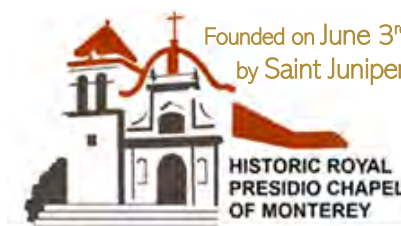

TWENTY SIXTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME *by young-catholics.com*

The readings for the 26th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year C focus on themes of wealth, responsibility, and the afterlife. They challenge us to reflect on our own lives in light of eternal values.

- **Wealth and Complacency:** The reading from Amos criticizes those who are comfortable and indifferent to the suffering around them. It shows that God sees and judges our indifference, especially when we ignore others' needs while living in luxury.
- **Moral Integrity:** Paul urges Timothy to pursue righteousness, godliness, faith, love, steadfastness, and gentleness. This theme tells us that living a good life involves more than avoiding bad actions; it also requires actively cultivating virtues.
- **Eternal Consequences:** The Gospel parable about Lazarus and the rich man illustrates that our actions have consequences beyond this life. It teaches us that how we treat others, especially those in need, influences our eternal destiny.
- **The Role of Scripture:** The rich man learns that Moses and the prophets' teachings are enough to guide us to live rightly. This emphasizes the importance of paying attention to Scripture as a guide for our lives.
- **Justice for the Poor:** Both Amos and the Gospel highlight God's concern for the poor and suffering. It reminds us that our faith calls us to help those who are less fortunate.
- **Ultimate Authority of God:** Paul describes God as the only Sovereign, the King of kings and Lord of lords. This reaffirms that all power and authority ultimately belong to God, and we are to live in a way that honors Him.

These themes from the readings invite us to examine our lives and align our actions with God's expectations. They call us to live not just for today, but with an eye toward eternity.

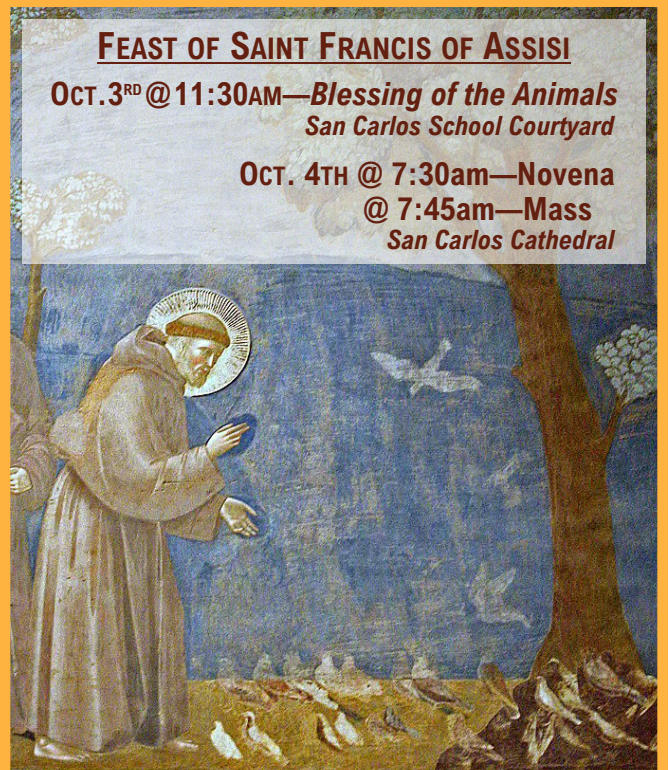

TWENTY-SIXTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME (YEAR C) *by Sr. Sharon McMillan, SNDdeN*

Before the Second Vatican Council (1962 – 1965), the readings for Mass on Sunday were quite different and quite restricted. There were only 2 readings: the Gospel and what was called the Epistle. What that meant of course is that Catholics never heard the Old Testament at Mass on Sundays – never! Another strong difference was that there was only one set of readings, the Epistle and Gospel, and that set was just repeated year after year. This drastically reduced the passages from the 4 Gospels that Catholics heard. The majority of the Gospels were from Matthew with some readings from Luke and John, but only 4 readings all year from Mark! And of course we only heard these readings in Latin. It is hard to imagine that only after 1970 did Catholics hear the Scripture readings proclaimed in English, Spanish, Tagalog, Vietnamese, Swahili – or whatever the people's language was. When the 2500 bishops gathered at the Vatican in Rome for the Council, they mandated a far more extensive proclamation of readings from the Bible. From that time, the readings for Catholics expanded to a 3-year cycle of readings with three readings each Sunday: the First Reading (usually from the Old Testament), the Second Reading (from the letters in the New Testament), and the Gospel. The Gospel passages now included all the significant sections from Matthew's Gospel (Year A), Mark's Gospel (Year B), and Luke's Gospel (Year C). During the long weeks of Ordinary Time, the First Reading is chosen to be in harmony with the Gospel. As Ordinary Time moves quickly to its close with the Feast of Christ the King on November 23rd, we look back and appreciate how Sunday after Sunday in Year C we have been able to savor the portrait of Jesus that Luke has given us: Jesus who has a special love for the outcast and the poor, Jesus whose message of salvation is for the whole world.

The Gospel Luke 16:19-31 This parable of the rich man and Lazarus appears only in Luke's Gospel, and reflects Luke's overriding concern for the poor and for social justice. Here he presents one of his favorite themes: the great reversal. The one who was excessively wealthy in life now suffers, and Lazarus who lacks even the simplest garment to cover his sores now lives in eternal joy and wholeness. We see right away that the rich man cannot claim ignorance that someone hungry was outside his door, for he refers to Lazarus by name. He displays his usual arrogant behavior by not asking Abraham for the favor but requests that Abraham command Lazarus to come down and refresh him. Abraham makes sure that the rich man knows that his own lack of charity and responsibility put him in this place of flames. Luke's lesson for us here is not that our God is a God of damnation and punishment, but rather it is a vivid lesson of how large a role we play in our own salvation. Jesus continually invites us to conversion of mind and heart, to live a life increasingly sensitive to the demands of the kingdom of God. Had the rich man paid attention to Lazarus begging for table scraps at the door of his house, the rich man would not be in the predicament he is in now. The mention of "rising from the dead" in the last sentence of the parable reminds us of Jesus' resurrection.

First Reading Amos 6:1, 4-7 The Prophet Amos speaks forcefully in the name of God who cares about injustice and will not stand idly by as it happens. Amos is outraged that the leaders of Israel live in luxury while their people live in misery, while the poor only get poorer. How these words continue to resonate today! It is clear why biblical scholars chose this reading which will be fulfilled in today's Gospel.

Second Reading 1 Timothy 6:11-16 In today's Second Reading, Timothy, a traveling missionary and companion of St. Paul, is reminded to remain faithful in his role of shepherding the community at Ephesus. The letter ends with a powerful prayer in praise of Jesus, King of kings and Lord of lords.

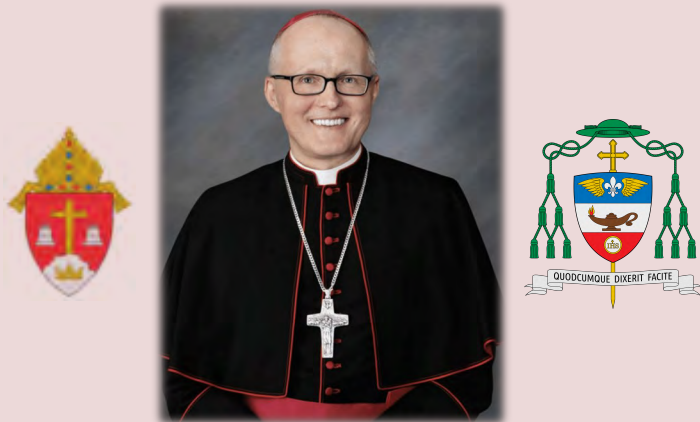

Bishop Slawomir Szkredka was born in the town of Czechowice-Dziedzice in southern Poland, less than 50 miles from St. Pope John Paul II's hometown of Wadowice. He began his studies for the priesthood at Kraków's Metropolitan Seminary and continued at SS. Cyril & Methodius Seminary in Orchard Lake, Michigan. He was ordained a priest for the Archdiocese of Los Angeles in 2002. He served as Parochial Vicar at St. Genevieve Church in Panorama City and at St. John the Baptist Church in Baldwin Park. Afterwards, he began his graduate studies at the Pontifical Biblical Institute in Rome in 2008. He returned to the Archdiocese of Los Angeles in 2015 to serve as professor and formator at St. John's Seminary, earning his doctorate in Sacred Scripture in 2017.

On September 26, 2023, Archbishop José H. Gomez appointed him Episcopal Vicar for the Santa Barbara Pastoral Region at the Cathedral of Our Lady of the Angels. Most recently, on September 19, 2025, the Apostolic Nuncio, Cardinal Christophe Pierre, announced that Bishop Szkredka had been appointed **Apostolic Administrator of the Diocese of Monterey** in California.

El **Obispo Slawomir Szkredka** nació en la ciudad de Czechowice-Dziedzice, en el sur de Polonia, a menos de 80 kilómetros de Wadowice, la ciudad natal del papa Juan Pablo II. Comenzó sus estudios sacerdotales en el Seminario Metropolitano de Cracovia y continuó en el Seminario de los Santos Cirilo y Metodio en Orchard Lake, Michigan. En 2002, fue ordenado sacerdote para la Arquidiócesis de Los Ángeles. Fue vicario parroquial en la iglesia de Santa Genoveva en Panorama City y en la iglesia de San Juan Bautista en Baldwin Park. Después hizo sus estudios de posgrado en el Pontificio Instituto Bíblico de Roma en 2008. Regresó a la Arquidiócesis de Los Ángeles para servir como profesor y formador en el Seminario de San Juan en 2015. En 2017 obtuvo su doctorado en Sagrada Escritura.

El 26 de septiembre de 2023, el Arzobispo José H. Gómez lo nombró Vicario Episcopal para la Región Pastoral de Santa Bárbara en la Catedral de Nuestra Señora de los Ángeles. Este pasado el 19 de septiembre de 2025, el Nuncio Apostólico, Cardenal Christophe Pierre, anunció que el Obispo Szkredka había sido nombrado **Administrador Apostólico de la Diócesis de Monterey** en California.

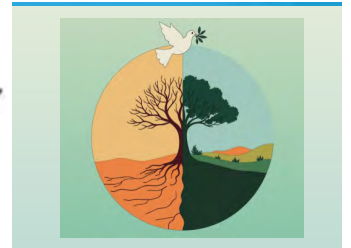

DID YOU KNOW THAT...?

Bishop Slawomir's Episcopal Motto is: "*quodcumque dixerit facite*", which means: "Do whatever He tells you." These words of the Virgin Mary to the servants at the wedding feast of Cana are an invitation to them — and to us — to "assume her own attitude of trust and whatever God demands or asks for".



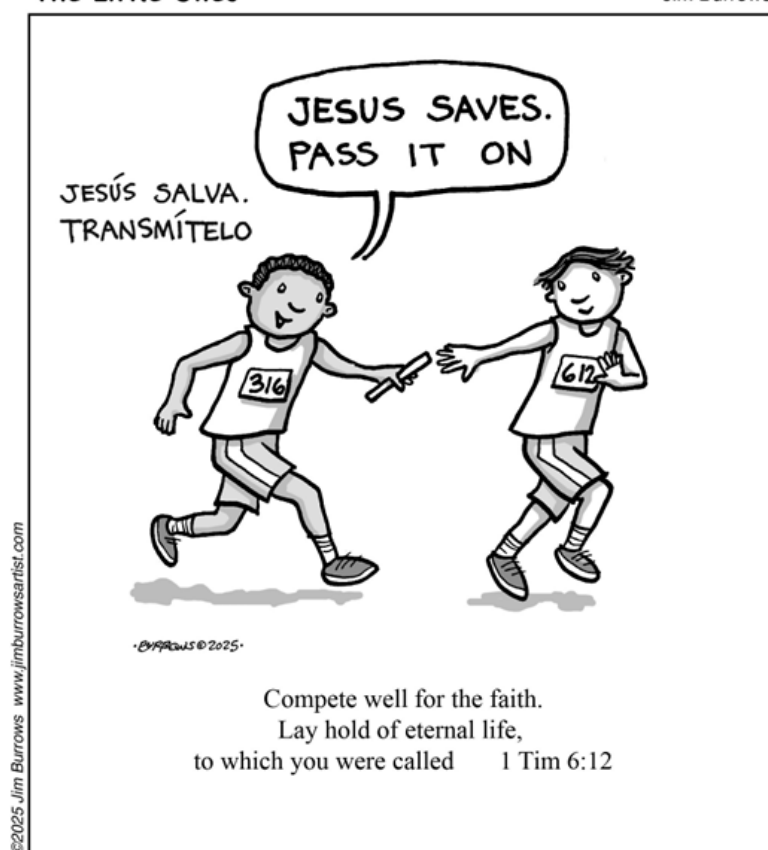

Dear San Carlos Parishioners,

In the life of the Catholic Church, an Apostolic Administrator plays a vital role in ensuring the continuity of pastoral care and governance during times of transition within a diocese. An Apostolic Administrator is a bishop or priest appointed by the Holy See to oversee a diocese temporarily when the diocesan bishop is unable to fulfill his duties, such as during a vacancy, illness, or other significant circumstances. (Canons 371 §2, & 406) His primary responsibility is to govern the diocese with the same authority as a diocesan bishop, ensuring the spiritual and administrative needs of the faithful are met; including overseeing the celebration of the sacraments, supporting clergy and parishes, and managing the diocese's temporal affairs, according with Church law.

Pope Leo XIV has appointed Bishop Slawomir Szkredka as the Apostolic Administrator of the Diocese of Monterey to act as a bridge, guiding us through a period of change until a new bishop is appointed for our diocese. This role reflects the Church's commitment to stability and fidelity to Christ's mission, ensuring that the flock is never left without a shepherd. And so...let us welcome and continuously pray for Bishop Slawomir!

Queridos feligreses de San Carlos:

En la vida de la Iglesia Católica, un Administrador Apostólico realiza un papel vital que garantiza la continuidad de la atención pastoral y el gobierno durante los períodos de transición dentro de una diócesis. Un Administrador Apostólico es un obispo o sacerdote designado por la Santa Sede para supervisar una diócesis temporalmente cuando el obispo diocesano no puede cumplir con sus deberes, ya sea, durante una vacante, o por una enfermedad u otras circunstancias significativas. (Cánones 371 §2 y 406) Su principal responsabilidad es gobernar la diócesis con la misma autoridad que un obispo diocesano, asegurando para los fieles sus necesidades espirituales y administrativas; incluyendo la celebración de los sacramentos, el apoyo al clero y a las parroquias, y de acuerdo al derecho canonico, la gestión de los asuntos temporales de la diócesis.

El Papa León XIV nombró al Obispo Slawomir Szkredka Administrador Apostólico de la Diócesis de Monterey para que actúe como puente que nos guía en este período de cambio hasta que se nombre un nuevo obispo para nuestra diócesis. Este rol refleja el compromiso de la Iglesia con la estabilidad y fidelidad a la misión de Cristo: que el rebaño nunca se quede sin pastor. Por eso... ¡demos la bienvenida y oremos constantemente por el Obispo Slawomir!
