A BIT OF BURMESE LORE

The Government of Burma does not encourage tourism. Limited to one week only, visas, few travelers are not visiting Burma. The government places severe restrictions on the areas which may be visited, due the danger from one or another of the many insurgent groups. In spite of this, the people are polite, kind, fun-loving, happy to see you and will be willing to show you around. Burma is still untouched by Western life; you will not be engulfed by hordes of tourists taking photographs and monopolizing the time of your guides. Both Burmese men and women have retained the ir traditional dress. The men wear a cotton or silk pa-see (sarong type dress) over a collarless shirt, a very smart short-length jacket known as the ingyi. Women wear a similar style of longyi (sarong) in assorted colors; whereas men stick to either plain colors or checked type of patterns. With the longyi, the women wear ingyi (blouses).

The kyat (pronounced jut) is divided into 100 pyas. At the official rate of exchange there are 6.80 K's to the dollar, although on theopen market people are willing to give K*s 15-18 for a dollar.


