





When we talk about technology being biased, socially corrosive, or downright exploitative, we are actually talking about what the humans behind the tech programmed it to do. Be it through naïve techno-positivism, Silicon Valley hubris, corporate greed, or all of the above. The problem, of course, is that technology is always a force multiplier. When we make machine learning software that categorizes people based on available cultural data, we get anti-Semitic Facebook algorithms, racist search engines, or corporations using behavioural marketing to sway public opinion about global warming on an unprecedented scale.

When we talk about machines being malevolent, computers being cruel, or algorithms being evil, we are really saying: Look what we taught the machines to do.


