

YouTube Scripts

YouTube is still considered a trend, eventually it'll go away.

This will work for anything related to YouTube & any platform that might replace it

Writing is writing, sales is sales

Best way to study youtube writing → look at trending, or most viewed, study the pattern

Copywriting is related to pattern recognition.

In YouTube, the pattern is in the title.

“Top ten...”

Top ten list works well.

“Top ten rags to riches stories.”

“X vs Y”

Example: Sony vs canon

“This vs. that” scripts work very well.

Trends on youtube

If there's a new trend but it's still relatively new, you can get into the bandwagon early and make high-quality content.

If you wrote/recorded in 24 hours you can jump on a trendy subject and a lot of people will search for it.

“Telling a story.”

A story relevant to your niche will do very well

“Bait and switch”

It's when you tell them something obviously wrong “why you should never water your plants”

The script will have a punchline talking about watering plants, but certain plants can not need to be watered.

“Reaction videos”

Taking advantage of viral clips, reacting to them, commenting, or watching them.

“How-to...”

Good content, it'll help people engage.

“Everything wrong with...”

Pessimism or negativity grabs attention.

These things are not individually exclusive, they can be stacked together.

Thesis = idea you're trying to convey, you can convey it in all sorts of packages.

If you're trying to teach about a niche relative to expertise, package it in a youtube script

This is like a menu of options to play around with.

Social currency → if I share it with my friends, they'll think better of me.

Give people a nugget of info in each top 10, it'll give them info to show off with.

Nuggets → memorable and shareable

You need to know the:

- Reference
- Name of topics
- Interesting facts
- Transitions

It's interesting to listeners and viewers, but it's predictable to copywriters.

At the end, add soft CTA. “like, subscribe, click here for discount code”
