The Pesukim continue,
It refers to the second day of Rosh Hashana, Rashi makes it clear,

And about the Mitzvah to shake the Daled Minim together as one,
From their commitment alone, Hashem considered the Mitzvos done.

And Hashem counts it as if we already brought it into action!
