he deepest deep, and the lowest low on the planet Earth is the Challenger Deep in the Mariana Trench found in the Western Pacific Ocean southwest of Guam. It's 35,853 ft. (10,297 meter), nearly 7 miles deep and it spans 43 miles. Scientists once said its depths were unfathomable, and due to the immense pressure of water, no life could possibly exist at that depth. They deemed it a dark, desolate place. But on January 23, 1960, Jacques Piccard and US Navy Lieutenant Don Walsh launched Trieste, a Swissdesigned, Italian-built deep-diving research bathyscaphe which reached a record depth of about 10,911 meters in the Challenger Deep of the Mariana Trench. To their amazement- it was light and clear, and thev observed life! A flat fish, sea cucumbers, and shrimp! There have since been 3 other trips to the bottom of the Mariana Trench, 2 unmanned with only cameras, and one other manned with a film crew. Each came back with evidence of more and more life forms (Youtube -National Geographic, March 8, 2012).

Scientific expeditions have been launched both to the deep of the oceans and to the outer space to gain more knowledge and understanding of our world and other life forms. We know more about our world now what is out there and below the oceans, as a result of these expeditions. What used to be "unfathomable" (like the Mariana Trench) or "unreachable" (as in Mt. Everest), are now a thing of the past. True, there are still many discoveries and explorations that need to be done. It's only a matter of time. Many words are associated with the word "unfathomable." Some suggestions are 'inexplorable,' 'untraceable,' 'inexhaustible,' 'incomprehensible,' 'illimitable,' 'inscrutable,' 'infinite' and 'incalculable, 'unsearchable,' 'untraceable,'

'endless,' 'boundless,' 'inexplorable,' 'inexhaustible,' and 'without limit." These words in one way or another convey the idea of something never-ending and beyond human measure. What is it or who is beyond human measure? GOD is! God remains unfathomable. Because if we could grasp the greatness of our God and figure out all of His ways, He would fail to be God at all for He would be no greater or wiser than our understanding. But, with unfathomable greatness and wisdom, we have an infinite God who "is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work within us" (Eph. 3:20).

God's Unfathomable Power and Wisdom as seen in the Creation Story

"In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth. The earth was without form and void, and darkness was over the face of the deep ... and God said, let there be light and there was light" The first day, this. God's Unfathomable Love and Justice as seen in the Redemption Story

"But God shows his love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us" (Romans 5:8, ESV). "For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 6:23, ESV).

In the children's book "He Took my Whipping (Licking)" by Timothy Robinson, the new school teacher asked his students to make class rules. Ten rules were drafted, correspondingly anyone caught violating any of these rules will get ten beatings or whipping. One day, Tom, one of the big boys found that his lunch was stolen. Soon, it was found out that the little, skinny Jim got his lunch. For stealing, Jim was going to get ten beatings. Jim begged not to remove his coat. To the teacher's aghast, the boy wore no inner shirt at all only a suspender over his skinny back. The teacher was in a dilemma - he could not come up to beat the boy yet he had to uphold the class rule. Just then, Tom, the boy whose lunch was stolen stood up and volunteered to take the boy's beatings. There was a rule to allow this. Thus, Tom got the whipping instead of Jim. After five strokes, the rod broke. By this time, the whole class was sobbing. Little Jim had reached up and caught Tom with both arms around the neck. "Tom, I'm awful sorry, Tom, I was so hungry. I'll love you till I die for taking my licking for me. I'll love you forever!"

This was exactly what Jesus Christ did for each one of us. He was scourged, his head bled because of the crown of thorns he was made to wear. Only Jesus could remove this burden of sin from us because He is God in the flesh (John 1.1, Colossians 2.9). If He had not done this, we would be separated from God forever (Romans 6.23). Our God is holy and righteous, but we are not because we have broken His perfect laws. We deserve to

be punished. But because God is also love, He wants us to be reconciled with Him. The only way out was for Jesus, who is perfect in every way, to become a perfect sacrifice and take upon Himself the sin of mankind. Jesus took the punishment we deserve and thus satisfied the requirement of the law that sin be punished (2 Corinthians 5:21, 1 Peter 2:24). As in our story earlier, Tom took the punishment that little Jim deserved and thus satisfied the requirement of the class rules that stealing should be punished.

Justin Ching from Grade 11 also discussed his preparation and his experience during the activity,






