The Rambam is of the opinion,

But there is a difference that the Rambam emphasizes clearly.

For the Mishkan to be built on flat ground was fine, But the Beis Hamikdash had to be built on an incline. There were steps to climb between each section, Representing higher and higher levels of elevation.

In the times of the Beis Hamikdash there was a possibility for something new, The ground could become saturated with G-dliness too!

The higher the ground was physically,

The higher was the level of its spirituality.

Only stone was used for the Beis Hamikdash's construction, Which represents the ability to transform even the lowest dimension. The Beis Hamikdash was built as a permanent structure, Even after its destruction, the holiness remains forever!

A big question comes to mind,
Between the Holy and the Holy of Holies, steps why don't we find?
The Holy of Holies is infinitely greater it's true,
But no amount of steps would suffice to represent the essence of every Jew.

As we climb higher and higher,
