Dear Mr. Lyons:

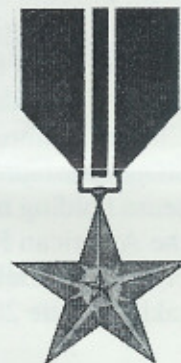
As you are already aware, recipients of the Combat Infantryman or Combat Medical Badge for the period December 7, 1941 to September 2, 1945, are authorized a conversion award of the Bronze Star Medal. Veterans who have not received their award of the Bronze Star Medal may make application to the National Personnel Records Center, ATTN: Army Medals Section, 9700 Page Av, St. Louis MO 63132-5200. Veterans should produce a copy of their War Department Form WD AGO 53-55 (Report of Separation – Enlisted) or 53-98 (Officer) when writing to the center. The reverse side of the Honorable Discharge Certificate should show entitlement to the Combat Infantryman or Combat Medical Badge in the “qualifications” block or “awards and decorations” block. If the National Personnel Records Center is unable to determine an individual’s entitlement, they will forward all available supporting documentation to this office for a final determination.

We appreciate your support of our veterans and the men and women serving in our Army today.

MARAUDERS MARCH ON HISTORIC VALLEY FORGE



The 57th Annual Reunion will be held this Labor Day weekend, August 30-31st, at the Hilton Valley Forge Hotel, King of Prussia, PA. – near the site where General George Washington made his legendary crossing of the Delaware River.

Rates and Reservations For a couple for the two nights, Friday, August 30 and Saturday, August 31st, the package

rate is \$306 for a double room, \$224 for a single, including two breakfasts, two dinners, two drinks apiece at the second dinner, a ladies tea and all taxes and gratuities. Extra night’s lodging, \$69, no meals included, plus tax. To make your reservation, telephone the hotel at 1-800-879-8372, identify yourself as a member of Merrill’s Marauders Association going to the Labor Day Reunion, and say which two-day package rate you want, single or double, and how many extra nights lodging if you wish to come early. You will be asked to guarantee your reservation with a credit card number.

Getting There The hotel is at 251 West De Kalb Pike, King of Prussia, PA 19406. If coming by car, the hotel is located on Route 202 North (also named De Kalb Pike) in the North Philadelphia suburb of King of Prussia, near the Pennsylvania Turnpike Intersection with the Schuylkill Expressway. It is two minutes from the Valley Forge Interchange (Exit 24) of the Pennsylvania Turnpike, 20 minutes from downtown Philadelphia, and 30 minutes from Philadelphia International Airport. If coming by air, upon reaching the airport or leaving the hotel, telephone Tropiano Bus Service 215-643-53971. We hope to announce a discount bus fare in the next issue.

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Hotel Facilities The Hilton Valley Forge, a nine-story high-rise, occupies nine acres of land and contains 348 guestrooms, three restaurants serving American or Japanese cuisine, two bars, concierge service, gift shop, ATM, a health club, indoor/outdoor pools, and sauna and Jacuzzi. There are coin-operated washers and dryers, a full-service hair salon and game room. Parking is free, and a free shuttle runs to King of Prussia Shopping Mall. Car rental services are available. All guestrooms have air conditioning, coffee maker, hair dryer, voice mail, in-room safes, and computer hookup.

Nearby Attractions The Valley Forge National Historical Park lies a few miles east down the Road on Route 202 and includes the George Washington Memorial Chapel, Memorial Bell Tower, National Carillon, a gift shop, & restaurant, picnic areas, a bus tour and a museum holding more than 4,000 items from the days of the American Revolution. The spot where Washington crossed the Delaware lies about 40 miles to the east, also taking Route 202.

Philadelphia Highlights and Landmarks The center of Philadelphia is about 30 minutes drive to the south. Prime attractions are the Liberty Bell and across from it Independence Hall, site of the adoption of the American Declaration of Independence in 1776 and the Constitutional Convention at which the U.S. Constitution was written in 1787. Among other sights: Carpenters Hall, site of the first Continental Congress, the battleship New Jersey, Christ Church, Philadelphia Art Museum, Philadelphia Zoo, Betsy Ross House, Quaker Meeting House and Fairmount Park.

Our Association is planning a guided bus tour that will take in many of the above sights in four to five hours beginning Friday morning. 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NEW 800 NUMBERS FOR VA GRAVE INFORMATION

The Department of Veterans Affairs now has a toll-free number where you can inquire about headstones for veterans or other questions concerning the grave marker program.

This new system will greatly enhance the ability to get answers to customers who need them quickly. By calling 1-800-697-6947 you are connected to VA's National Cemetery Systems Office of Memorial Programs in Washington D.C. This line operates from 8AM until 4:30 PM, Eastern Time, Monday through Friday. Service representatives can now supply immediate information about the status of applications, headstones or marker delivery and general information about the Memorial program.

Chinese War Memorial Medal:

American military personnel who served in the China Theater from 7 December 1941 until 29 September 1945 are eligible for a Chinese War Memorial medal issued by the Republic of China. Only a limited number of these medals remain and they will be distributed to eligible recipients on a first-come, first-serve basis. John Easterbrook and I have been actively engaged in providing some examples of the weapons we used in the Burma Campaign for display at the Stilwell Museum in Chungking China. The weapons have been obtained and duly disarmed so that they are no longer capable of being fired lethally. At this time, the matter is in the hands of State Department Staff who must give their consent to the use of these display materials in China. We think that the Secretary of State, a former Ranger would approve this use and that our problem is with lower level staff people. Any of you folks have influence with the State Department, get to work. Otherwise stand by for developments.

MAJOR PETER PETITO'S DIARY (CONT'D)

Travels 19 1/2 - 24 knots/hr. The ship travels w/o escort. Comdr. Walton Permanent C.O. Troops

14 Oct. - To put in at Perth or Fremantle tomorrow.

15 Oct. - Marched through Fremantle. Town of C.40,000. Very friendly.

16 Oct. - Lt Col Hunter told us about next port - Bombay. From there? The Col told us about the pick-pocket profession being handed from Father to Son in India. Also Military Intelligence Dept. has many men in all ports. Allied and Axis. Told about a mickey fed to officer in Panama. The war is far in advance of Washington Operations Schedule. Operations in Northern Africa were way ahead of schedule. Casualties on landings were only 1 1/2 % instead of the anticipated 20%. As a consequence the thousands of OCS Graduates has given the army an excess of officer personnel.

27 Oct. - To land in Bombay tomorrow A.M.

28 Oct. - Sighted land - 0900 - Sailboats on all sides. Aus cruisers(HM AC) & 2 corvettes.

29 Oct. - Col Beach, Sgt Barringer and myself to fly to Deolali and to see set-up for training.

Present Plans - 3 weeks rest, then intensive training program.

STORY- "Stilwell and Mountbatten at odds for control of unit. Mountbatten in command and has placed us under Wingate who has 17 British Brigades plus our regt. Stilwell had a place all built and ready for our occupancy but Mountbatten overruled and we are to go where the British are training.

Stopped ashore - bought some souvenirs. Indians are all scrawny, small, very thin, filthy. They scramble madly for annas tossed from aboard ship. Also dive into sea from boats for the coins. (Same as in Naples). The city shows the Eastern influence with spires amidst the modern architecture. Weather is exceedingly hot and feels sultry.

30 Oct. - Off ship with Col Beach. Joined Lt Col Hunter, Lt Col McGee, Maj Osborne, Capt Johnson, Capt Scott, Colonel Brink, Liaison Officer from Gen. Stillwell's HQ. Motored through Bombay (Modern and ancient are side by side). To airport aboard a two motored twelve seater. Lockheed Lodestar - Flew to Agra, some 700 miles away. Motored at dusk to view one of Seven Wonders of the World, the Taj Mahal. Sandals were placed on our feet before we could enter. Marble Steps. Inlaid precious and semi-precious stones, black marble. Indians sell story at each point of interest. (E.g. crack in wall result of earthquake 1934). Rupees are asked for by men for each story. Motored to Gwalior. then by rail to Lalitpur. From there by Jeep to Deogahr to make recon of training area. Ancient 5th and 15th Century Monuments in vicinity. Brick wall of old fort on bluff overlooking area.

The rail gauge in India is wider than that in America - Flatland and curves.

2 Nov - To Deolali Camp to meet with troops.

3 Nov - In Barracks, room 109- Roommate Lt Dudley - Paulson. Tea at 7:15 by bearer - Drill at 9 to 11:30 - 2 to 4. Supper at 8. No running water. Bearer comes at 4 with tea and brings bath water. Laundry - day's service and very inexpensive.

6 Nov - Angie's Birthday

9 Nov - Present for Dad. To move to Deogarh by 11th.

15 Nov - Not yet moved to Deogarh. Col Brink, Gen. Stilwell's Liaison Officer, back from Delhi. Info: To move 21st to Deogarh. Warned British are great at borrowing and not returning. Politely refuse. To go into action by Feb 15. Fade-out tactics (evasion) to be employed if larger unit than ours is encountered in going to objective. We may be used to seize an airfield and hold until our forces arrive; or may be used to blow up bridges, shops, etc.; or to harass enemy while main forces step in from both China and Burma. Our job will be to keep Japs occupied or disrupted so that they can not put reserves in. E.g. observe an airfield and go in only when enough planes are there to make it worthwhile.

2 Dec - Air Officers talk about the run into China to deliver supplies and bring back coolies to work on the Burma Road (New). Their instructions are: "If you have to go to 25,000 feet because of weather conditions, do so. Since the coolies cannot live without oxygen supplies at this level, it means death. Also if ice forms on wings, coolies are to be dropped (w/o parachutes) if necessary". The coolies know the conditions, yet many of them go to sleep as soon as they are loaded into the plane, and have to be awakened before the plane descends into lower altitudes, so that their ear drums aren't broken.

8 December 1943 - Heard Gen. Wingate, small man, long-faced, sincere. "Winning a war is a case of imposing your will upon the enemy." "Soft-spot tactics". "Use of aircraft as artillery and to make unnecessary long, vulnerable line of supply. Wireless gives us advantage of communication w/o cumbersome wire lines.". "Fighting force (front line) best men, most intelligent and with courage. Next, a truck-driver is class B and he does not relish having a front-line soldier shooting at him" "This has been Jap strategy - to force us to have 'short range penetration' units hit our vulnerable supply lines and L of C." We will strike where he isn't, then leave him sitting and send a fol-

low-up force to take advantage of our work."

3 Dec - Gen. Wingate visited area and talked to troops. Impressed with our Bazooka and M-1 (Editor - a lot of material was available pertaining to his service in the SW Pacific but we felt that our interest was in his service with the 5307th)

I'm writing to you about Stanley Plato. I read the Merrill's Marauders newsletter that you send him, in one of them you mentioned that you would like to get news of anyone who was in the 475th Infantry. Stanley was I Company, 3rd Bn, 475th Infantry and fought in the China-Burma-India Theater of War. His outfit was also known as the Mars Task Force. He got the Silver Star for dragging two men to safety under combat fire. Stanley remained friends with Lt Sandy Head, one of the men in his Platoon. Stanley was in the 1st Squad in his Platoon.

I would like to know if you could send me any information about his service record over in Asia. He never talked much about it, if I asked him. He has quite a few ribbons and badges from over there, but I don't know what he did to earn them as he never told any one.

He is now in the Holyoke Soldiers Home in Holyoke, Mass. He has been there now for about two years. He is finally getting a pension for 100% disability. When the four kids were small, we tried very hard to get him a pension but the VA always said his disability wasn't service connected. They finally agreed when he went into the Soldiers Home. He has been in and out of VA Hospitals since 1968. At first he was an outpatient at Leeds in Northampton Mass., and now he is permanently in the Soldiers Home. Please let me know if

you have any information you can send me. (Buddies of his from I Company, please respond. Editor)
