER HARM, DAMAGES OR LIABILITY FOR WHICH RECOVERY OF DAMAGES IS SOUGHT, SUFFERED BY ANY PERSON OR PERSONS, THAT MAY ARISE OUT OF OR BE OCCASIONED BY ANY NEGLIGENT, GROSSLY NEGLIGENT, WRONGFUL, OR STRICTLY LIABLE ACT OR OMISSION OF DEVELOPER OR ITS AGENTS OR EMPLOYEES, ARISING OUT OF DEVELOPER'S PERFORMANCE OF THIS AGREEMENT; PROVIDED, HOWEVER, IN NO EVENT WILL DEVELOPER HAVE ANY SUCH INDEMNIFICATION OBLIGATION FOR ANY CLAIMS, LAWSUITS, LIABILITIES, JUDGMENTS, COSTS AND EXPENSES ARISING OUT OF OR CAUSED BY THE SOLE NEGLIGENCE, SOLE GROSS NEGLIGENCE, WILLFUL MISCONDUCT, OR ANY OTHER SOLE ACT OR OMISSION OF THE CITY OR ITS OFFICERS OR EMPLOYEES. NOTHING IN THIS PARAGRAPH MAY BE CONSTRUED AS WAIVING ANY GOVERNMENTAL IMMUNITY AVAILABLE TO THE CITY UNDER STATE LAW. IN THE EVENT OF JOINT OR CONCURRENT NEGLIGENCE OF BOTH THE CITY AND DEVELOPER, THE RESPONSIBILITY, IF ANY, OF DEVELOPER TO INDEMNIFY THE CITY SHALL BE APPORTIONED COMPARATIVELY IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE LAWS OF THE STATE OF TEXAS.**

- 7.2 It is acknowledged and agreed by the Parties that the terms hereof are not intended to and shall not be deemed to create a partnership or joint venture among the Parties. The City, their past, present and future officers, elected officials, directors, employees and agents of the City does not assume any responsibility to any third party in connection with Developer's construction of the Development.

SECTION 8. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

The following miscellaneous provisions are a part of this Agreement:

- 8.1 Amendments. Any amendments to this Agreement must be in writing and signed by the appropriate authorities of all Parties.
- 8.2 Applicable Law and Venue. This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Texas, and all obligations of the Parties created hereunder are performable in Tarrant County, Texas. Exclusive venue for any action arising under this Agreement shall lie in the state district courts of Tarrant County, Texas.
- 8.3 Assignment; Conveyance of the Property. This Agreement may not be assigned without the express written consent of all of the other Parties.
- 8.4 Binding Obligation. This Agreement shall become a binding obligation on the signatories upon execution by all signatories hereto and upon any successor or approved assignee of Developer. City warrants and represents that the individual executing this Agreement on behalf of City has full authority to execute this Agreement and bind City to the same. Developer warrants and represents that the individual executing this Agreement on Developer's behalf has full authority to execute this Agreement and bind it to the same.
- 8.5 Caption Headings. Caption headings in this Agreement are for convenience purposes only and are not to be used to interpret or define the provisions of the Agreement.
- 8.6 Counterparts. This Agreement may be executed in one or more counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original and all of which shall constitute one and the same document.
- 8.7 Entire Agreement. This Agreement constitutes the entire understanding and agreement of the Parties as to the matters set forth in this Agreement. No other understanding, oral or otherwise, in direct conflict with this Agreement shall be deemed to exist or to bind any of the Parties hereto. All prior written or oral offers, counteroffers, memoranda of understanding, proposals and the like are superseded by this Agreement. No alteration or amendment to this Agreement shall be effective unless given in writing and signed by the Party or Parties sought to be charged or bound by the alteration or amendment. Neither Party is relying on any statement, representation, nor warranty of the other Party not expressly set out in this Agreement. Each of the undersigned authorized representatives of the Parties warrants and represents and does hereby state and represent that no promise or agreement which is not herein expressed has been made to him or her in executing this

Agreement, and that none of us is relying upon any statement or representation of any agent of the Parties. Each Party is relying on his or her own judgment and each Party has been represented by independent counsel of its choosing.

- 8.8 Force Majeure. It is expressly understood and agreed by the Parties to this Agreement that if the performance of any obligations hereunder is delayed by reason of Force Majeure, the Party so obligated or permitted shall be excused from doing or performing the same during such period of delay, so that the time period applicable to such obligation or requirement shall be extended for a period of time equal to the period such Party was delayed.
- 8.9 Further Acts and Releases. The Parties agree to take such additional acts and execute such other documents as may be reasonable and necessary in the performance of their obligations hereunder.
- 8.10 Governmental Powers; Waiver of Immunity. By execution of this Agreement, the City does not waive or surrender any of its governmental powers, immunities or rights.
- 8.11 No Third Party Beneficiaries. The performance of the respective obligations of the Parties under this Agreement are not intended to benefit any party other than the City or Developer except as expressly provided otherwise herein. No person or entity not a signatory to this Agreement shall have any rights or causes of action against any Party to this Agreement as a result of that Party's performance or non-performance under this Agreement, except as expressly provided otherwise herein.
- 8.12 Notices. Any notice or other communication required or permitted by this Agreement (hereinafter referred to as the "Notice") is effective when in writing and (i) personally delivered either by hand or (ii) three (3) days after notice is deposited with the U.S. Postal Service, postage prepaid, certified with return receipt requested, and addressed as follows:

- 8.13 Relationship of Parties. The Parties shall not be deemed in a relationship of partners or joint ventures by virtue of this Agreement, nor shall any Party be an agent, representative, trustee or fiduciary of the other. No Party shall have any authority to bind any other Party to any agreement.

- 8.14 Severability. The Parties declare that the provisions of this Agreement are severable. If it is determined by a court of competent jurisdiction that any term, condition or provision hereof is void, voidable, or unenforceable for any reason whatsoever, then such term, condition or provision shall be severed from this Agreement and the remainder of the Agreement enforced in accordance with its terms. The Parties explicitly agree that this Clause 8.14 does not apply if the unenforceability relieves one Party from substantially all of its duties and obligations under this Agreement.
- 8.15 Time is of the Essence. Subject to the terms contained herein, time is of the essence in the performance of this Agreement.
- 8.16 Compliance with Law. All aspects of the construction and development of the Development shall be in substantial conformance with applicable state, federal and local laws.
- 8.17 Inspection. The City shall have access at all times to inspect construction of the Development.
- 8.18 No Alteration of Development Regulations. This Agreement is not intended to and does not waive or alter any development requirement imposed by City ordinances, City development regulations or other law.
- 8.19 Undocumented Workers. As required by Subchapter B of Chapter 2264 of the Texas Government Code, Developer certifies that to Developer's knowledge it does not and will not knowingly employ an undocumented worker. If after receiving a Grant Payment set forth in this Agreement Developer is convicted under 8 USC Section 1324(a)(6), Developer shall repay the amount of the Grant Payment (or portion that he has received) plus 10% interest not later than the 120th day after the date the City notifies Developer of the violation. Developer is not liable for a violation of this Section by a subsidiary, affiliate, or franchisee of Developer or by a person with whom Developer contracts.
- 8.20 Rough Proportionality; Nexus. Developer acknowledges and agrees that all prerequisites to such a determination of rough proportionality have been met, and that any costs incurred relative to said donation and dedication are related both in nature and extent to the impact of the Development. Developer waives and releases all claims against the City related to any and all rough proportionality and individual determination requirements mandated by Subchapter Z of Chapter 212, Texas Local Government Code, as well as other requirements of a nexus between development conditions and the projected impact of the Development.
- 8.21 Gift to Public Servant. Each Party hereto represents to the other that it has not offered, conferred, or agreed to confer and that it will not offer, confer or agree to confer in the future any benefit upon an employee or official of the other Party. For purposes of this Section, "benefit" means anything reasonably regarded as economic advantage, including benefit to any other person in whose welfare the beneficiary is interested, but does not

include a contribution or expenditure made and reported in accordance with law. Notwithstanding any other legal remedies, City may obtain reimbursement for any expenditures made to Developer as a result of the improper offer, agreement to confer, or conferring of a benefit to a City employee or official.

- 8.22 Interpretation. This Agreement shall not be construed against the drafting Party.
- 8.23 Limitation of Liability. In no event will either Party be liable to the other Party for any indirect, special, punitive, or exemplary damages.
- 8.24 Expedited Permit Review. The City agrees to expedite the review of any permits submitted by Developer related to the project that is the subject of this Agreement.
- 8.25 Anti-Boycott Verifications. Developer hereby verifies that it and its parent company, wholly- or majority-owned subsidiaries, and other affiliates, if any, do not boycott Israel and, to the extent this Agreement is a contract for goods or services, will not boycott Israel during the term of this Agreement. The foregoing verification is made solely to comply with Section 2271.002, Texas Government Code, and to the extent such section does not contravene applicable Federal law. As used in the foregoing verification, ‘boycott Israel’ means refusing to deal with, terminating business activities with, or otherwise taking any action that is intended to penalize, inflict economic harm on, or limit commercial relations specifically with Israel, or with a person or entity doing business in Israel or in an Israeli-controlled territory, but does not include an action made for ordinary business purposes. For purposes of this paragraph, Developer understands ‘affiliate’ to mean an entity that controls, is controlled by, or is under common control with Developer and exists to make a profit.
- 8.26 Iran, Sudan and Foreign Terrorist Organizations. Developer represents that neither it nor any of its parent company, wholly- or majority-owned subsidiaries, and other affiliates is a company identified on a list prepared and maintained by the Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts under Section 2252.153 or Section 2270.0201, Texas Government Code, and posted on any of the following pages of such officer’s internet website: <https://comptroller.texas.gov/purchasing/docs/sudan-list.pdf>, <https://comptroller.texas.gov/purchasing/docs/iran-list.pdf>, or <https://comptroller.texas.gov/purchasing/docs/fto-list.pdf>. The foregoing representation is made solely to comply with Section 2252.152, Texas Government Code, and to the extent such section does not contravene applicable Federal law and excludes Developer and each of its parent company, wholly- or majority-owned subsidiaries, and other affiliates, if any, that the United States government has affirmatively declared to be excluded from its federal sanctions regime relating to Sudan or Iran or any federal sanctions regime relating to a foreign terrorist organization. For purposes of this paragraph, Developer understands “affiliate” to mean any entity that controls, is controlled by, or is under common control with Developer and exists to make a profit.
- 8.27 Fossil Fuels Boycott Verification. As required by 2274.002, Texas Government Code (as added by Senate Bill 13, 87th Texas Legislature, Regular Session), as amended, Developer

hereby verifies that Developer, including any wholly-owned subsidiary, majority-owned subsidiary, parent company, or affiliate of the same, does not boycott energy companies, and will not boycott energy companies during the term of this Agreement. As used in the foregoing verification, "boycott energy companies" shall have the meaning assigned to the term "boycott energy company" in Section 809.001, Texas Government Code, as amended.

- 8.28 Firearms Discrimination Verification. As required by Section 2274.002, Texas Government Code (as added by Senate Bill 19, 87th Texas Legislature, Regular Session, SB 19), as amended, Developer hereby verifies that Developer, including any wholly-owned subsidiary, majority-owned subsidiary, parent company, or affiliate of the same, (i) does not have a practice, policy, guidance or directive that discriminates against a firearm entity or firearm trade association; and (ii) will not discriminate against a firearm entity or firearm trade association during the term of this Agreement. As used in the foregoing verification, "discriminate against a firearm entity or trade association" shall have the meaning assigned to such term in Section 2274.001(3), Texas Government Code (as added by SB 19), as amended.

a. Action regarding a Chapter 380 Economic Development Incentive Agreement with Blazing Hospitality (1005 N. Saginaw Blvd.)

Summary: The proposed agreement is a Chapter 380 Economic Development Incentive Agreement with Blazing Hospitality. It addresses the demolition of the existing building at 1005 N. Saginaw Blvd. The building has been vacant for many years. The purpose of the demolition is to support future development of the property. The agreement sets forth the City's participation which is an amount not to exceed \$25,000. This item was originally approved by the City Council at the October 18, 2022 meeting. The proposed agreement was not available at the time the meeting packet was prepared last October. Therefore, we are bringing this back to the Council for official approval. In addition, this property finally sold to Blazing Hospitality Group on May 4, 2023. The financial impact is not to exceed \$25,000 and will be paid from Account 01-6141-13 (Economic Development Incentive).

b. Action regarding Resolution No. 2023-11, City of Saginaw's Application to Texas Department of Transportation's 2023 Transportation Alternatives Set-Aside (TA) Call for Projects

Summary: In January of 2023, a Preliminary TA (Transportation Alternative) Set-Aside Grant Application was submitted to TXDOT for McLeroy Blvd Phase 3 from Knowles Drive to Business 287. On March 14, 2023, the City was notified that the preliminary application was reviewed and deemed eligible – allowing the City to continue to the next step, submitting a Detailed Application. For the Detailed Application to be submitted, the City must adopt a resolution in support of the application. If the Detailed Application is accepted, TXDOT would require a 20% local match and Saginaw would be responsible for all overruns and all non-reimbursable costs. The local match and other costs would be paid for with the 2021 Bond Funds.

c. Action regarding Ordinance No. 2023-18, Authorizing the Mayor to Execute a Quitclaim Deed Abandoning an Eight (8) Foot Utility Easement to Richard Linthicum, Owner of Lot 27, Block 1 of The Dominion Phase II

Summary: City Staff was contacted by Mr. Richard Linthicum, owner of 1120 Little John Drive, regarding the intent to remove an unused eight (8) foot utility easement at the rear of the property. Staff reviewed letters from the utilities company as well as any potential City utilities in the easement, and found there to be no conflict. The neighboring property went through a similar process in 2018.

Mayor Flippo stated that he received a request to pull Item 4a from the Consent Agenda for discussion.

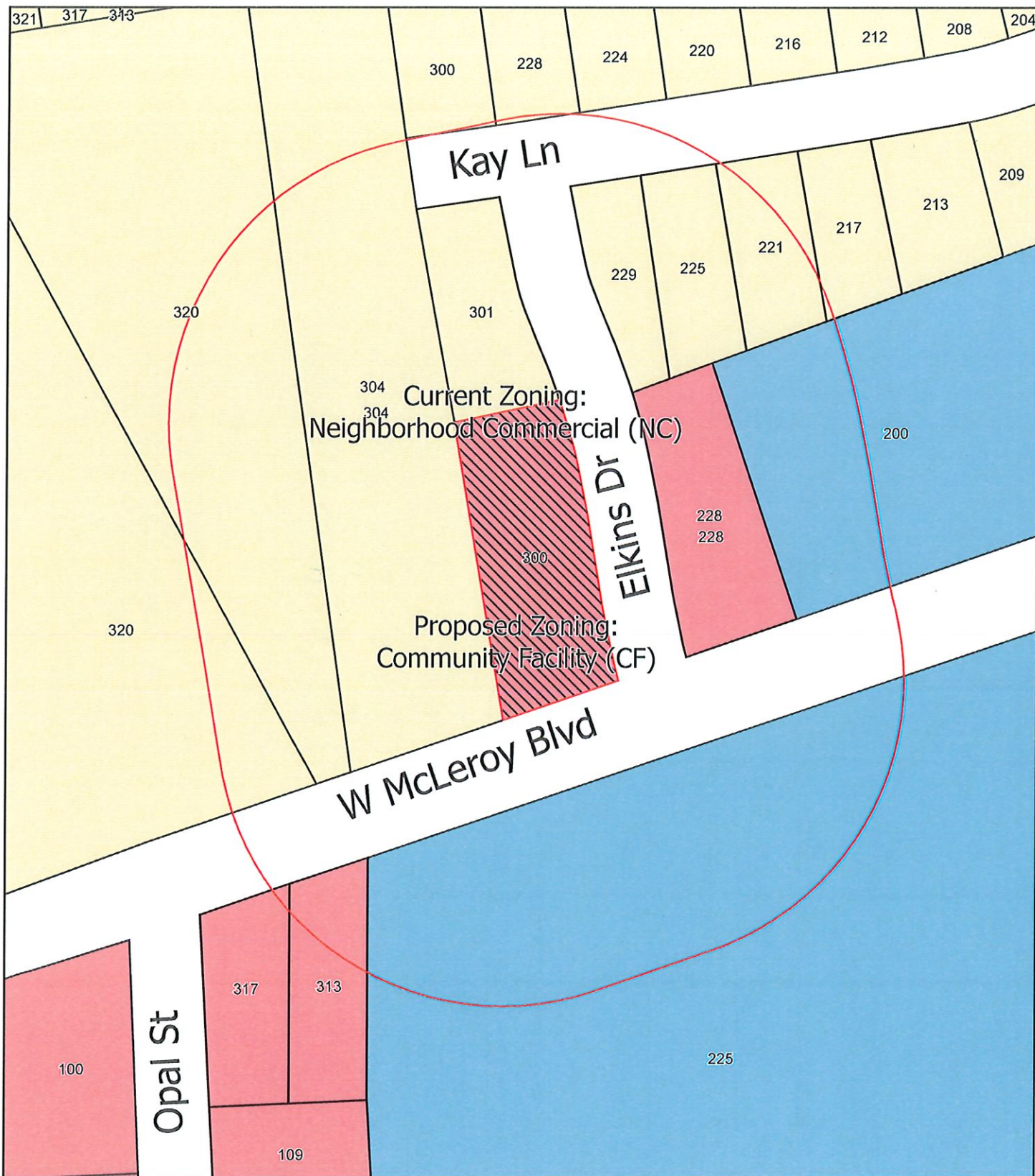

PURSUANT TO HB 3699; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.**

WHEREAS, the City of Saginaw is a home rule municipality acting under its charter adopted by the electorate pursuant to Article XI, Section 5, of the Texas Constitution and Chapter 9 of the Texas Local Government Code; and

WHEREAS, the 88th Regular Session of the Texas Legislature enacted House Bill 3699 (codified in Chapter 212 of the Texas Local Government Code), granting municipalities the authority to delegate the approval, approval with conditions, or disapproval of plats to designated officers or employees; and

WHEREAS, the City desires to streamline the administrative process while maintaining prudent oversight of plat approvals; and

WHEREAS, under the provisions of House Bill 3699, the governing body of a municipality is authorized to extend the 30-day period for plat approval by up to 30 days, subject to specific conditions.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SAGINAW, TEXAS, THAT:

SECTION 1

The City Council hereby delegates to the Planning Manager, or designee, the authority to approve, approve with conditions, or disapprove plats (as that term is defined in Chapter 212 of the Texas Local Government Code) within the jurisdiction of the City of Saginaw, in accordance with the provisions outlined in House Bill 3699. The Planning Manager shall exercise this authority consistent with all applicable laws, regulations, and ordinances.

SECTION 2

The City Council further authorizes the Planning Manager, or designee, to approve requests for extensions of the 30-day period described by the relevant subsections, as outlined in House Bill 3699, for one or more periods, each not to exceed 30 days, provided that the following conditions are met:

1. The applicant submits a written request for an extension of the plat approval period to the municipal authority responsible for plat approval or the governing body of the municipality, as applicable.
2. The Planning Manager, or designee, approves the extension request.

SECTION 3

This Resolution shall become effective from and after its passage.

ORDINANCE NO. 2023-__

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF SAGINAW, TEXAS, AMENDING CHAPTER 6, ARTICLE II OF THE SAGINAW CITY CODE; PROVIDING DEFINITIONS AND REGULATIONS GOVERNING ANIMAL RESCUE, FOSTERING, AND SERVICE ANIMALS IN THE CITY; PROVIDING THAT THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BE CUMULATIVE OF ALL ORDINANCES; PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; PROVIDING FOR A SAVINGS CLAUSE; PROVIDING A PENALTY CLAUSE; PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION IN THE OFFICIAL NEWSPAPER; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City of Saginaw, Texas (“City”), is a home rule city acting under its charter adopted by the electorate pursuant to Article XI, Section 5 of the Texas Constitution and Chapter 9 of the Local Government Code; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City has previously adopted Ordinance No. 2004-02, and codified as Chapter 6 of the Saginaw City Code, "Animals," which regulates the care and keeping of animals within the City; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has determined that it is in the best interest of the public to provide for comprehensive regulations governing the care, custody, and control of all domestic animals within the City; and

WHEREAS, for purposes of promoting the public health, safety and general welfare, the City Council desires to adopt regulations governing animal rescue organizations and animal foster homes; and

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to adopt provisions governing the care of service animals within the City.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SAGINAW, TEXAS, THAT:

SECTION 1.

Section 6-32, “Definitions” of Article II “Animal Control,” of Chapter 6 “Animals” of the Saginaw City Code is hereby amended to add new definitions to read as follows:

“Sec. 6-32. Definitions.

Animal control authority means the animal control department of the City.

Animal control officer means any employee or agent of the City assigned to the animal control authority or whose responsibilities include animal control.

Animal Foster Home means any residence that is registered with a 501c3 non-profit animal rescue or animal rescue organization for the purpose of temporarily housing domestic animals in need of adoption into a permanent household. The foster home must be inspected and approved by the rescue group and may be subject to inspection by Animal Services Center staff at any time.

Animal Foster Home Caregiver means a person who harbors fostered animals through an animal services-approved rescue group.

Approved Rescue Group or Animal Rescue Organization means any animal rescue group or animal rescue organization that has filed their 501C3 with the Saginaw Animal Services Adoption and Rescue Coordinator and is currently in compliance with Saginaw Animal Services standards of care, which include but are not limited to sterilization, vaccinations, or medical care, etc.

Service Animal means a dog trained to perform a task directly related to a person's disability. This definition does not include emotional support animals. Emotional support animals are not recognized by the Americans with Disabilities Act ("ADA") because providing emotional support or comfort is not a task related to a person's disability."

SECTION 2.

Chapter 6 "Animals," Article II "Animal Control," of the Saginaw City Code is hereby amended by adding a new section to read as follows:

"Sec. 6-39. Multi-Pet Household Permits.

- (a) *Number of Dogs and Cats Allowed.* Except as provided by this Section, no residence within the City shall harbor more than five (5) adult dogs, five (5) adult cats, or five (5) adult dogs and cats in any combination (for example, 4 dogs and 1 cat or 4 cats and 1 dog). No residence within the City shall harbor more than one litter of puppies or one litter of kittens over 4 months of age at any given time.
- (b) *Multi-Pet Permit.* Any person desiring to keep more than five (5) adult dogs and/or cats or more than one litter of puppies or kittens at a residence may apply with the animal control authority for a multi-pet permit allowing them to keep two (2) additional dogs or cats ("service animals" as defined in Sec. 6-32 will be counted in this number and are not exempt from registration). The applicant shall pay an application fee at the time of filing. The animal control authority is authorized to issue such a permit if the following conditions are met:
 - 1. An applicant provides the animal control authority with information concerning the maximum number of animals to be kept at any one time at such premises and a

record search indicates that there have been no enforcement actions for violations of this Section within the preceding twelve (12) months.

2. The applicant shall be the owner of the property. If the applicant is a renter/tenant of the property, they must provide a notarized letter from the property owner stating permission for the pets on the premises. This permission must be written, notarized, and must be provided annually or upon request of the animal services manager or their designee.
 3. The animal control authority inspects the property and deems it appropriate for housing multiple pets based on criteria including, but not limited to:
 - i. Facilities shall be of sufficient size as to allow each animal to move about freely. Size of the facility shall be in proportion to the size of the individual animal's height and weight.
 - ii. Adequate food and water must be provided so that each and all animals kept shall be maintained in good health and free of malnutrition and/or dehydration.
 - iii. The said premises shall be kept in a sanitary condition and reasonably free of animal waste, parasites, insects, and flies that could be harmful to the animal's health and/or to the health of the general public.
 - iv. The animals and the facility must be kept free of odor or stench which is offensive to a person of ordinary sensibilities.
 - v. The animals must be maintained in a manner which does not pose a danger to the health of the animals themselves or adjacent animals.
 - vi. The animals must not cause noise which is offensive or disturbing to a person of ordinary sensibilities on adjoining or adjacent premises.
 - vii. All animals must be vaccinated and must wear current rabies tags at all times in accordance with this Section.
 - viii. All animals at the residence must be sterilized.
 - ix. All animals at the residence must be microchipped, and proof of registration with a national database will be required at the time of application.
- (c) Fees for the issuance of a multi-pet permit shall be set by City Council.
- (d) Such permit may be revoked by the animal control authority for cause, including but not limited to, violations of the provisions of this Section or the inability of the permit holder to keep the animals in a healthy or sanitary environment.
- (e) Multi-pet permits must be renewed annually and each renewal will require inspection and approval by the animal control authority or its designee.

- (f) Any person either denied a multi-pet permit, or who has had their permit revoked, may file an appeal with the city manager or their designee. Such appeal must be made in writing within ten (10) days of receiving written notice from the animal control authority of the permit denial or revocation. If no appeal request is filed within the 10-day period, the denial or revocation of the permit becomes final. Upon receiving an appeal, the City Manager or their designee shall hold a hearing at a time and place of their designation. Based upon the recorded evidence of such hearing, the City Manager or their designee shall make a final finding.
- (g) *Changes in residence or ownership.* Multi-pet permits are issued for specific owners of a specific property. Application for a new multi-pet permit will be required if:
1. The original permit holder moves to a new residence within the city limits and wishes to keep more than five (5) adult dogs/cats or more than one litter of puppies/kittens on the new property, or if
 2. Ownership of the property for which a permit was originally issued changes and the new owners/tenants desire to keep more than five (5) adult dogs/cats or more than one litter of puppies/kittens.
- (h) *Complaints.* A person may file a complaint for violations of this Section with the animal control authority of the City. The report must be in writing and made under oath (notarized), and the report must include the following:
1. Name, address, and telephone number of complainant and other witnesses, if any;
 2. Date, time, and location of the incident forming the basis of the report;
 3. Description of the violation;
 4. Name, address, and telephone number of the animal owner, if known;
 5. A statement of facts upon which such report or application is based;
 6. Any other relevant facts or circumstances; and
 7. A Texas state notary stamp and signature.

The animal control authority, upon receipt of a report filed under this Section or upon learning of a violation, shall investigate the complaint and may issue sworn reports based on the animal control authority's investigation or observation.

- (i) *Filing of False Claims and Reports.* A person commits an offense if he knowingly initiates, communicates or circulates a claim of ownership for an animal with the Animal Services Manager or their designee that he knows is false or baseless. A person commits an offense if they knowingly initiate, communicate or circulate a report of a violation of City ordinance or State law with the Animal Services Manager or their designee that they know is false or baseless.

(j) *Revocation of Permit.* The Animal Services Manager or their designee may revoke any multi-pet permit after a hearing for any one or more of the following reasons:

1. Impoundment of a cat or dog by the City more than three times during a twelve-month period.
2. More than two (2) final convictions of a person for violating this Section.
3. Any combination of (1) and (2) totaling two (2) incidents.
4. Upon a determination that the cat or dog is a "dangerous animal" or "dangerous dog" as defined in this Section.

Upon revoking the multi-pet permit, the Animal Services Manager or their designee shall notify the applicant of said action in writing. Written notification shall be deemed made when a certified letter, return receipt requested, addressed to the last known mailing address of applicant is deposited in the U.S. mail.

Upon the expiration of ten (10) days after written notification of revocation is deposited in the U.S. Mail, as provided above, applicant will need to remove all excess animals over the limit allowed by ordinance (5 dogs or 5 cats, or any combination totaling 5) for a period of 12 months.

If found in violation for exceeding the limit, citations may be issued at the Animal Services Manager's or their designee's discretion. Every day a violation exists constitutes a new and separate violation."

SECTION 3.

Chapter 6 "Animals," Article II "Animal Control," of the Saginaw City Code is hereby amended by adding a new section to read as follows:

"Sec. 6-42. Animal Foster Home Requirements.

- (a) Fostered animals are to be provided with adequate food, water, shelter, and shade at all times.
- (b) The foster home must provide an area in which to segregate newly fostered animals until those animals can be socialized with other animals living in the foster home.
- (c) The number of animals allowed to be fostered at a location shall be based on adequate housing space as determined by the size of animals being housed, and should not be more than two (2) adult animals (dogs or cats), or no more than two litters (dogs or cats).

- (d) All cats and kittens over the age of sixteen (16) weeks who are fostered animals must be vaccinated against rabies.
- (e) All dogs and puppies over the age of sixteen (16) weeks who are fostered animals must be vaccinated against rabies.
- (f) Foster caregivers shall obtain a City license for any animal remaining in the home for more than ten (10) days. A fostered animal remaining in the home for more than one hundred twenty (120) days will no longer be considered a foster animal; such animals will be considered owned animals and owners will be required to meet all obligations of ownership. Rescue groups may apply to the Animal Services Manager or their designee for an extension of up to sixty (60) days. A second extension of up to (60) days may be granted at the discretion of the animal services manager.
- (g) The foster home shall keep records for each fostered animal, including a rabies certificate and documentation for the length of time the animal has been in the foster home. These records will be provided to the Animal Services Manager or their designee upon request.
- (h) The foster caregiver shall be the owner of the property where the foster home is located or have notarized written permission of the owner of the property in order to participate as a foster home. If the foster caregiver is a tenant and not the owner of the property, written, notarized permission from the property owner or management company must be provided annually or upon request of the Animal Services Manager or their designee.
- (i) The foster caregiver shall provide a letter from the rescue group stating they are an approved foster for the rescue group and provide proof of 501c3 status to the Animal Services Manager or their designee. This letter will also include the number(s), species, age, color and sex of the animal(s), sterilization proof (if completed, or estimated date of sterilization), and microchip number that is implanted in the animal.
- (j) *Foster Permit Fees.* Fees for the issuance of a foster permit shall be set by the City Council.
- (k) *Foster Home Complaints.* A person may file a complaint for violations of this Section with the animal control authority of the City. The report must be in writing and made under oath (notarized), and the report must include the following:
 - 1. Name, address, and telephone number of complainant and other witnesses, if any;
 - 2. Date, time, and location of the incident forming the basis of the report;
 - 3. Description of the violation;
 - 4. Name, address, and telephone number of the animal owner, if known;
 - 5. A statement of facts upon which such report or application is based;
 - 6. Any other relevant facts or circumstances; and
 - 7. A Texas state notary stamp and signature.

The animal control authority, upon receipt of a report filed under this Section or upon learning of a violation, shall investigate the complaint and may issue sworn reports based on the animal control authority's investigation or observation.

Foster homes shall consent to inspection of the premises by the Animal Services Manager or their designee during regular business hours in response to a complaint. The animal services officer who responds to a complaint at a registered foster home will inform the foster home of the nature of the complaint. Failure to rectify any violations within the period granted by the animal services officer will result in the suspension of a foster home's designation until the violations are corrected. The rescue group under which the foster home operates will be notified of any complaint and findings. The rescue group will remove the foster home from their approved foster home list if any violations are not remedied to the satisfaction of the Animal Services Manager or their designee.

- (i) *Filing of False Claims and Reports.* A person commits an offense if he/she knowingly initiates, communicates or circulates a claim of ownership for an animal with the Animal Services Manager or their designee that he/she knows is false or baseless. A person commits an offense if they knowingly initiate, communicate or circulate a report of a violation of City ordinance or State law with the Animal Services Manager or their designee that they know is false or baseless.
- (j) *Revocation of Permit.* The Animal Services Manager or their designee may revoke any multi-pet permit after a hearing for any one or more of the following reasons:
 - 1. Impoundment of a cat or dog by the City more than three (3) times during a twelve-month period.
 - 2. More than two (2) final convictions of a person for violating this Section.

- (k) Nothing in this Section shall be construed as excusing an animal foster home or an animal foster home caregiver from all other pertinent laws, including those prohibiting nuisances or disturbances.
- (l) A foster home will not be eligible for a foster permit if they currently have a multi-pet permit."

SECTION 4.

This Ordinance shall be cumulative of all other ordinances of the City and shall not repeal any of the provisions of such ordinances, except in those instances where provisions of such ordinances are in direct conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance.

SECTION 5.

It is hereby declared to be the intention of the City Council that the sections, paragraphs, sentences, clauses, and phrases of this Ordinance are severable, and if any phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph, or section of this Ordinance shall be declared void, ineffective, or unconstitutional by the valid judgment or decree of any court of competent jurisdiction, such voidness, ineffectiveness, or unconstitutionality shall not affect any of the remaining phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs, or sections of this Ordinance, since the same would have been enacted by the City Council without the incorporation herein of any such void, ineffective or unconstitutional phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph, or section.

SECTION 6.

All rights or remedies of the City are expressly saved as to any and all violations of the City Code; any amendments thereto that have accrued at the time of the effective date of this Ordinance; and as to such accrued violations, and all pending litigation, both civil or criminal, same shall not be affected by this Ordinance but may be prosecuted until final disposition by the courts.

SECTION 7.

Any person, firm, or corporation who violates any provision of this Ordinance as adopted by the City Council of the City shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine as provided in Section 1-13 of the Saginaw City Code. Each day any such violation or violations exist shall constitute a separate offense and shall be punishable as such.

SECTION 8.

The City Secretary of the City is hereby directed to publish at least twice in the official newspaper of the City, the caption and the penalty clause of this Ordinance in accordance with Section 52.013(b) of the Local Government Code.

SECTION 9.

This Ordinance shall take effect immediately from and after its passage and publication in accordance with the provisions of the laws of the State of Texas.
