## TWENTY EIGHTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME by young-catholics.com

The Readings for this Sunday talk about healing, faith, and gratitude. They show us how people respond to God's help and how faith brings wholeness.

- Healing comes from God: Naaman is healed of leprosy after following God's instruction. Jesus heals ten lepers, showing that God brings both physical and spiritual healing.
- Faith leads to healing: Naaman at first doubts but then obeys and is healed. The Samaritan leper trusts Jesus, returns to give thanks, and is told his faith has saved him.
- Gratitude is important: Naaman returns to thank Elisha after being healed. Only one of the ten lepers thanks Jesus, showing that many forget to be grateful.
- God's mercy is for all: Naaman is not an Israelite, but God still heals him. The one grateful leper is a Samaritan, showing that God's love is for everyone.
- Hardship and faith: Paul suffers for preaching about Jesus, but he stays faithful. He reminds others that suffering for Christ leads to glory with him.
- Jesus is always faithful: Paul says that even when people fail, Jesus remains true. Jesus heals even those who do not return to thank him.

The Readings this weekend teach about faith and gratitude. They remind people to trust in God and to give thanks for his blessings.

### TWENTY-EIGHTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME (YEAR C) by Sr. Sharon McMillan, SNDdeN

The name is really unfortunate: "Ordinary Time." It gives Catholics the sense that only the liturgical seasons (Advent, Christmas, Lent, and Easter) are significant times in our lives of faith, that these long weeks of Ordinary Time mark out the times when our faith is less intense or the challenges of our Baptism are less demanding. But of course none of that is true. "Ordinary" simple refers to the fact that these 34 Sundays are identified by an ordinal number: 7th, 15th, 28th, for example. Each week, each Sunday, each day, in fact, each breath in our life as baptized disciples is uniquely significant, is the way that we live out our dying and rising with Jesus Christ in his Paschal Mystery. There is nothing "ordinary" in our lives, lived within the love of the Trinity, given us by the gift of our Baptism.

The Gospel Luke 17:11 – 19 The 28th Sunday in Ordinary Time brings us almost to the end of the 34 weeks of Ordinary Time. The Church Year 2025 has the Gospel of St. Luke as its anchor and has presented for us the most significant passages of Luke's Gospel in order. This Sunday offers for our prayer and reflection the much-loved reading describing the interaction between Jesus and the one leper who returns to him in gratitude for the healing he experienced. Luke does not describe the miracle directly, for that is not his purpose. His concern is with the importance of faith and of gratitude. He is emphasizing that a right faith and true gratitude can be found even in a non-Jew – another of Luke's many examples of alerting us to God's universal love and compassion. Notice too that Luke suggests to us that the other 9 were cured, but not necessarily saved. It is only to the 10th leper, the Samaritan (the outsider, the marginalized foreigner), that Jesus says, "Stand up and go; your faith has saved you."

**The First Reading 2 Kings 5:14 - 17** Today's First Reading, chosen to be in harmony with today's Gospel, presents the story of Naaman, a highly respected commander in the army of the local king. He has become a leper and seeks a cure from the Prophet Elisha. The focus of the reading is not so much Naaman's cure but his confession of faith. While in today's Gospel, the cure follows upon faith, with Naaman the cure leads to faith. Just as the Gospel raised up for us the image of one who returns to give thanks, so here. Naaman returns to thank Elisha and offers him a gift, which is refused. His cure and his gratitude have brought him the great gift of faith in the one true God. We might ask ourselves how often we return to God in thanksgiving, giving time and attention to the God who is always at our side, listening to our every prayer, sharing our every sorrow and joy.

The Second Reading 2 Timothy 2:8 - 13 Today's Second Reading (not related to the Gospel or First Reading) is a section from Paul's second letter to Timothy, written while Paul was in prison for preaching the Word of God. Although he is bound by his suffering and imprisonment, Paul urges us to remember that God's Word is never chained. Today's reading ends with a paschal hymn that may have been used in the liturgies of Christian initiation in Paul's day, a hymn we continue to sing. "If we have died with him, we shall also live with him; if we persevere, we shall also reign with him. But if we deny him, he will deny us. If we are unfaithful, he remains faithful, for he cannot deny himself." Scripture scholars alert us to Paul's delight in making up verbs that include the preposition "with" as a way to awaken us to our close union with Christ. We suffer with Christ and are glorified with Christ. We are crucified with him, rise with him, come to life with him, reign with him. This is not simply Paul's clever literary device but a proclamation of the truth of who we are as the disciples of Jesus.

#### Honoring Our Loved Ones on ALL SOULS DAY



Dear SCC Parishioners,

On Sunday November 2nd, we will observe the Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed (All Souls Day), a sacred time to remember and pray for our deceased loved ones. Traditionally, San Carlos Cathedral creates an "Altar of the Dead" adorned with *veladoras* (votive candles) bearing images of those who have gone before us.

#### **Our SCC Tradition**

On All Souls Day, we remember our beloved deceased. Traditionally, an altar is prepared at home where we display their photographs, mementos, and favorite food items. We place candles next to these items which symbolize our prayers for them. The Day begins by offering the Eucharist. Then, we visit their resting place (tomb, cemetery, niche), decorating their graves with marigolds. We conclude this celebration where we began: at our home. For this reason, we setup and display our Altar of the Dead near our parish office, as a way to represent the altars in our homes, where we remember and honor our loved ones and pray for their eternal rest. The Altar of the Dead will remain on display until Sunday, November 23rd, Solemnity of Christ the King.

CATECHETICAL Topic: THE FEAST OF 'ALL HALLOWS' by SC Liturgy Team

Dear San Carlos Parishioners.

November 1st is the Solemnity of All Saints, a Holy Day of Obligation (except this year) that celebrates and honors all the saints in Heaven. This includes those officially canonized by the Church, as well as the many unknown men and women who lived holy lives and are now with God. This celebration reminds us that we are part of the communion of saints. As God's family, we are all "connected": the faithful on earth, the souls in purgatory, and all those in Heaven.

The evening before All Saints' Day is known as "All Hallows' Eve," which is where the name "Halloween" comes from. For Catholics, this is a special time to begin celebrating the saints. While Halloween is often associated with spooky themes (from ancient pagan origens), the Catholic tradition offers a more profound focus. The Catechism of the Catholic Church details the virtuous lives of the saints and celebrates Christ's victory over evil, sin, and death, which are the true subjects that Catholic festivities for this season should celebrate and honor with great exuberance.

As a Catholic community, we encourage you to explain to your children that Halloween is the "vigil" or evening before All Saints' Day. This day reflects on Christ's triumph over sin and death. Instead of scary costumes, have your children choose a favorite saint and dress up as them. This is a fun way to learn about the heroes of our faith. "Holy" wins over spooky. Use the opportunity to explain that while our culture has embraced scary themes, the Church reminds us that holiness ultimately triumphs over evil.

Queridos feligreses de San Carlos:

El 1 de noviembre es la Solemnidad de Todos los Santos, un Día de Precepto (excepto este año) que celebra y honra a todos los santos del Cielo, incluyendo aquellos canonizados oficialmente por la Iglesia, así como aquellos desconocidos que vivieron vidas santas y que ahora están con Dios. Esta celebración nos recuerda que somos parte de la comunión de los santos. La víspera del Día de Todos los Santos se le confunde de manera común con el nombre de "Halloween". Para los católicos, esta noche es un momento especial para comenzar a celebrar a los santos. El Catecismo de la Iglesia Católica detalla las vidas virtuosas de los santos y celebra la victoria de Cristo sobre el mal, el pecado y la muerte, que son los verdaderos temas que las fiestas católicas de este tiempo deben celebrar y honrar con gran exuberancia.

Como católicos, les animamos a explicarles a sus hijos que Halloween es la "vigilia" o la víspera de Todos los Santos, una reflexión del el triunfo de Cristo sobre el pecado y la muerte. En lugar de disfraces aterradores, pídanles a sus hijos que elijan a su santo favorito y se disfracen de él. Una forma divertida para aprender sobre los héroes de la fe. Lo "santo" vence al espanto. Expliquen que aunque nuestra cultura adopta temas de espanto, la Iglesia nos recuerda que la santidad siempre triunfa sobre el mal.
