The council members observed that, a significant number of students of 2021-211 batch in the Mechanical Engineering branch had not qualified. In this regard, clarification was sought and the HoD of Mechanical Engineering informed that many students admitted through CET had ranks above one lakh, which has impacted their academic performance and the overall results. Also, the COE explained that a significant number of failures is from Lateral Entry students. The Council suggested to carry out result analysis with & without Lateral Entry Students.

The council members also suggested that additional efforts be made to support academically weaker students through remedial classes, mentoring and focused academic interventions to improve the outcomes in future.

The council members resolved to approve the result analysis presented by CoE and details in **Annexure – 5.3**

1. Computer Science & Engineering:

Dr. Mustafa Basthikodi, Chairperson, BoS of Computer Science & Engineering presented the highlights and sought approval for the BoS resolutions from the council members.

Major Suggestions from BoS:

- It was suggested to conduct the Data Structures Laboratory experiments using C++ instead of C language
- The concepts of Project Management to be included in the Software Engineering course
- In the event that, students are unable to successfully complete the prescribed final

year online courses offered through NPTEL, the department should provide additional elective courses to enable them to fulfil the requisite credit requirements to complete their degree

2. Artificial Intelligence and Machine Learning (AIML):

Dr. Pushpalatha K., Chairperson, BoS of Artificial Intelligence and Machine Learning presented the highlights and sought approval of the resolutions from the council members.

Major Suggestions from BoS:

- The Bloom's Taxonomy levels in laboratory components may be mapped to higher-order cognitive levels
- The course on Fundamentals of Quantum Computing may be offered in higher semesters and fundamental courses such as Principles of Operating Systems and Computer Networks shall be scheduled in the lower semesters
- The courses on Machine Learning and Artificial Intelligence shall be interchanged in the curriculum
- Open elective courses shall be designed to be department-specific

iii. UG Gracing Policy:

As per UG 2024 Statutes (Section 11.51) "If a student has passed in all the subjects in a regular semester and falls short of 2 marks of passing in one subject then he/she is eligible for grace marks required for passing. However, the gracing policy will not be applicable for the summer semester."

As per the VTU Circular Ref. No. VTU/BGM/Reg (E)/P2025-2026/341, dated 4th June, 2025

"Grace marks shall be awarded to a subject (Theory/Practical Course/ Head of Passing) up to 2 % of the maximum SEE marks, as specified in the scheme of that subject. This is applicable if, after applying the grace marks, the candidate meets the minimum required marks to pass the subject"

The AC members approved the gracing policy for UG Programmes as per the VTU norms.

iv. Moderation of Answer Scripts:

- The Moderation of the evaluated answer scripts to be increased from existing 10% per packet to 25% per packet
- If the difference in marks awarded by the evaluator and the moderator exceeds 10% of the maximum marks, then the answer scripts are to be evaluated by the third evaluator
- The final marks to be awarded will be the average of the two closest marks from the three evaluations conducted

The AC members approved the updated Moderation Policy in the interest of the students

Sub. (5.7) : Seeking Approval for Course Code modification for the 2024 scheme as per VTU guidelines

Res. : The course coding structure was proposed in alignment with VTU recommendations and presented. The major changes include,



	• Year of Admission will no longer be included in the course code • The new code structure will reflect: Program Name, Semester, Course Type and the occurrence of the Course Sequence Number • Common courses and NCMC (Non-Credit Mandatory Courses) will share unified course code across all the programs The AC members upon discussion approved the updated Course Code format presented and the details in Annexure - 5.7.
Sub. (5.8)	: Appraisal & Seeking approval on providing Internship to students as per VTU regulations
Res.	As per the VTU Circular VTU/BGM/BOS/Internship/784/2024-25/585, dated 12th July 2025, the following clarifications were made for undergoing internship by the students: • The students can opt for a "Swappable Internship Model," enabling them to undertake a full-semester internship either in the 7th or 8th semester while completing remaining academic courses in the other semester • The students opting for the one-year internship leading to the completion of the final-year project must complete the theory and laboratory credits during the summer semester prior to commencement of the internship. This ensures that the student meets the credit requirements while dedicating the full academic year to the internship and final-year project. • For post-placement internships, a minimum duration of 15 weeks (5 working days per week) is mandated • Internship offering organizations must be registered on the VTU portal, either by the organization itself or by the institute's internship coordinator However, the committee members suggested that the institution explore and facilitate opportunities for students to undertake internships abroad. Allowing international internships can significantly enhance students' global exposure, broaden their technical and cultural perspectives, and improve their employability in the international job market. The council resolved to approve the internship policy/norms presented. The details of policy are in Annexure - 5.8.

Res.	The draft 1st Year Scheme of teaching & evaluation for 2025 admitted batch students was presented It was resolved to approve the same upon discussion by the council members The details are enclosed in Annexure - 5.9
Sub. (5.10)	: Discussion and seeking approval for framing a separate committee for appointing Professor of Practice and Adjunct Faculty as per AICTE guidelines
Res.	It was brought to notice of the council members that there is a need to constitute separate committee for appointing Professor of Practice (PoP) and Adjunct Faculty as per AICTE

Res.	The Dean (R&D), Dr. Rathishchandra Gatti, presented the proposed framework for integrating research-based projects into the undergraduate curriculum. During the discussion, external members sought clarifications regarding the academic implications of the framework. Dr. Gatti clarified that, while the framework promotes a culture of research among undergraduate students and it will not have any impact or reflect in the grade card. The list of new courses proposed for introduction from the Academic Year 2026–27 was presented by the Chair to the members, • B.E (VLSI) • Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA) • Bachelor of Computer Applications (BCA) • M. Tech (VLSI -Semiconductors) • Master of Computer Applications (MCA) Also, MBA increase in intake of 60 to cater the new specialization on Supply Chain Management. Also, they suggested that, the proposal may be submitted to AICTE and VTU for approval. b) Regarding Self Study Component: As per the revised SAR of Tier-I (OBE) and the requirements of National Credits Framework (NCF), 1 Credit = 30 hours of Teaching Learning, similarly 2 Credits = 60 hours, 3 Credits = 90 hours and 4 Credits = 120 hours. The Teaching-Learning hours mentioned need to be shown across Lecture (L), Tutorial (T), Practical (P) and self-study (S) components (across all credits). Since 50% of the required



hours are already covered in the existing L: T: P structure and the remaining Teaching – Learning hours need to be accounted under the Self Study component (S). The break-up of the self-study component (Topics covered, evaluation, hours allocated for each topic) should reflect in the syllabus.

The council members mentioned that as the regulations were introduced in 2024 hence, for the existing 2021 and also 2022 scheme of teaching and evaluations the status shall be maintained. However, the proposed revision of contact hours can be effectively implemented from 2024 scheme of teaching and evaluation.

Dr Sudheer Shetty, Vice Principal, thanked all the members for their valuable suggestions and active involvement. He mentioned that all the suggestions provided were well taken and will be implemented.
