



From egg to butterfly, this story shows the growth process of the five-colored butterfly (scientific name Apatura ilia) from a different, microscopic perspective. Meanwhile, Pop Land (an aspen tree leaf, habitat of the Apartura ilia) has a surprise visitor (the butterfly egg). A humorous representation of human society comes from the citizens of Pop land first attacking and fearing the monster but later coming to worship and praise the unknown visitor. The various residents of Pop land were created based on the anatomy of insects, their ecology, and scientific names. Furthermore, involving the names of the characters with the dialogue of each person is another feature to add another layer of depth to the characters in the book.




Acorn time, a time to lift up your head and stand tall.



The transparent letters in the title implies the character is possessed by her fear of ghosts. The author-illustrator expresses abstraction in homage to Mark Rothko. She uses hues of blue to visualize the process of the child resolving her fear. Initially, one will notice the balance of the picture and background drawn with a white line, giving a sense of relief the book will have a happy ending. The calligraphy is half-shrouded, much like ghosts, transcending the meaning of the text. The way the girl confronts and curiously overcomes her fears shows such possibilities to the readers.
