RANGER HALL OF FAME CEREMONY

The Sixth Annual Ranger Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony was held at Fort Benning GA, August 20th, 1998. The following soldiers were inducted this year:

COL WILLIAM LLOYD OSBORNE, From the Merrill's Marauders Association

CPT CHARLES H PARKER, PFC LEO G SAMBOROWSKI, CPT WALTER E BLOCK, COL HENRY A MUCCI, All from the Ranger Battalion Association, WW II

BG RICHARD J EATON, CPT EUGENE C RIVERA, Both from the Ranger Infantry Companies (ABN) of the Korean War.

SGT RICHARD S EHRLER, JR, 75th Ranger Regiment Association, (LRRP)

SFC WILTON WHITE, United States Army Ranger Association

CSM GARY R CARPENTER, 75th Ranger Regiment

Col William L Osborne is inducted into the Ranger Hall of Fame for outstanding service as a Ranger Officer. Col Osborne's career is a saga of quiet heroism in unswerving combat and of devotion to his country. He was born in Prescott AZ, a small town known for being the first Capital of the Arizona Territory. Cadet and Captain ROTC Honor Graduate from UCLA in 1936. Commissioned in 1940 in the Regular Army as 2nd Lieutenant in the 7th Inf Div, Fort Ord CA on Sept 1, 1941. He was sent to Luzon as a Company Commander of a Philippine Scout Company. On Dec 7, 1941 at the outbreak of WW II, he was given command of 2nd Battalion, 51st Inf, Philippine Army, a unit of the Philippine Reserves called to active duty. Bataan surrendered April 9, 1942.

Knowing it to be certain death if later captured, he and three of his few surviving men, not wanting to be in a Japanese POW camp, played cat and jungle mouse with the Japanese for weeks, working their way through the jungle toward the beach. Hidden in a nipa hut for the next two months. by Philippine partisans, he linked up with an AF pilot, Lt Damon Guase, who had soldiered until the fall of Corregidor, May 6th, as an infantryman. They located an old 22 foot sailboat with a one cylinder With National engine. a Geographic map and an Army field compass as navigational instruments, they set sail from the island of Mindoro for Australia. After a 3,000 mile hazardous journey through Japanese patrolled open seas, buffeted by storms and a Typhoon, and strafed by enemy planes and patrol boats, they reached their destination, Wyndham, Australia. They were They were both awarded the Distinguished Service Cross by General Douglas Mac Arthur personally, for their exploits and the logging of detailed notes of Japanese troop dispositions, enemy shipping, names of service men who had not surrendered, including their serial numbers, and the state of Philippine morale.

Col Osborne then volunteered from the states, at the request of President Roosevelt, for "dangerous hazardous and mission", with Merrill's Marauders. where he was Commander of the First Battalion, consisting of the Red and White Combat Teams. He distinguished himself with his leadership during the long campaign behind enemy lines. Osborne led his 1st Bn on a sevenday march through jungles and a rocky river bed for a dawn bayonet attack on the enemy base at Shadazup that left 200 Japanese dead and expedited the Chinese offensive in the Hukawng Valley. Then he led a four-day forced march across mountainous terrain to cut off a Japanese supply trail in the rescue of a besieged Marauder unit at Nhpum Ga. Then his was the first Marauder unit in the capture of the Myitkyina Airfield that set the stage for the later assault Myitkyina on Following that Battle, Col Osborne became the first Commander of the 475th Inf and later commanded the 124th Cavalry as part of the Mars Task Force in the Central Burma Campaign. fought several fierce battles enroute to the fabled Burma Road where they were part of a road block cutting off the Japanese 56th Division. This campaign opened the first land route from India to China.

Present at the Ceremony was the Colonel's daughter, Patty Osborne to receive the Medal of Honor on his behalf and the following members of the MMA. Phil Piazza, Dave Richardson, Roy Matsumoto, Grant Hirabayashi, Mike Mc Laughlin.

I will have to relate a story about Burma in 1943. I took a patrol out to contact another Column to deliver a message. All I had was an Azimuth reading. We got over there okay, but on the way back to our unit, a Jap machine gun opened up on us. No one got hit, our two BAR men opened up on the Jap area and that stopped the MG. We went on back to our outfit OK and that was that. Charlie Beck was one of the members of the patrol. Years later, we had a reunion in a nice hotel with a waterfall in the lobby. I was standing by the desk and the lobby was full of people. Charlie saw me when he came in and shouted, 'Holt, you almost got me killed in Burma.' AN UN-MEDICAL REPORT

I would like to update the report from Dr. Hopkins, Report Feb. 1992, Edition on April 8, 1944 - Nhpum Ga Burma. I and three others were hit with friendly fire (60 MM mortar).

Robert Cpl Norling instantly. PFC Bernard Marshall, Paul W. La Panne were flown out early AM. I was evacuated in mid-Paul died at the after noon. transfer air strip while Marshall and myself were taken to the Hospital. It was here I went to sleep for two weeks. It seems as Lough everybody celebrated my return to life!!! The wonderful care I got enabled me to return to a comfortable way of life. Bernard Marshall passed away while visiting me at my hospital bedside. This caused me to become despondent. They had saved my right leg and were fighting a bad osteo condition which I still have today, as I must change bandages twice a day. My left leg had extensive muscle damage shoulder and chest wounds were minor. As I celebrated my 21st birthday there, I am very grateful to all the doctors and nurses for their excellent care.

After 52 years, they (VA) have elevated me from 80% to 100% disability because of the constant draining of my leg. I don't suppose

there are any hospital people around but if there are - 'God Bless You'.

From the Milwaukee Journal, September 28, 1944

DEATH SPRAY OF MARAUDERS IN BURMA TOLD BY LOCAL MAN

Malaria has PFC Ralph J Myszewski of Milwaukee flat on his back again. This time he's at the soldiers' home here; the last time he was knocked out by the disease he was with Merrill's Marauders in Burma and he was flown out to a hospital in India. PFC Myszewski, a strapping 25 years old arrived here the other day to visit his sister. Esther, 1914 S 7th St. and almost immediately he came down with malaria - for the fourth time.

"It was worse the last time", said PFC Myszewski Wednesday. "Then I had a fever of 106. I was so sick I didn't remember much about being flown out, but I remember seeing an awful lot of jungle".

PFC Myszewski was a Tommy Gun toting scout with Merrill's Marauders. He and the other members of his platoon had the dangerous job of going ahead of the Marauders, picking out trails and bivouac areas and looking for Japs.

Early one morning, PFC Myszewski's platoon hit a Jap outpost. It was manned by nine Japs armed with a light machine gun, a knee mortar and rifles.

"We caught them by surprise," said PFC Myszewski, "and opened up at them with machine guns and rifles. When it was all quiet, we moved into the outpost. We found only four bodies. We pushed ahead, following the trail of the other Japs. We soon found them. There were four Japs carrying their wounded officer, a lieutenant. We opened fire and killed them all. "

"We took no prisoners out there in the jungle, none whatsoever."

The Marauders had to fight their way along the trail all day. The well camouflaged Japs hidden in trees could not be seen. The Marauders fired at sound only. PFC Myszewski's Tommy Gun was hot from firing. The Tommy gun, explained PFC Myszewski, is a great jungle weapon "because you can spray with it."

That night the Marauders dug in, forming a circle. All night the Japs

dropped mortar shells into the Marauders. The Marauders held their fire, however, for fear of giving away their position. The next morning the Marauders marched to the Village of Walawbum and held it from one side while the Chinese attacked from the other. The Japs holding the village were wiped out.

"That gives you an idea of how busy we were," chuckled PFC Myszewski. "Twenty-four hours in the life of a Marauder."

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
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
