Through their involvement with International Friends, Larry and Linda Grossman really enjoy returning the hospitality they have received over the years during their global travels. Larry has been on the IF Board for several years and enjoys meeting and speaking with new students—frequently in their languages.

Larry grew up in Omaha, Nebraska, and always wanted to be a world traveler. As an English major at the University of Nebraska, Larry entered an essay contest for Wrangler Jeans and won their Young Ambassador contest-and the prize was a trip to six countries in Europe! He loved it and in 1969 took exams and entered the US Foreign Service for a 24year career. His first assignment as a development worker was to Vietnam (during the war years) followed by two years in cosmopolitan Buenos Aires, Argentina. International Friends has an online system for matching hosts with students. The system is user friendly and easily accessible: just follow a few simple steps. All you need is access to a computer with an internet connection.

STEP 1: CLICK LINK, USE YOUR PASSWORD

Click on http://ifriendstucson.org/login.html . It will take you to a login page.

Username: Enter your full email address

Password: Enter your password

If you have forgotten your password, email Jim Moline at jim@ifriendstucson.org, using the email address with which you log into the I-Friends system. Jim will then email you with your password information.

STEP 2: EDIT PROFILE

Once you have entered your password, it will take you to your profile page. Please edit or update your information.

STEP 3: SELECT A STUDENT

Search through the students who are seeking a host to find student(s) that look like a good match. Select the students.

STEP 4: MEET YOUR STUDENT

Once you have selected a student, our Assignments Coordinator will confirm the match and send you and your student an email with the other's contact information. You can then contact your student to arrange your first get-together.

Tokyo to Tucson:

IF student learns to be an "Honorary Mexican"

"¿**D**onde está, Maki?" asked a handful of Mexican children at Casa Hogar Emanuel, an orphanage in Naco, Sonora, Mexico.


Maki Kosaka, a 21-year-old Japanese student studying abroad at the University of Arizona, frequently volunteers as a playmate at the orphanage. Sick with a head cold last weekend, she missed the most recent trip south of the border, sending much-needed toilet paper in her place. The children prefer Maki.

Maki takes Spanish classes through the university, improving what has become her fourth language and another chapter in her life. She grew up speaking Japanese with her parents and older sister, learned Thai in high school during a year-long program in Bangkok, and now tosses accented English slang around with the ease of a native speaker.

Practicing Spanish both academically and with orphans in Mexico, Maki knows enough that her Mexican-American friends have dubbed her as an "honorary Mexican." She takes salsa dance lessons and has learned how to make tamales. When she discovered what "bucket list" meant last month, learning to make tamales on her own made the "Number One" spot.

"Mexican food is one of my favorite things about being here," Maki said.

Alexis Kreun, a student activities assistant at the Center for English as a Second Language (CESL), first met Maki on a trip to Casa Hogar Emanuel last year. "We get there, and she's speaking Spanish to these kids," Kreun said. "and by the time she leaves, they love her." And Maki loves them, noting the trips to the Mexican orphanage as some of her favorite experiences from this past year.



When Maki chose to study at the University of Arizona, she picked the school because of its proximity to Mexico in an effort to sate her longtime desire to experience Latin American culture. Studying in Tucson allows her to practice her English amongst Americans but also take frequent jaunts south of the border. After she finishes her year at the University of Arizona, Maki hopes to spend the remainder of her summer working in an orphanage, finally immersing herself in the culture that she has only ever dipped her fingers in.

Got questions about the matching process? We've got answers!

Q. What if my student doesn't respond?

A. Sometimes your selected student may not reply to your initial phone call or email. This can simply mean that the student is adjusting to a demanding academic schedule or life in a new country. Try contacting the student again after a week or two. Schedule a get-acquainted meeting once the student has acclimated to life in the US. If after several tries there is no student response to you, advise <u>jim@ifriendstucson.org</u> and then select another student.

O. My student's email came back. Now what?

A. International students often change their email address once enrolled at UA. Students' current email addresses are located in the UA online student directory. To locate a student's e-mail go to www.arizona.edu/phonebook. Type in the student's name at the phonebook prompt. The student's current information will appear.

Q. I want a student from Italy, but I can't find one.

A. Enrollment patterns determine the numbers and represented countries of international students at the University of Arizona. Typically, International Friends has students from many countries around the globe with the highest number from China and India. It is not always possible to find students from a specific country, so remain flexible in your student choices. It can be a rewarding and satisfying experience.
