Neuroscience finds that music engages more regions of the brain simultaneously than almost any other human activity — binding memory, emotion, language, and movement together (Levitin, 2006; Koelsch, 2014). This is why a forgotten hymn can resurface, word-perfect, decades later. God designed humanity as inherently musical beings — even “the morning stars sang together” at creation (Job 38:7).



# Music Before Sin — Worship in Heaven



**Isaiah 6** Seraphim cry “Holy, holy, holy” before the throne — antiphonal praise in the heavenly sanctuary.



**Ezekiel 28** The covering cherub, traditionally linked to Lucifer before his fall, is described with imagery some interpreters associate with musical instruments — a reading scholars continue to debate.



**Revelation 4-5** Twenty-four elders and four living creatures sing a “new song” with harps before the throne of the Lamb.

*Music originated in heaven before it ever sounded on earth.*

Nearly a third of the Psalms are laments — honest cries of confusion, grief, or anger brought directly to God. This is why the Psalms remain the church's songbook: they give voice to the full range of human experience before God, not only triumph but sorrow honestly expressed and resolved in trust. Even their headers — “to the choirmaster,” “with stringed instruments” — reveal a hymnbook with built-in performance instruction.



## SECTION I

# Music in the New Testament Church



### Jesus Sings a Hymn

After the Last Supper, Jesus and the disciples sang a hymn before walking to Gethsemane (Matt. 26:30) — sacred song accompanying His deepest trial.



### Paul and Silas

Imprisoned and beaten at Philippi, Paul and Silas sang hymns at midnight; their song became a witness to every prisoner who heard (Acts 16:25).



### Psalms, Hymns, Spiritual Songs

Paul instructs the churches to address one another in “psalms and hymns and spiritual songs” (Eph. 5:19; Col. 3:16) — a breadth of legitimate musical expression even in apostolic worship.

*Adventist hymnody grew alongside the church's global mission expansion — today's hymnal heritage includes contributions from across continents and languages, reflecting Revelation 14:6's vision of “every nation, kindred, tongue, and people.”*



## SECTION II

# Official Adventist Philosophy of Music

*Core principle: music should* glorify God · uplift Christ · communicate truth · prepare us for heaven.



### Judgment

Exercise discernment toward what is theatrical or relies on display, and toward arrangements whose primary effect is to induce sensual rather than worshipful response.



### Inclusivity

Recognize and value the musical languages of different cultures, while holding to shared biblical standards of reverence — unity in worship's purpose, diversity in its expression.



### Modernity

Instruments and contemporary settings are welcomed; amplification and arrangement should never overwhelm the intellectual clarity of the lyrics being sung.

*Ellen White was not anti-music — she was pro-discernment: warning against music that excites the senses without elevating the soul, while affirming music's unmatched power to plant truth in the heart.*

Ellen White's educational philosophy holds that true education — and by extension, true music — develops the whole person: physical, mental, and spiritual. Music habitually heard shapes inward disposition gradually, the way flowing water shapes stone. The choice of music is therefore a discipleship issue, not merely an aesthetic preference.

## Purpose of Sacred Music

*Sacred music is multi-functional, not entertainment-first. Hymns on sanctification or the Second Coming catechize a congregation as they sing — an ancient pattern in which orthodoxy is carried by orthopraxy: right belief embedded in the very act of right singing.*



# Sacred vs. Secular Influences

| Aspect             | Sacred Music                    | Entertainment-Driven Music          |
|--------------------|---------------------------------|-------------------------------------|
| Purpose            | Worship and edification         | Entertainment and self-expression   |
| Message            | Christ-centered truth           | Often self- or culture-centered     |
| Focus              | God's glory                     | Performer or audience               |
| Effects            | Spiritual elevation             | Emotional stimulation without depth |
| Spiritual outcomes | Discipleship and transformation | Passive consumption                 |

A continuum, not a rigid wall: many secular-origin forms — African choral idioms, contemporary praise — can be redeemed for sacred use when text, intent, and worship context align.



### SECTION III

## Anatomy of a Sacred Song



**1 Corinthians 10:31** *“Whatever you do, do all to the glory of God.” Our choice of music is an act of stewardship over the mind.*



### Melody

The dominant, most memorable element — should be singable and pure enough to carry the text faithfully.



### Harmony

Artistic and interesting, supporting the melody rather than burying it under needless complexity.



### Rhythm

Should serve and clarify the text rather than overwhelm it. Historic Adventist guidance has urged caution toward rhythmic excess — a principle to apply evenhandedly, since rich rhythmic traditions, including African and Caribbean worship music, are not inherently “lesser” but reflect equally valid cultural vocabularies of reverence.



### SECTION III

## The Power of Congregational Singing



### Belonging

Singing together signals shared identity and lowers social barriers within seconds.



### Resilience

Group singing raises oxytocin and lowers cortisol, building emotional resilience (Kreutz et al., 2004).



### Social Bonding

Choristers' heart-rate variability synchronizes during unison singing (Vickhoff et al., 2013).



### Memory Retention

Musical memory is uniquely resilient — hymns often outlast spoken memory in dementia (Cuddy & Duffin, 2005).

*The research is consistent: a congregation that sings together is bonding, healing, and remembering together — congregational singing is not a warm-up act before the sermon, but a spiritual and physiological event in its own right.*



### SECTION III

## Why Congregational Singing Must Remain



### Biblical

Psalms 149–150 call “all” people to sing — not a select few on a platform.



### Historical

The Reformation recovered congregational song from clergy-only chant as a mark of restored gospel access.



### Adventist

Pioneers sang their theology into being through camp-meeting hymnody and shared song.



### Practical

A singing congregation participates, retains, and evangelizes through its own shared voice.



*The devil flees before the sound of music.*

### SECTION III

## Choral Music in Adventist Worship



### Choirs

Model harmonic and textual depth, leading the congregation into richer engagement with a text.



### Ensembles

Offer flexible, intimate musical leadership for varied worship settings and special services.



### Instrumentalists

Support congregational singing with tasteful accompaniment that serves the voice, not the spotlight.

*The choir supports congregational worship rather than replacing it — the musician is a window to Christ, not the portrait on display.*

As a composer, setting Scripture to melody carries real weight: care in word-setting so melodic stress never distorts meaning; craft in voice-leading and range so a piece is singable by real congregations and choirs, not just soloists; and authenticity — writing from one's own cultural and spiritual voice. African and Ghanaian Adventist choral traditions, with their call-and-response forms and communal rhythm, model excellence rooted in a community's own musical language rather than imitation of foreign models for its own sake.

## Music and the Brain



### Dopamine

Anticipation and resolution of melody trigger dopamine release in the brain's reward pathways — music literally feels good because it is processed like one.



### Endorphins

Group singing and rhythmic movement release endorphins, the body's natural pain-relieving and mood-lifting chemistry.



### Neuroplasticity

Sustained musical training and engagement physically reshapes neural pathways, strengthening connections used for language, memory, and emotion.



### Memory

Music is encoded across multiple memory systems at once, which is why melody can resurrect words and feelings thought long forgotten.

*As a physician, I see in this circuitry not a coincidence of evolution but a signature of design: the Creator who gave us ears to hear also wired our brains to be moved, gathered, and healed by what we hear.*



## Music and Emotional Health



### Reduced Stress

Lowers circulating cortisol and stabilizes heart rate and blood pressure.



### Reduced Anxiety

A Cochrane review found music lowers pre-procedure anxiety as effectively as some medications, without side effects.



### Improved Resilience

Regular musical engagement is associated with stronger long-term coping and emotional regulation.



### Emotional Healing

Group singing raises oxytocin and immune markers, supporting both mood and the body's defenses (Kreutz et al., 2004).



Philippians 4:8 calls us to fix our minds on what is excellent and praiseworthy. Music can be a practical tool for that very discipline — a means by which Scripture's command to guard the mind becomes something we can actually practice, one song at a time.

*Singing forms belief through repetition — what we sing, we come to believe, which is why hymnody functions as a kind of lived catechesis. Communal singing also forms a shared Christian identity: an Adventist congregation in Accra and one in Manila can sing the very same hymn, becoming, for a few verses, one global voice.*

# Music as Healing Ministry



### Hospital Visitation

Trained singers and small ensembles bring comfort and the presence of Christ to bedsides where words alone often fall short.



### Bereavement Ministry

Funeral and memorial hymnody gives grieving families language for sorrow and hope they could not otherwise articulate.



### Women's Ministries

Women's Ministries has historically organized and sustained much of the local church's music ministry, from choirs to hymn-singing visitation teams.



### Community Outreach

Gospel concerts and evangelistic singing bands carry the church's witness into public spaces beyond its own walls.

## SECTION V

# Case Studies



### A Traditional Hymn

A well-loved hymn on grace and assurance — strong on doctrine and Scripture, but ask: does its tune and tempo still genuinely engage today's congregation, or merely comfort the already-convinced?



### A Contemporary Praise Song

An accessible, emotionally immediate chorus — strong on engagement, but ask: does it carry enough doctrinal substance to teach as well as move?



### An African Choral Anthem

A vernacular anthem on the Second Coming, rich in call-and-response — strong on community and authenticity; ask the same six questions rather than a different, lower standard.

# Practical Recommendations



### Pastors

Protect time and budget for music ministry as a discipleship priority, not an afterthought.



### Women's Ministries

Champion congregational singing events and sustain practical support for choirs and music teams.



### Choir Directors

Rehearse hearts as well as harmonies — open and close rehearsal with prayer and purpose.



### Worship Leaders

Vary repertoire intentionally across generations and cultures represented in the congregation.



### Parents

Cultivate musical worship at home from childhood — sung faith heard early roots deepest.
