The enclosed photo is a section of a 4" x 5" print that I had around the house since WW II. I believe that I made this shot. I made at least three photo flights per month flown by the 71st Liaison Squadron. This entitled me to "flight pay" and since I was already receiving "Combat Infantryman's Pay", I was a double dipper. Some paymaster clerk in Rear Echelon took notice and I was given my choice of one bonus payment. I chose the CIB.


These shots were made for the P-40 dive bombers. One of the photographers would get coordinates and go up in an L-5 to pinpoint specific Jap positions. The C.O. of the 71st Liaison Squadron was bucking for a Presidential Unit Citation for the group. He decided to do the photography himself, which added to their other accomplishments might embellish their claim.


He was shot down. Perhaps not being qualified in aerial photography, he made too many passes over the target. You may recall that many of the Japanese Arisaka Rifles had a front sight that could be adjusted to lead an airplane. It is surprising that the device was not picked up for our weapons. After all, the Jerry Can and our entrenching tool came from the German Army.

On the road at the bottom of the photo can be seen a Jap riding a bicycle and a group hauling light artillery or heavy machine guns in carts. They may be ox carts but there are no oxen visible. They were eaten, I'm sure by the enemy.

The Jap positions were dug in under the elevated road across from the rice paddies. It is the road to the Waingmaw Ferry.

SHARING THE STORY

A MYITKYINA REPLACEMENT

Tom Brennan and I had our Basic Training with the 389th Field Artillery. Our training was with 155 mm Howitzers. It consisted of reading maps, aerial photographs, surveying and computing distances to targets. Sometime in May 1944, Tom and I were at the air field in Myitkyina on guard duty. After that I was put in the 1st Bn. C Company Hq. 1st Platoon. I never dug a fox hole and never shot an M-1 rifle or a BAR or a .30 caliber water cooled machine gun or even had any infantry training and was scared as hell but learned fast. A lot of my buddies from my old outfit lost their lives there.

In August of 1945 at the end of the Battle of Myitkyina, we were cleaning up the last few Japs and a Medic came running up, looking for someone that had Type B blood. I was the only one that had Type B Blood. After I gave the blood, I came down with a very bad case of Malaria. I was kind of out of it and they put me on a cart with two others on carts and we had about six Burmese Guards to get us out of the jungle to the Field Hospital at the Air Strip. When we got through the jungle at the clearing everyone was waving at us and I reached up and tried to wave back. In the movie Merrill's Marauders near the end of the film, I am in the movie waving.

While in the hospital for many weeks, I met a Lt Rice who told me that they just trained a Chinese 155 Artillery Battalion in India and were going to join the two Chinese Infantry Divisions in Burma. I told him that I had my Basic training with the 155 Howitzers and he was very interested. Two days later, he came and asked me if I wanted to go with him with the Chinese 155 Artillery. I said I would. In a few days, I was sent to the Northern Combat Area Command to a Col Louis Lovell Headquarters. Col Lovell was in charge of all the artillery and 75 Pack outfits. At Bhamo we were a small headquarters. There was Col Lovell, Captain Smith, Lt Rice who

became Major Rice, 1st Lt Robert Mooney and a 2nd Lt that I can't remember and two Chinese Interpreters. Staff Sgt Frank Zakorsky and me. I took turns going up to the front with a 300 radio and a few officers to pick targets and adjust the rounds of fire. After Bhamo, we became a larger unit and we then went to Lashio. After Lashio fell. our C-47 plane landed in a rice paddy and all of a sudden a Jap Zero came from nowhere and blew our C-47 in half. We were under a large tree and when he flew over, we all took our rifles and shot him down. We then headed to Mandalay and after Mandalay fell, we all met with Lord Mountbatten. We then drove over the hump to Kunming and were getting ready to fight with the Chinese Command when we heard that the Japs had surrendered. John Yuda, 77 Cruse Rd, Sonora KY 42776-9422.

Dad, with a Missouri Ozark farm rearing, was a handler in the mule 5307th Composite Unit's 2nd Bn that was surrounded by the Japanese at Nhpum Ga from March 28 to April 9, 1944. Dad was a Corporal and a member of the Blue Combat Team. He felt an immense gratitude to his comrades in the perimeter, the men who flew air support and those who fought through to rescue the 2nd Bn.

Dad was a kind man and gave credit to the mules that had borne the supplies and munitions through the campaign, often carrying their loads on open sores. He taught us that certain thing simply must be done. After the war, our Father led a live of steady service in a blue-collar career earning the respect of his acquaintances for faithfully and competently carrying out his responsibilities at work, at home, and in Christian service. Dad taught and showed that strength is a character trait that is not reserved exclusively for men whose lot it is to wear the mantle of authority. Dad believed that all members of society had the right to expect strength of character from their associates.
