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Overview

WHAT IS INPATIENT CARE?

Inpatient care refers to a hospital stay. When a treatment requires close monitoring (especially after the procedure), some clinics transfer their patients to another facility managed by the same hospital group.





WHAT IS OUTPATIENT CARE?

Any procedure or visit that does not involve an overnight hospital stay, such as blood tests, imaging tests, or medication administration.

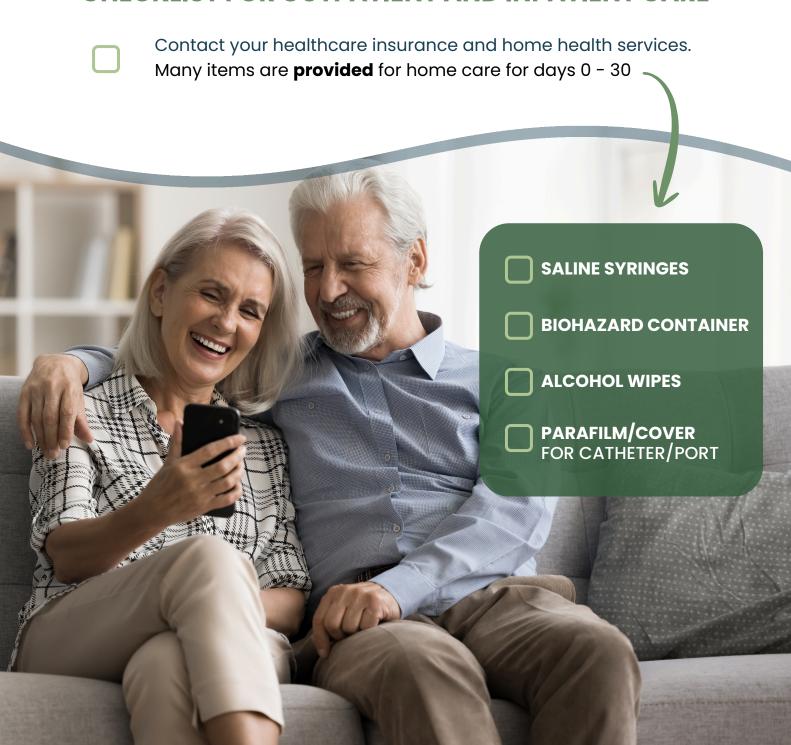
