
How to read your Teach FX class report



You can use your TeachFX class report to get quick, actionable feedback on your teaching. Let's look at the Sample Class above and highlight some simple ways you can interpret the data:

Teacher Talk

Look for sections with large blocks of red. That means the teacher spoke for several minutes straight without any questions or participation from the students. (Don't worry, we've all been there!) Listen back and think about ways you could get your students more involved.

Open-Ended Questioning

See if you're asking open-ended questions that get lengthy responses (long blocks of light blue) or closed questions that discourage dialogue (shorter blocks).

Ping-Pong vs. Volleyball

Are students responding to each other's comments (a "volleyball" style conversation), or is the teacher responding to every student's comment ("ping-pong" style)? Look for multiple blocks of light blue in a row to see if you're creating higher-level discourse.


Wait Time


The small gray blocks show you all the times you used wait time effectively...and the lack of a gray block shows when you didn't.

Lesson Design

Take a step back. Does your overall class report match your lesson plan? If you planned a discussion, how involved were your students? If you planned a think-pair-share, did all the elements show up in your report?



Notice, there are no gray blocks of silence in between teacher and student comments. Those are missed opportunities for wait time!

> Here we see 4 instances of wait time (gray blocks): once after the teacher's initial question, then 3 more after student comments. Nice!



See the pattern for a think-pairshare? There's gray for silence (thinking), dark blue for group work (pairing), and then light blue for student talk (sharing).
