The Sicha explains the order of Rashi, that only after Yosef hears from Binyomin about his pain over Yosef, as evidenced by what he named his ten sons, does Yosef fill with the warmest compassion for his brother. Spiritually, Yosef refers to the Jewish people, and Binyomin alludes to the soul. When Yosef (a Yid) realizes the great descent of his soul, and all its ten faculties, into the darkness of our world, he is filled with a warm Rachmanus-compassion towards his Neshama.

The Cry of a Child

The previous Rebbe relates an occurrence from his childhood: It happened, when I was still a Talmid of R' Nissan, my father spoke at length during a Thursday night's study session in Chassidus, in the little Minyan room, and wept profusely.

What he said I did not understand, but the few words I heard ("How sorry – Rachmanusdik-is the plight of our Neshama!") and his inward weeping, touched me so deeply that sitting on a bench, near the door, I broke into tears.
