WHO SAYS OLD FOLKS CAN'T CHANGE? NOW READ THIS!

The 53rd Annual Reunion of the Merrill's Marauders Association will take place in Nashville, Tennessee on Labor Day Weekend, September 3-5th, at the Nashville Airport Marriott.

Situated in a campus setting amid 17 acres of rolling wooded hills the Nashville Airport Marriott has some of Music City's most comfortable accommodations. It's only five minutes from the famous Opryland and ten minutes from downtown via Interstate 40.

Phil Piazza, Marauder President, calls the Nashville Airport Marriott Hotel "one of the best places we have ever scheduled a reunion."

According to Board of Directors member, Mike McLaughlin, who helped Phil select the hotel, it overlooks a large enclosed outdoor plaza containing one of the hotel's two swimming pools. There are four tennis courts, an indoor pool, a fitness center and acres of free parking.

Standing 18 stories high with 400 rooms, the hotel offers what



BOMBING RAIDS OVER MYITKYINA

Pictured are photos from Alex Adair, who has certified that they were from his personal "Hands On" experience as a member of a flight crew in a B-25, during a bombing the 81st Bomb mission by Squadron, of the 1st Bomb Group, the assigned target of on Myitkyina, Burma, on July 1944. The squadron operated from their base in Feni, India

Adair was the photographer on this mission and was 'plying his trade' with a vintage Leica, 35 mm camera, which he retains in his possession to this day. He was sprawled on his belly and hanging half way out of an open fuselage hatch snapping these pictures at 1/1000 of a second shutter speed. He said that his body was being buffeted by very strong air currents. He had only a single rope type harness around his torso, held by a crew member which kept him from falling away with the bombs dropping towards the Myitkyina target.

WAR DIARY - 81st Squadron FENI, India

Month of July 1944,

Prepared by Raymond L Hall, Sgt, 81st Squadron

23, First Mission from our new base was completed today. We bombed MYITKYINA with a nine ship formation led by Lt Sporer. The results were reported as very good with a beautifully laid pattern. Photos revealed later though that our bombs fell about 750' south of the target. The bombing apparently was considered effective though because the Group received a message from Major General Davidson of 10th Force Air Headquarters "Stilwell stating delighted with today's work." Our bombs caused a big explosion in the area. Lt Sauer flying No. 15 had to force land at Imphal when one engine started to cut out.

Our camp is coming along in fine shape now with our mess halls, offices, and living quarters in good repair Now that the move is complete, we can settle down to normal living once more. We now have movies nightly at our mess hall. We had "Adventures of Tartu" tonight.

Details from John Garlewsky, I & R Platoon Leader, 2nd Bn. 5307th will provide some of them herewith.

This is in reply to the question about the bombing of the 2nd Bn line, facing the enemy, in which the I & R, 2nd Bn received the full brunt of the drep.

I can't give the date, but will provide the approximate date and a drawing of the area involved.

The enclosed sketch would look like this: Our lines extended East to West, from the river to a dirt road, approximately 100 yards, then continuing on other side of dirt road. The entire rear of our lines were wooded or jungle. Whereas to our front, the entire area cleared, by constant fire fights, daily attacks by both sides, vegetation was all knocked down. It was a stalemate for quite a while.

A few trees left on the high ground and Myitkyina just down the road from there.

If a photo was taken of this run, then it occurred the latter part of

June and was carried out by three B-25s in formation.

On the first run, the bombs were dropped on my platoon, the only part of the line that was hit. I understand that there was second bombing run, right after the first one, but it was not dropped on our line.


This was a relatively low level bombing run, and as shown in sketch, our lines were a handshake away from the nearest Jap pill boxes. The cleared areas sloped gently upward so the enemy was looking down our throats. I hope this helps. Take Care! service was being conducted for our casualties. They were being buried just behind the 209th Combat Engineers, Line Defense. The Jap one gun artillery piece, known as "Whiz Bang" greeted us daily with a few rounds at about 1700 hours. They did it again during the Burial service. That accounted for the very short service. I had gone through the New Guinea campaign with the 129th Ins, of the 32nd Div when I joined the Marauders. I had joined the Army on March the 1st. 1940. I took a bust from Sgt in Feb. 1942 to join a Combat unit. The 32nd as you may know was a N Y Division, I was the only Regular Army soldier in my company. I joined the 5307th in September, 1943 and was first assigned to K Company, 3rd Bn, then Hq/Hq Co. I left Myitkyina on the 19th of July 1944. I was the first man of the first ten men to be sent back to the States, res m y name starta with a 1 It's the first time I was ever first on any list. We had the choice of flying by "Junk" air craft or go by ship. Seven of us chose to fly.

I stayed in the service until April 1953 - went through Korea with the 1st Cavalry. The last Marauder that I saw or heard from was Vic. (can't recall his name) He was from New Orleans, LA. That was September 1944, until Mrs Weston called me in September 1998. For the past 45 years, I have lived in West Texas. My wife came down with Alzheimer's in 1990. She passed away in April 1998.

I am living in Lake Belton, just across from Ft Hood, Texas. If you have any record of any of the 5307th living in this area, please let me know. I am planning on going to the next Reunion. My name is Brenda Spickard. I am requesting your help if you can provide it. For the past months, I have been researching the China, Burma, India Theater of World War II, trying to find out the details of my Uncle's death and the history of his unit.

I sent for his personnel records but the only information on them was that he was killed during the Battle of Myitkyina. His unit was situated at the Junction of the Mogaung and Sumprabum Roads, when he was killed on June 16, 1944. (His body was never recovered)

In his file, his name is listed with 14 others who were also killed or missing at this battle. Some were from his unit (HQ 209th Engineers (Combat) Bn and others were from the 5307th Composite Unit (Provisional). So I assume that they were together at that location.

Also in a diary, of one of the men from his unit, he stated that Merrill's men were teaching them how to use Infantry weapons. So I know I a baking in the right area.

CHARLTON OGBURN. a lieutenant in Merrill's 5307/1/HQ/COMM O, 403 Hancock St, Beaufort SC, 29902-4717, 803-524-9350, died October 19, 1998 at his home, at the age of 87. Ogburn's book, first published in 1956, later republished in paperback, focused new public attention on the exploits of our fighting force, and has ever since been accepted as the classic human account of the Burma Mission. A native of Atlanta and a graduate of Harvard, Ogburn served 11 years in the State Department, following World War II, resigning upon publication of the Marauder book, to devote full time to writing. In all, he wrote 14 books on such varied themes as Shakespeare's possible real identity and nature along America's southeast coast. But to the year he died, Ogburn maintained a lively interest in the Marauders. He was instrumental in the organization acquiring the status that it has today. He had nine major operations in recent vears and died of asphyxiation.

SHARING THE STORY

MEDIC'S STORY

One of the least known battlefields in World War II was the setting for the unique, legendary fighting force known as Merrill's Marauders in Burma. Merrill's Marauders, was a regiment sized unit - officially the 5307th Composite Unit (Provisional), code-named "Galahad".

A long-range deep-penetration unit, the Marauders fought behind Japanese lines, being supplied solely by parachute drops.

The unit campaigned in some of the most rugged mountainous jungle terrain in the world, where the humid heat was as high as 104 degrees. The unit's ranks were decimated by a range of jungle diseases including scrub typhus and malaria.

One of those who survived was Robert J Mulvaney, now 76, of David's Isle Road, Weymouth.

Mulvaney entered the army in 1942. Trained as a medical technician, Mulvaney went with his unit, the 44th Portable Surgical Hospital, to Oran, Algeria, in 1943. "We boarded ship in Oran headed for the China - Burma - India Theater of Operations on 26 November 1943, but were hit off the cost by a German glider bomb. Our ship, a British troop transport, was loaded not only with our unit but Indian troops as well. A total of

1,125 men died including 18 of 33 men in our unit, plus loss of equipment," Mulvaney recalled. The Weymouth man spent 2 1/2 hours in the water before being picked up by an American minesweeper.

"The hospital unit I was with was attached to the Marauders and we performed under extremely difficult conditions," Mulvaney said.

Those included using a canvas stretcher as an operating table and an air-supply drop parachute

as a shelter from the sun and the monsoon rains.

The disease rate was terrific among the men. "Nearly 80 percent of our losses were from typhus, which was rampant in that country," he said.

The terrain in the mountains was so steep that even the Missouri mules used by the Marauders were unable to cope with it.

"Mules' loads had to be off loaded and packed over some trails by the men," Mulvaney said.

During his time in Burma, Mulvaney said, he was scared all the time by "the extremely accurate Japanese shelling and the awe-inspiring thunder and lightning storms."

By the time the unit took part in its' last major battle in Burma, the siege of Myikyina, which was wrested from the Japanese the Marauders were a spent force.

"Every man remaining should have been hospitalized. During the approach march to Myitkyina, even if you were barely able to keep up, you were required to 'march off' the effects of malaria or be left behind," Mulvaney said. Mulvaney lives at 3 David's Island Road, Weymouth MA 02191-2113.

OVERSEAS SHIPMENT OF MULES TO SOUTH PACIFIC & INDIA

THE MOVEMENT OF MULES FROM BURMA TO CHINA

Randy Colvin, Historian for the 612th & 613th F A BNS (Pk) is seeking information on the shipment of mules from the States to South Pacific and/or India, also movement of mules from Burma to China. He has info on the 612th, they took three boat loads of mules from New Orleans to Calcutta via the Mediterranean-Red Seas.

The 33rd QM PK TR took a load of mules and the boat was sunk. All men saved, all mules lost.

Reports say the 31st, 35th and 37th took mules to India, we have no ship names, or dates.

The 97th, 98th and 99th FA Bns had mules in South Pacific, who took mules overseas for them and what dates.

For 45 years, he believed that the 612th and 613th men took one group of mules from Burma to China and all mules were shot due to contacting a disease. Later information shows that at least three other groups also were taken from Burma to China. One of these groups also were shot, the other two groups were put in a corral and the men took off due to Civil War in China. If you have any information on either of these mule movements, please drop me a line.
