## Likkutei Sichos, Vol. 16 Purim, Sicha 3

The conclusion of the Megillah, end of chapter ten Tells of Mordechai's position and what happened then "Most members of the Sanhedrin" approved of Mordechai's views While he continued to work and advocate for the good of all the Jews

The Gemara says only "most members" approved of his position While some "separated themselves from him" saying there's no permission To be involved in communal work, they said that's not okay A member of the Sanhedrin must learn Torah all day

Now if they were right and he was wrong to neglect his Torah study Why didn't all of them disapprove and cease to be his buddy? If his communal advocacy was something he couldn't do Why did a majority of the Sanhedrin support his point of view?

The Gemara doesn't actually say there were members who rejected Mordechai's view or argued with him, they simply expected That he would give up his communal work after gaining his "Purim fame" So they "separated themselves from him" and didn't do the same

There are two teachings regarding those who take a long time to pray And are left with little time for Torah the rest of the day One is recorded in the Babylonian Gemara – Talmud Bavli And one in the Jerusalem Gemara – Talmud Yerushalmi



The Bavli says there's a bracha these pious men deserve They won't forget what they have learned, "their Torah will be preserved" Yerushalmi says "their Torah will be blessed" it will be more sublime They will study more and reach great heights in a shorter amount of time

Mordechai's colleagues from Bavel insisted that to full-time study he returns It's not enough that he'll be blessed to "preserve" what he learns But his Jerusalem colleagues supported him in his role as Nasi Hador Since his Torah study will be blessed and even better than before

Learning Torah uninterrupted is certainly the best Without distractions or other concerns to put you to the test When Mordechai cut time from his learning his position was demoted But he knew he made the right decision, to his nation he was devoted

Mordechai sacrificed his own spiritual value of being dedicated solely to learning For the sake of others and to such devotion we should be yearning We should be like Mordechai and say, "There's nothing we won't do For the sake of the material and spiritual wellbeing of our fellow Jew."
