

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ABOUT MICHIGAN STATE UNIVERSITY

Michigan State University is a public research institution in East Lansing, Michigan on the banks of the Red Cedar River. Founded in 1855, MSU served as a model for land-grant universities, which was later created by the Morrill Act in 1862. The university began as the Agricultural College of the State of Michigan, one of the only institutions of higher education to teach scientific agriculture. Today, MSU is one of the largest universities in the US with over **50,000 enrollments** and over **550,000** living alumni from 138 countries. In Fall 2017, MSU had the largest African-American freshman class in the Big Ten and also welcomed a record number of freshmen who identify as Hispanic.

As a member of the Big Ten Conference, MSU prides ourselves in sportsmanship as well as academic integrity. MSU pioneered in the studies of packaging, hospitality business, supply chain management and communication sciences. Additionally, Michigan State is frequently ranked among the top 30 public universities in the US and the top 100 research universities. On campus, the university houses the W.J Beal Botanical Garden, the Abrams Planetarium, the Wharton Center for Performing Arts, the Eli and Edythe Broad Art Museum, the Facility for Rare Isotope Beams, and the country's largest residence hall system. In addition to these buildings on campus. Michigan State is also home to the Kellogg Hotel and Conference Center where it doubles as a 4-star hotel and business-friendly conference center. It is a learning laboratory for students in the School of Hospitality Business and other majors. Furthermore, MSU also contains three residential colleges - James Madison College, Lyman Briggs College and Residential College of Arts and Humanities.

Throughout history, activism has played a significant role on MSU's campus. During the Vietnam War, student protests created coed residence halls and blocked the routing of Interstate 496 through campus. In the 1980s, students convinced the University to divest the stocks of companies conducting business in apartheid South Africa from its endowment, such as Coca-Cola. In light of recent events, with Larry Nassar and Richard Spencer, the students, staffs and faculties have once again united to address campus climate. Here at MSU, we have many student groups focused on political change and advocacy work to better the community that each organization serves.

Behind these organizations we had leaders, whether it was students, staffs or faculties, who had passion for the cause. Maggie Chen-Hernandez has been at MSU for over 25 years both as a student and a professional in the division of student affairs. During her time here, she organized an APA Student Conference and invited students from across the Midwest to attend. The conference serves as the **precursor** to the **birth of MAASU** and to this day, *MAASU* exists for us to learn about our past, ourselves, and our community.



In addition to Maggie Chen-Hernandez, we also have many other alumni from MSU that have impacted our communities. Jasmine Rivera is a Filipina-American who graduated from MSU as an aspiring filmmaker. She graduated in 2003 and is currently a director, writer and producer at the Anawin Productions. She directed a film called American Prophet, which tells the story of a civil rights activist named Bishop Gumbleton. Dr. Kevin Nadal was a graduate student of MSU. He is a leading scholar on issues regarding micro aggression, Filipino American identity and LGBTQ community in the US. Marc Johnston, a currently assistant professor at The Ohio State University in the Department of Educational Studies. Johnston received his undergraduate degree and his masters from MSU. His research centers around the meanings of diversity, especially in relation to Asian Pacific Islanders Americans and mixed race college students. A recent graduate of MSU, Representative Sam Singh represents the 69th district in Michigan, which includes the City of East Lansing. With immigrant parents, Singh was taught many valuable lessons and he is constantly giving back to his communities. Singh is the FIRST Indian-American to serve as a state representative. As you can see MSU has a deep and rich history of supporting APIA students and developing leaders.

APIA PRESENCE

Here on campus, we have about 1,946 (5% of student population) Asian Pacific Islander American students enrolled in Fall of 2016, which does not include the international students. In addition to the number of students enrolled, MSU has many student organizations some of which are dedicated to APIA cultures, networking opportunities, career development and many more.

Within MSU, Asian Pacific American Student Organization (APASO) is a member of the Council of Racial and Ethnic Students (CORES), which is under the Office of Cultural and Academic Transitions. Within CORES, there are 4 student groups, including, APASO, Black Student Alliance (BSA), Culturas de las Razas Unidas (CRU) and North American Indigenous Student Organization (NAISO). As CORES, **We** work together to serve the people we represent on MSU's campus and with administration. As APASO, we focus on promoting APIA awareness, excellence, and service to our community and we collaborate with other marginalized groups on campus to ensure that our voices and concerns are heard.

In 1982, APASO was founded by **student activists** who were deeply affected by the **death of** Vincent Chin in Detroit. To this day, APASO has been on MSU's campus for more than three decades. For the 2017-18 academic year, we celebrated the 35th year of APASO's existence and the remembrance of the death of Vincent Chin, honoring him by being active, present and aware.

We provide resources for these organizations and collaborate on events. Annually, we have a performance in the spring to showcase APIA excellence, heritage and cultures. This demonstration of heritage started in 1990 with the name Cultural Vogue. In February 2018, APASO presented the 16th Cultural Vogue at the Wharton Center, that was held as a biennial event but became annual in 2018.



KEYNOTE SPEAKER



Sam Singh

Singh serves in the Michigan House of Representatives in the 69th House District and is the FIRST Indian-American representative in Michigan. He is serving his third term and is the House Democratic Leader. Prior to serving in the Legislature, Singh was elected to the East Lansing City Council at the age of 24. He was on council for 10 years and served a term as mayor. From a young age Singh was taught by his parents to give back to his community. He took the lesson to heart as he saw his parents, who immigrated from India, working hard to provide a good life for him and his brother.

Helen Zia

Helen Zia is an award-winning author, journalist, activist and Fulbright

Scholar. Zia is a Chinese-American fighting for Asian Americans and LGBTQ rights. Her book, Asian American Dreams: The Emergence of an American People, focuses on the contemporary struggles of Asian American communities being a full participant in this American democracy. Her work on 1980s civil rights campaign against anti-Asian violence is documented in the Academy Award nominated film, "Who Killed Vincent Chin?".



Tammy Duckworth

Ladda Tammy Duckworth is a military leader, U.S Representative and activist. Duckworth is the first disabled female

veteran to be elected to the U.S. House of Representatives and the Senate. She is also the second female Asian-American senator, Duckworth was born in Bangkok. Thailand to a mother of Chinese heritage and a father of British descent. She was deployed to serve in the Iraq War in 2004 and lost her legs due her helicopter being struck. In 2012, she was elected to Congress to representative Illinois' 8th District. In 2016, she was elected to the Senate. In January of 2018, Duckworth announced the expectancy of her second daughter in April. It would make her the first senator to give birth while holding office.

He currently continues to perform across the United States and is an

active Asian American community organizer.

D'Lo is a queer, transgender Tamil-Sri Lankan-American actor, writer, and comedian. His works ranges from stand-up comedy, solo theater, plays, films, and music production, poetry, and spoken word. D'Lo is the creator of the "Coming Out, Coming Home" writing workshop series that took place in South Asian and/or Immigrant LGBTQ Organizations nationally. The workshop serves as a transformative space for participants to write through their personal narratives and share their truths through public reading.





Fung Bros

Fung Bros are David and Andrew Fung. From a young age, they were fascinated by hip-hop, comedy and food. As children of immigrant parents, they faced the push-and-pull of meeting their parents' wishes and pursing what they love. After college, the two brothers pursued a career in both stand-up and YouTube. By 2015, the Fung Bros have been featured in the New York Times, NPR, the Cooking Channel and Travel Channel. In 2015, they also got their own cable TV food-travel show on the FYI Network called "What the Fung?!".

Ruby Ibarra

Ruby Ibarra was born in the Philippines. From a young age, she submerged in the melting pot of Bay Area in California. As an adolescent, her surrounding introduced her to a wide array of cultures. Experiences. and more importantly: hip hop, which resonated with her. As a teenager, she starting crafting her own rhymes and developed her own style. She also picked up music production and started performing publicly at colleges and local



venues. Ibarra's talent and work ethic has allowed her to be featured on Buzzfeed, NPR and Huffington Post. In her world, she shares her story and showcase to the world her message.
